ST MARY'S CHURCH'S NEW **BELLS TO BE AUGMENTED** WITH A 'TAMBOURINE' BELL

We reported in October last year (#33) that St Mary's will be taking delivery of 3 new bells next month; the new bells will enable a 'light' octave to be rung and will be the first church in the East Riding outside of the City of Hull to have a ring of 12 bells, meaning St Mary's will now be on a par with most of the main cathedrals in England.

However, fund-raising has gone so well that St Mary's has been able to order a 'tambourine' bell, which will sit with the other bells in the belfry and be tolled in the same way as the other bells. The 'tambourine' bell will increase the rhythmicality of the peals, extending the peal options and the attraction of St Mary's to the church bellringing community. It will also be another Beverley first! The 'tambourine' bell will be able to enforce the beat and allow the bells to be used to ring 'pop' tunes for special occasions such as weddings and the Tour de Yorkshire. In fact, St Mary's Ringing Master Chris Munday is hoping the new bells will be installed for the start of the Tour de Yorkshire so that Queen's 'Bicycle Race' can be pealed, with the tambourine bell used to add the sound of the bicycle bells as well as echo Roger Taylor's drums. The possibilities of the 'light 8' with the 'tambourine' bell are endless and well beyond the scope of any other ring in the country.

Just Beverley would love the new 'tambourine bell to have been installed by April 1st ready for Easter Day celebrations when Fatboy Slim's 'Praise You' would have been a great choice.





REVD CANON JONATHAN BAKER AND BEVERLEY MINSTER'S MISSION

Jonathan was inaugurated as Vicar at Beverley Minster on December 9th last year, with the church decorated with Christmas Trees as part of the Beverley Festival of Christmas. He feels very privileged to be here in Beverley, entrusted with seeking, developing and implementing God's vision for the parish - because Beverley Minster, for all its grandeur and beauty, is a parish church, the Parish Church of St John and St Martin.

But as well as being Vicar of Beverley Minster, Revd Baker is also Priest-in-Charge of Routh All Saints' Church and has responsibility for St Leonard's Molescroft, St Peter's Woodmansey and The Church in Tickton, which is a Local Ecumenical project with the Methodist Church.

His arrival was greeted with huge enthusiasm as the Minster has been without a Vicar since Revd Jeremy Fletcher moved to Hampstead in March 2017.

However, although the church now has a Vicar, they are without a Curate since Revd Gareth Atha become Vicar at Whaplode in Lincolnshire last November.

But the good news is that there is to be an Associate Vicar appointed to the Minster in recognition of the expansion of the Parish and the need for outreach to the new houses being built on the southern edge of Beverley as well as to focus on the 30-50 age-group. And, hopefully, there will be a new Curate appointed next year.

Jonathan Baker was ordained to the priesthood in 1992 after studying at Wycliffe College, Oxford; prior to that he studied law at Guildford and practised as a solicitor in London for 5 years after graduating with a degree in history from Cambridge.


He served in churches in Croydon and Scarborough before becoming Canon Missioner at Peterborough Cathedral and then Acting Dean in Peterborough since autumn 2016.

Whilst Canon Missioner at Peterborough, Jonathan was, amongst other things, responsible for ministry to visitors and schools, developing ecumenical partnerships and interfaith groups and the development of a visitor centre which puts the building, artefacts, history and Christian heritage of Peterborough in context

As Jonathan said: "Cathedrals and churches were traditionally the centre of everyone's lives. We inherit these beautiful buildings which were designed to help the parishioners encounter God and other-worldiness. It still happens today - lots of people go into churches to light candles which demonstrates that people who don't necessarily want to take part in a service can touch the unfamiliar."

Because the Minster is a parish church, it has to be paid for by its congregation. Fortunately, there is a large number of local people who are happy to support it, not only as part of the worshipping community but as volunteers and as Friends of Beverley Minster.

But it needs a considerable amount of money to maintain it and the service it provides to the community. It is of concern that Beverley's other parish church, St Mary's, which is a beautiful building, too, is also in need of funds to maintain its fabric. The relationship between the Minster and St Mary's is important but the hope that the Heritage Lottery Fund would grant £10-15m and be the answer to both Church's problems is optimistic at best, so they are working together to look at other sources of income and grants.



Jonathan is married to Sue, a secondary school teacher, tutor and mentor. Teaching is an area of interest for both in that Jonathan ran a Theological Society whilst in Peterborough. Would there be an appetite for a similar association in Beverley?

The couple have four grown-up children. Their oldest is an independent freelance film-maker in London whilst the youngest is at York University and now calling Beverley home.

Fortunately, Jonathan's appointment as Vicar is open-ended which means there will be plenty of time for the Bakers to come to love the area as much as everyone who lives here does.


Jonathan said: "It takes a while to get 'played in' and build trust. It's very early days and I can already see there are lots of good things going on but huge potential for others; we just need to work out what to focus on first. It takes collective listening to discern where the energy is, what people are excited about and how we tie up the opportunities. The Spirit is moving in a very positive direction at Beverley Minster!"

There will be a major festival in Beverley in 3 years' time - 2021 is the 1300th anniversary of the death of St John of Beverley, who was buried at the monastery he founded here.

Beverley at that time was known as Inderawuda which means 'in the wood of Deira', Deira being an old name for East Yorkshire. In the 14th century, Beverley was one of the 12 biggest towns in the country which was all due to St John, who was canonized in 1037 due to the miracles afforded to him.

Jonathan's experience gained during his time at Canon Missioner and interest in Christian teaching will surely bring an extra special dimension to these celebrations.

2 years ago, Richard Stott spotted a disused barn in Etton. With his professional hat on, he could see the potential for the barn to be converted into a home. What's more, the barn, on the Dalton Estate was up for sale. Richard has been an architect for 25 years, 10 years with RD Stott, but was his dream achievable? Last month, accompanied by the snow and wind of the 'Beast from the East' he moved in. This is his

"It has been 2 years from when our offer for the barn was accepted by the Dalton Estate with the informal tenders being dealt with by Jon Myers of Quick & Clarke. With the purchase completed in September 2016, R D Stott Architects submitted a new planning application for the Change of Use of the barn to a single dwelling with extension. Even though it was outside the development line of Etton village, within open countryside and in the Conservation Area of Etton and next to St Mary's Church, a Grade I listed building and other listed buildings within the area, the planning application was approved, first time, under normal delegated powers.





"Building works started on the 13th March 2017 with me overseeing the works from start to finish. It has been a labour of love, but with my knowledge of working on historic buildings and having won awards for refurbishment projects in the past, this was a project that was well within the scope of my abilities. The works involved the careful restoration of the existing barn including the retention and refurbishment of the existing timber beams, the re-instatement of the brick piers to match existing and the sourcing of new oak beams to go over the main windows, that actually came from the Dalton Estate, a plus point for sourcing locally and reducing the carbon footprint of the building!

"But while this might be a barn conversion, there is nothing old fashioned about the fixtures and fittings. This is a home for the 21st century with all the facilities you would expect of a modern home. Firstly, it has been designed to the highest energy efficient standards, with high levels of insulation, double glazing and underfloor heating. All hot water and heating will be provided by an Air Source Heat Pump. There are solar panels on the roof, a Mechanical Ventilation and Heat Recovery system that extracts stale air from the bathrooms and kitchens and provides fresh warm air to the rest of the house. LED lights, smart light and socket switches that can be controlled from your smart phone, electric curtains, CCTV and an alarm system.



"Ultimately, with the high levels of insulation, the various energy efficient features, plus with the Feed in Tariff from the solar panels and the Government Renewable Heat Incentive pay back for the ASHP it is anticipated that this building will not cost anything for the heating and electricity. All that's left to do now is sort out the garden when we get some warmer weather! But I would like to recognise some local companies for their help and expertise - Kütchenhaus on Toll Gavel for the kitchen, Old Flames of Beverley for the woodburning stove, Innes for the Lighting, Ladygate Removals and Thomas the Bakers for their bacon sandwiches!"

As the first day of April bursts upon us this year on Easter Sunday, there is one flower which epitomises what that special day can mean. The daffodil is a symbol of hope for so many people in our troubled world, especially those who are in a dark place.



Recently, two daffodils thrust their little glowing heads up through the earth in our garden which was nearly bereft of any colour. These two flowers

had lain dormant for many months and we did sometimes wonder if they would flower again this Spring as they have done before. Had we done anything to help them come again? Well maybe we did listen to the person who told us to be patient and let the tops die back before saying goodbye to them eleven months ago but since then, nothing. We just assumed they would come again and they did. But no sooner had they begun to stand up tall than along came the worst weather we have had locally for many a long year and they were literally flattened to the ground. Was that the end of them? No! We brought them indoors to give pleasure in a different way. I have read that some Welsh folks are none too pleased that a certain charity has adopted the daffodil, its national emblem, as a symbol of hope for those with terminal illnesses. I trust that is a view only held by a small proportion of that great nation because the work of that charity, who offer hope to people, when, because of a number of cruel illnesses, whole families are in distress. is something to be proud of and not squabble over. The charity I refer to, MacMillan, came into being in the same year as the National Health Service in 1948. Both have given wonderful service to people at a point of need in their lives when as individuals they were at a loss and needing help. It is so very easy to give up when the harsh winds of criticism seem to be all we hear and read about. Giving up on something, or someone, when they don't seem to be able to achieve what we want, when we want it, is no way to live our lives. Giving to others, however small the gift, will often benefit both those who receive and those who give in time.

A group of folks I know are currently meeting to learn more about a host of women who did not give up hope after being knocked back time and again, because of prejudice against them. But, like our daffodils, they stood tall again and went on to contribute so much in so many different ways, for the good of their fellow men and women. Prison reform, medicine, religion, literature, politics, art, music, the list goes on. May churches decorate a cross on Easter Sunday morning with flowers. It will be particularly pleasing this year to see the daffodils and other spring flowers reminding us of the new life that resurrects each year, giving us fresh hope that the good in people will prevail over all else.

WE ALL HAVE MUSICAL FAVOURITES - WHAT'S YOURS?

A funeral service is held to celebrate the life of someone who was very special to us and no celebration would be complete without music in some shape or form. There are many ways to include music in a service from the more traditional hymn singing and the playing of popular songs to live performances from family and friends of songs they have written or even brass bands, the choices are many and varied.

Music is a very important element of a funeral service and the pieces chosen can help to shape the rest of its content, setting the tone so to speak. Sourcing and collating music for services is a part of my role that I very much enjoy. Musical preference is a very personal thing and I feel privileged to be party to those choices and touched by the sentiment often shared with us by the family as to why they have chosen those pieces of music in particular. Most services include three pieces of music, the first piece at the beginning played while the cortege enter the room, the second during the service and the third is played as the congregation leave the service. There are not set rules for the types of music played and can include a mixture of modern music and hymns if desired. Pieces are usually chosen to invoke special memories or even because they were favourites of the person who has passed away, either way they provide the opportunity for families and friends to express their feelings and create a bespoke tribute to their loved one. We are often asked the question 'Do you think this piece of music is ok?' and our response to this is if it has special meaning to you and your family then it can't be wrong. Music can be used to express emotions that are difficult to say and bring back memories that have faded and therefore there are no right or wrong pieces of music just those that mean something to you and your family.

We work to the 1972 Local Government Act as required by law. We also work in partnership with the East Riding of Yorkshire Council on various projects. We are a statutory consultee in the planning process; however, ERYC manage and make the final decisions on planning matters in Beverley. We have five allotment sites, containing around 300 allotments within the town, which we manage and maintain.

We also manage and maintain the Skatepark sited at Beverley Leisure Centre. We have a strong civic tradition as the second oldest Charter Town of the East Riding of Yorkshire. In addition, we also organise many events, most of the work being done by our officers, me and my fellow Councillors and our many volunteers.

What has been the highlight of the last 3 years?

Being elected Deputy Mayor and then Mayor has been an honour and a privilege as I have been able to promote the town which I love and show it off to its full potential. Last year we won Gold at Yorkshire in Bloom and were overall category winners. Then we got a big surprise when they introduced the White Rose Award for 'Best Town' and Beverley was announced the winner!

I behaved in a very un-mayoral way by jumping up and down! But the Town Clerk and the Members of the Beverley in Bloom Group were also jumping up and down - we were thrilled!

We have now been entered as Finalists into Britain in Bloom, which is a great honour but will mean lots of work for our staff and volunteers. It isn't iust 'blooms', it also involves environmental responsibility and community participation, so all our events will contribute. We will also be in competition with councils and Bloom groups who have much bigger budgets than us, so we need a lot of cooperation from the townspeople, particularly to keep the place clean and tidy.

What new things have been happening in the town?

We are repeating the event this year on 23 June, working in conjunction with St Marys Church with an Alice in Wonderland Mad Hatters Tea Party theme.

We are hoping we can also book the sunshine! We also had a successful NGS Open Allotments and Scarecrow Day with a prize for the best scarecrow and we will repeat this on 15th July.

Beverley has several Festivals which have run for a number of years? Will they continue? How have they impacted Beverley?

Residents and visitors can look forward to the Beverley Food Festival this year on 7th October; it was a finalist at the Remarkable East Yorkshire Tourism Awards this year, having previously won the award in 2016 and the Countryside Alliance Rural Oscar for Tourism in 2017.

The Christmas Festival of Food and Drink which is always successful and has a lovely festive feel will be 24th November.

The Christmas Lights Switch on is organised by the Beverley Town Council along with a wonderful committee of fund raisers, the 2 Lions groups in Beverley and Flemingate.



As a result of the successful Food Festival the Town Clerk, Helen Watson, and I were invited to give a workshop at the National Association of Local Councils conference on economic growth in market towns.

NATIONAL MINIMUM WAGE/ NATIONAL LIVING WAGE RATES

The National Minimum Wage (NMW) is the minimum pay per hour most workers under the age of 25 are entitled to by law. The Government's National Living Wage (NLW) is the minimum pay per hour most workers aged 25 and over are entitled to by law. These rates are due to change very soon.

The rate will depend on a workers age and if they are an apprentice. The following table includes historic rates as well as the forthcoming changes.

Changes to Rates:

Date of Rate	25 & over	21 to 24	18 to 20	Under 18	Apprentice
From April 2018	£7.83	£7.38	£5.95	£4.20	£3.70
From April 2017 to March 2018	£7.50	£7.05	£5.60	£4.05	£3.50
From October 2016 to March 2017	£7.20	£6.95	£5.55	£4.00	£3.40
From April 2016 to September 2016	£7.20	£6.70	£5.30	£3.87	£3.30

A new rate will apply to the next pay reference period that begins on or after the date:

- A rate increase begins.
- · An employee reaches a new age bracket.

For example: an employee paid on the 20th of each month will start to receive the new rate of minimum wage from 21st April onwards. These rates are reviewed annually by the Low Pay Commission. If a worker received above the NMW there is no legal obligation on an employer to increase their pay when the NMW rate increases.

Exemptions to the rates:

There are a number of people who are not entitled to the NMW or NLW. These rates do not apply to:

- Self-Employed people.
- · Volunteers or voluntary workers.
- · Company directors.
- · Members of the armed forces.
- Family members, or people who live in the family home of the employer who undertake household tasks
- Work experience students, depending on the length of their placement.

All other workers including pieceworkers, home workers, agency workers, commission workers, part-time workers and casual workers must receive at least the NMW or NLW. Some people may need to have adjustments made to their NMW if they live in accommodation which is linked to their employment or owned by their employer. For further information, go to www.gov.uk/national-minimum-wage-accommodation

Apprentices:

The apprenticeship rate only applies to apprentices aged:

- Under 19.
- 19 or over who are in the first year of their apprenticeship.

Apprentices aged 19 or over in their second year of apprenticeship must receive the national minimum wage or national living wage rate their age entitles them to.

Non-payment of the NMW or NLW

It is against the law for employers to pay workers less than the NMW or NLW, or to falsify payment records. If an employer doesn't pay the correct rate, a worker should talk to their employer and try to resolve the issue informally first. If an informal approach does not work an employee has the option of raising a formal written complaint (also known as grievance).

If the situation cannot be resolved internally a worker could choose to make a complaint to an Employment Tribunal. For most tribunal claims there is a three-month time limit a claim to be submitted. However, this time limit does pause if Early Conciliation is taking place.

The difference between the National Living Wage and the Living Wage

The government's NLW is different from the Living Wage, which is an hourly rate of pay and updated annually. The Living Wage is set independently by the Living Wage Foundation and is calculated according to the basic cost of living in the UK. Employers choose to pay the Living Wage on a voluntary basis.

COUNTRYSIDE MATTERS WITH SAM WALTON



The Challenges of Farming: This issue is due out in time for a rather interesting date, April Fool's Day. Strange why a farmer should mention that - or it could be that he is often told you need to be a fool to be farmer! April Fool or not, it has been a very trying time this winter with cropping plans having gone out of the window and many acres not sown. It is the first time in my farming life that I have not managed to get everything sown which I had hoped to.

That of course means having seed left on hand which will need to be germination tested before drilling next autumn. It will also be of lower germination by then than it was this year. This leads to a conundrum. Do we mix it in with new seed or do we put more of the old seed on per acre than normal to try and counterbalance the germination effect? Might seem like a small problem but whatever we do, it will have dire consequences if we get it wrong.

What is the answer? Well, farmers are renowned for doing different things and some of the extra enterprises taken on are truly mind blowing. Farm shops are now commonplace, holiday lets in converted buildings, caravan sites for both mobile and static and one which I find quite interesting is the rearing of pheasants for many of the shoots. Some people may not like that idea, but it happens and provides a lot of employment for people like gamekeepers whose job is to keep vermin down and to see that whatever wildlife is wanted is actually looked after. Rabbits can do untold damage and I believe five rabbits graze as much as one ewe.

But whilst ewes are restricted to proper grazing, rabbits take great delight in eating farm crops! I have an area near a wood which no matter what I grow, is always nibbled by rabbits! Any crop which is left in this area is always way behind when it comes to harvesting, as it is still green with small ears, so most years it is not worth the trip back just to do this odd acre.





RECIPE BY THE FOOD RHINO - STIR-FRY RHINO-STYLE (SERVES 4)

Ingredients:

- · 200g Broccoli (chopped)
- 130g Baby sweetcorn (chopped)
- 400g Tin chickpeas (drained)
- · 2 Roasted red pepper (sliced)
- 250g Spiralized courgette
- 225g Tin bamboo shoots (drained and washed)
- 4 Garlic cloves (sliced)
- 1 Chilli (sliced)
- Rice noodles (as much or little as required)
- Brown sugar
- Sesame seeds
- Soy sauceRice wine
- Peanut oil

Method per portion:

Put your desired amount of (ready-made) rice noodles in a pan, cover with boiling water around 1 cm above the noodles. Put a lid over the top and place to the side. Heat your wok with a good drizzle of peanut oil until it's just about to start smoking. Add the garlic, chickpeas, broccoli and bamboo shoots and stir with a chop stick for a few minutes before adding the courgette, chilli and baby sweetcorn.

Cook for another few minutes until the broccoli has softened but still has a firmness to it. Drain the noodles and add to the stir fry, they should be almost soft by now. Now it's all about flavour. Add your desired amount of sugar, soy sauce and rice wine. Try about 4 loose tbsps rice wine, the same for soy sauce and 1 tbsp brown sugar. Let the flavours cook out for a minute and serve with extra sliced chilli and sesame seeds as garnish.

With this recipe, it's all about personal preference, so taste as you cook. Drain the rice noodles and serve with the stir-fry. Enjoy! Follow the Food Rhino on Facebook @TheFoodRhino and Twitter @chef_mattjacobs

YOUR FINANCES WITH GARETH BOTTERILL

With the 2017/18 tax year ending on 5 April 2018, changes to the tax rates will occur on 6 April 2018.

Income Tax

Each year the individual personal tax-free allowance increases; from April 2018 the individual personal allowance will increase from £11,500 to £11,850. The point where higher rate tax becomes payable will increase to £46,350 from £45,000. The tax-free dividend allowance falls from £5,000 to £2,000 from 6 April 2018. This will be important for small business owners, taking dividends from their company and will mean additional tax of £225 per year.

Landlords who are higher rate tax payers are now being restricted on how much of their loan or mortgage interest can be relieved against their income. From April 2018, 50% of their finance costs will still be allowed as a higher rate tax deduction, with the other 50% only receiving the basic rate tax deduction.

Inheritance tax (IHT)

From April 2017 a new inheritance tax allowance was introduced for the deceased's home. The initial allowance was £100,000 and this will rise to £125,000 from 6 April 2018. The nil rate band for inheritance tax stays at £325,000. This means that, if the deceased's home is passed to a direct descendent on death, there will be no inheritance tax to pay on the first £450,000 of the estate.

Capital gains tax (CGT)

From 6 April 2018 the annual exempt amount for capital gains will increase to £11.700.

Auto enrolment pensions

When auto enrolment pensions were first introduced, the minimum contribution was 2% (at least 1% from the employer and 1% from the employee). From April 2018 this minimum contribution increases to 5%, with 2% of this being the employer's minimum contribution and 3% the employees minimum contribution.

IN THE GARDEN... AP

April is the month when the garden suddenly leaps into colour, with one of the most colourful flowers being that of the Tulip. The tulip has a fascinating and exotic history. Did you know?

- The tulip was first introduced into Europe from the Ottoman Empire in the mid 1500's and was named 'tulip' from the Turkish tülbend (duliband), meaning turban.
- Between 1634 and 1637, 'Tulipmania' hit Holland. People gambled and speculated on tulip bulbs, some being sold for vast sums of money and/ or property and goods. It is thought more bulbs were sold on paper than existed in Holland - of course eventually everything crashed and some people were left penniless.
- · Holland exports billions of tulip bulbs worldwide every year.
- The highly prized variegated and feathered tulips during 'Tulipmania' were produced as a result of an infection from the tulip breaking virus, a mosaic virus carried by an aphid.

By the time April arrives the clocks have gone forward and we have more daylight hours to get out into the garden, especially in the evenings. Tasks are plentiful, but please bear in mind that we have had a lot of rain and snow in March and the ground is saturated - so please don't work any soil that is wet and sticky, you will do more harm than good. Be patient and wait until it dries out before you attempt some of April's tasks.

Tasks for April...

Planting and Sowing

- Plant new shrubs, perennials and any other container grown plants.
- Plant out autumn sown sweet peas and sow vegetables outdoors.
- · April is a good month to seed a new lawn remember sowing the seed is the easy part, it is important to prepare the ground carefully.
- Seed any bare patches in the lawn.
- Plant out all summer flowering bulbs by the end of the month.
- If you have a greenhouse or protected space, plant up your summer containers and hanging baskets towards the end of the month, BUT don't be in too much hurry to put them out much before the end of May.

Pruning and Tidying

- Spend a little time tidying your borders and weeding annual weeds can be pulled out by hand or give the border a quick hoe, perennial weeds are deeper rooted and will need digging out.
- Prune hydrangeas, lavender and other grey foliaged plants.
- Prune and shape fan trained fruit and tie in new growth on climbers.
- Dead head daffodils (leaving the foliage to die back) and prune forsythia and chaenomeles plants after they have finished flowering - they both flower on wood produced the previous summer.
- Of course the lawn may need mowing more regularly trim it lightly with the blades set high.

Pests etc...

- All this lush growth makes a veritable feast for aphids, slugs and snails so keep a lookout for them and deal with them swiftly. If you're not an 'organic' gardener use slug pellets. Organic gardeners have several ways to control slugs, including a biological control using nematodes. Traps are also effective and my favourite is the 'beer trap', lay an empty plastic sparkling water bottle (or similar) on the ground, sinking it far enough down so that the bottle opening is just proud of the soil surface and fill with some beer which attracts the slugs - what a way to go!!
- Try to encourage hedgehogs, frogs, toads and thrushes into your garden - they all enjoy a meal of succulent slugs and snails.

Easter is early this year, so I hope you will be able to use some of the break to get some of the chores done.

CLASSIC CARS WITH CARFAN - THE DUESENBERG MODEL J MURPHY DISAPPEARING TOP CONVERTIBLE COUPE

Top Trumps are guaranteed if you spot the subject of this edition's column and also quite possibly for the longest name for a car EVER. Bonus points possibly too for most valuable car as one sold last year for over one million pounds! Whilst we rightly consider Rolls Royce as the pinnacle of motoring excellence, in America they have a saying to convey the same idea - "It's a Duesy". Rolls Royce would kill for their name to be used in such a

complimentary way.

The company was formed way back in 1913 by brothers August and Frederick Duesenberg making the best and most respected cars of the era. Only 25 of this particular model were made, which isn't exactly surprising as it cost thirteen and a half thousand dollars in 1930 - almost a King's ransom! Of the 25 produced, the owner of this one thinks that only two are still remaining, which isn't a bad rate for such an old car.

The very proud owner was happy to ship his pride and joy all the way from Florida to the Hampton Court concours last year, where brilliant sunshine allowed the public to appreciate its beautiful lines and to learn about its unusual name. We accept cars that have flush flanks with the roof down as commonplace today, but in 1930 it must have been front page news, never mind the little plates that cover the tops of the windows when they are wound down.

The Duesenberg company just about survived the Great Depression of 1929. It was take over by Cord 1926 but went out of business in 1937, becoming yet another famous car company to join the history books.

But let's have no more talk of depression! you should be overjoyed if you see a "Duesy" - and don't forget that cheery Carfan wave!





PRACTICAL MOTORING WITH RICH HAYES - 5 BIG CHANGES YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT

There's plenty changing in the world of motoring this year; our experts have rounded up the ones likely to affect you and your fellow drivers.

New diesel vehicles will pay a higher Vehicle Excise Duty (VED)

From the beginning of April, the Government will be introducing a tax rise for new diesel vehicles that don't comply with Euro 6 engine requirements. At present, there are no diesel vehicles that meet this standard, so unless manufacturers full their fingers out pretty quickly it looks set that all drivers registering a new diesel car will have to pay this.

• More vehicles will be exempt from MOTs

The Department of Transport has issued new regulations that mean cars which are 40 years old or older won't be required to undergo MOT testing. Our advice? If you're driving an old car pretty regularly it's probably best for you to still voluntarily put your vehicle through its MOT - it'll ensure the safety of you and other road users. This new regulation will come into form from 20th May 2018, and the DoT estimates that around half a million older cars will be affected.

· Learner drivers will be allowed on motorways

Up until this year, learner drivers were not permitted to drive on motorways until they had passed their full test, but this new law will allow learner drivers in England, Scotland and Wales to drive on motorways with an approved instructor in a car fitted with dual controls. We're still waiting for the DVSA to confirm the exact date that this will come into play this year.

• Changes to the UK driving test

Technically the changes to the UK driving test came into play in December 2017, but these will affect all learner drivers this year, so we've included it in our round-up. Read more about what the changes will involve in our blog post at www. beverleymotorworks.co.uk/blogpost



• Watch out for smart motorway rules

Coming into force this March, smart motorway rules on parts of the M1, M4, M6, M25, M42 and M62 will be enforced, meaning drivers could face up to a £100 fine and penalty points if they ignore the red 'X' signs.

SAFETY FIRST WITH BURTON ELECTRICAL

How safe are we in our homes? This week, Andy Burton considers domestic electrics because loose wires cause fires.

Something it's easy to overlook is the electrical installation at our properties. Ideally, domestic electrics should be tested at an interval of 10 years after first installation and every 5 years thereafter. Having a periodic inspection and test on your property is like giving your electrical installation a service and health check - similar to a car's MOT.


A qualified electrician will conduct various tests which will help detect issues which can then be rectified. For example, the tests can determine the condition of your wiring and accessories and if wires have become loose in the consumer unit or in the wiring installation overall. If you have a modern

consumer unit (a type of distribution board which is a component of an electrical power system within which an electrical power feed provides supply to subsidiary circuits, commonly referred to as a 'fuse box') you may already have residual current devices (RCDs) which will also require testing.

An RCD, or residual current device, is a life-saving device which is designed to prevent you from getting a fatal electric shock if you touch something live, such as a bare wire. RCDs offer a level of personal protection that ordinary fuses and circuit-breakers cannot provide.

Andy's Top Tip - To ensure RCDs operate correctly, press the blue 'test' button on your consumer unit quarterly. This protects the mechanism and ensures the RCD operates correctly!

HULL4HER0ES

Paul Matson set up Hull4Heroes to help demobbed soldiers who find it difficult to settle back into civilian society. He understands what it can be like, because he struggled when he left the Army. He now has insight into why he struggled and is using his skills in a positive way to help others.

When Paul left the Army, he ended up drinking and homeless. A relative found him and took him under his wing. Another relative gave him a job in construction which gave him a purpose and a reason to live. He has never forgotten their support. He realised he needed to be in charge and set up his own company, building conservatories. When DIY SOS helped an ex-soldier 3 years ago, he did as much as he could to get involved which resulted in DIY SOS invited him to go to Manchester where they were helping other veterans where he realised that he wasn't along - there are many soldiers who struggle when they leave the Army and the armed services. One day, Paul was driving along Preston Road in Hull when he spotted some derelict houses. He put a post out suggesting that these properties could be converted to homes for veterans - the post went viral! There were lots of offers of help! Paul set up the charity, Hull4Heroes to buy the houses, renovate them and now 12 veterans have moved in.

The latest project is to set up a Veterans' Village on Priory Road; Hull4Heroes has already bought the land and there is a team of people writing bids for grants and approaching other sources of cash to help fund the build - any monies raised from the Anytime Fitness Cycle Ride will be put towards this, too. It is hoped the Veterans' Village will become a blueprint for other Vets' Villages, which will help ex-forces personnel transition between their old lives in uniform and civilian life. Paul asks that as many people as possible sponsor the riders and contribute towards this much-needed cause.

BEVERLEY COMMUNITY LIFT - BCL

BCL provide a caring and sustainable transport service for anyone in our community who needs help to combat social and rural isolation. The charity is there for people who cannot use other means of transport regardless of age, ability, background or financial means. The charities' volunteers take people shopping or to medical appointments and also to social events organised by the charity.

BCL owns several mini-buses to enable some of the 20,000 trips undertaken each year. Each mini-bus has to be road-worthy and have disabled access. BEVERLEY AND EAST RIDING GOLF CLUB

Beverley man, Richard Pace, is very proud to have been appointed to the role of Golf Professional at arguably Yorkshire's oldest golf club. He's one of the younger breed of professionals who are changing the perceptions of golf - which is why it is rapidly becoming the sport to be enjoyed by both sexes of any age.

Richard is one of those lucky people who is good at any sport. He's played cricket, rugby union and rugby league (he was chosen to play for the county at Rugby League and had a try-out for Yorkshire in his teenage years) as well as golf and believes that, to be a good sportsman, its important to understand many sports so that you become a well-rounded individual.

He first fell in love with golf when he saw it being played on the TV at age 13; his Godfather played, he had a go at Hall Garth Park, joined Hornsea Golf Club where he was tutored by Stretton Wright, Head PGA Professional and Director of Golf at Hornsea and has kept playing.

CYCLING WITH WILSONS WHEELS - THE TOUR DE YORKSHIRE RIDES AGAIN!

The Tour de Yorkshire is now in its 4th year and is becoming a wellestablished event in the pro cycling calendar. Rather than being held over three days like last year, 2018's edition will be held over four days, from 3rd - 6th of May, with four different stages and eight different start and finish locations, including Beverley.

Beverley is to be the host town for the start of Stage 1 of the race on 3rd May. This gives everyone in Beverley the opportunity to get up close to the teams and riders, either on the start line or by watching them sign on. You could even hang around the team coaches, looking for possible autographs of any budding future cycling stars!

Not only does the race start in Beverley, the route also heads out to Hornsea and then comes back through Beverley, meaning that you'll be able to watch the riders come past twice and see even more of the race. This is an ideal opportunity to get a glimpse of the early parts of the first stage and is a rare chance to do so as usually such races head off in one direction, never to be seen again. This route, however, really favours spectators in Beverley.

Normally, in order to get the best view and to see as much of the race as possible, I would recommend standing on one of the top climbs, to see the peloton come by at a slower speed. This is because when the riders are racing on the flat, they can speed by in a matter of seconds and you could have been waiting at the side of the road patiently for hours, for only a five second glimpse of these superhuman athletes.

If you don't therefore watch the race come through Beverley on both occasions, then my other recommendation would be to watch it at the top of Kilnwick Percy, near Pocklington. Not only is it a great view from the top of the Vale of York but the riders should also come past at a more sedate pace, making it a great spot to spectate.

This month I am going to give you some advice on taking the perfect landscape picture so when you go on your holidays or just a day out you will have the perfect picture, without those blurry pictures you often see.

Photographing landscapes often means shooting in low light at either end of the day.

A tripod is an essential piece of equipment unless you have a steady hand to help keep the camera steady, there's nothing worse then getting home to find out that your shots have been ruined by camera shake.

Plan a trip to a location carefully beforehand, making sure to check factors such as tide times if you're planning a coastal area.

Slow down and think about each shot. It's far better to come away with one or two great shots than hundreds of mediocre ones. Review each shot after shooting, checking it's sharp where it should be.

But SEND adults are frequently excluded, not only from making music, but from attending musical events due to transport costs, facilities at venues or the prejudices of other music-goers when SEND adults do not conform to social 'norms'. Music Living currently facilitates music classes for SEND adults in and around Beverley. Some of these people plus a SEND rock band from London and a children's choir will be performing in the concert on Saturday 15th September. On Friday 14th September, professional artists and musicians from The Westwood Sessions will entertain all-comers in a SEND-friendly venue.



She is working with Beverley Community Lift to help with transport, but there are other costs involved and she is asking for help from the local community. 
