A member of staff and former student at East Riding College, Kirsty Young has won the 2021 Festival of Learning 'Return to Learning' Award.

The national Festival of Learning Awards celebrate learning and its benefits and aim to encourage and inspire those that do not already take part in learning. Festival of Learning award winners showcase the wide-ranging impacts learning has on individuals, families, communities and employers. Kirsty was nominated by the Helena Kennedy Foundation, a charity that awarded her a bursary to continue her learning journey at university providing financial support and mentoring. Kirsty has recently raised over £3000 for the Foundation in order to fund a bursary to support another student progressing to university this year.

Kirsty was a victim of child grooming from the age of fourteen and suffered domestic and sexual violence as a result. For four years she had no contact with her family or the outside world. By the time she was nineteen she had two children, was pregnant for the third time and found herself facing homelessness.

At that point her family found out about her situation and she was re-introduced back to them. However, by this time she had suffered so much abuse, she was suicidal and was suffering depersonalisation disorder and was on the anorexic scale. She eventually moved to her own home under police protection in 2007. Encouraged by her mum, she joined East Riding College to do a level one in health and social care.

During her time at the College she learned how to communicate with others and gained some self-confidence. Her learning journey took off from there, and with the encouragement and support of the staff at the College and her family and friends, she moved through the qualification levels until she was able to progress to university.

Kirsty says, "Initially my motivation for learning was to try to build some self-esteem and to re-learn how to fit in within society after being isolated and controlled for so long. I wanted to provide a future for my children to give them the best start in life and free them from hardship. I wanted my children to have opportunities to be happy and to succeed. I had fantastic supporters at the College who could see my potential even when I couldn't, such as my guidance officer who provided me with much needed motivation when I didn't see my own value.

"As I progressed, my motivation and hopes were to succeed in education so that in the future, I could work in a role supporting young people to help them succeed in life and achieve their best outcomes. I wanted to make a positive difference to people's lives. Learning has changed my life forever. It has given me a future full of opportunities and possibilities. I didn't think I was clever enough to achieve in anything, so university wasn't even a consideration. Learning has taught me education is for everyone. It has helped me grow as a person and allowed me to gain confidence and learn my own value. The qualifications I gained mean I can work as a Learning Support Advisor. I support students who have additional needs such as learning and physical disabilities, in a wide variety of subjects on their learning journeys.

"I meet many students who have had negative learning or life experiences which affects their views of education and themselves. I try to inspire students with my own story and teach them that they can achieve. My learning journey has ultimately influenced my own children and they too have a positive attitude towards learning with goals of their own for their futures."

Shahida Aslam, Director of Operations at the Helena Kennedy Foundation said: "We are blown away by Kirsty's ambition and motivation to develop herself. For a long time she had very little



confidence and no self-worth yet with support and encouragement, and her own determination, she has achieved so much. The Helena Kennedy Foundation exists to overcome social injustice by providing financial bursaries, mentoring and support to disadvantaged further education students just like Kirsty - people facing significant barriers to continuing or returning to education. She is an excellent ambassador for the charity and we're delighted her progress on her learning journey has been recognised by the Festival of Learning Award."

In September 2020, Kirsty was accepted onto a PGCE course, with the aim of becoming a teacher for those with learning disabilities. She put her plans on hold due to COVID-19 restrictions but her learning journey will continue when she starts the course in September 2021.

In the future Kirsty hopes to do a Masters degree at the University of Hull in Special Educational Needs, Inclusion and Diversity.

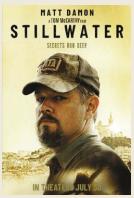

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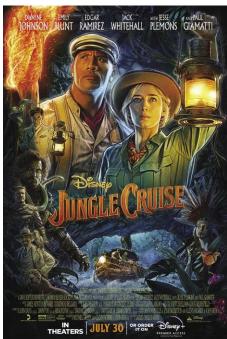

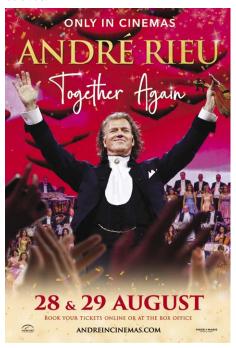

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COUNTRYSIDE MATTERS

One of the young farmers I met whilst out in Rhodesia moved to UK many years ago and came to stay recently. She had been back there again several years ago for a final visit and was disappointed with the way things have turned out with farms now mostly derelict.

Very upsetting that this has been allowed to happen to the former breadbasket of Africa?



I have previously mentioned about the excellent farming there and the huge exports they had, including tobacco, which I guess would now have been in decline even if the former excellent farming had been kept on

The very first freezer lorry in Africa, a Leyland from UK, was delivered whilst we were there to take their many products to the nearest port, and a Farmall tractor from America appeared at their excellent Agricultural College near Salisbury, their former Capital City, now called Harare.

The college was also for African workers to gain experience to be able to either work their own plot if they had one, or to become foremen for some of the larger European-run estates. Everything was being done to help them not only help the established and fast developing industry, but for those who could, to help themselves also.

They had something akin to our National Agricultural Advisory Service, but not on the same scale, and the local labour were given the opportunity to partake of this learning to enable them to have good jobs on the larger

Sadly, all that has now gone, and the country is in poverty. It's a great pity as they also had a technical centre that trialled different varieties of crops including cereal crops, but sadly these have also gone.



I remember they had accidentally dug

up some wheat seeds that had been buried very deep and were apparently many years old.

So they had grown them, yes; they germinated even after all that time and were immune to all the then known wheat diseases but did not have a great yield, so it made me think that at one time they had been a country looking



Some 25 years ago, I was invited to go back to talk to the then 15 remaining farmers, after careful consideration I declined as I prefer to remember Southern Rhodesia as it was in its heyday.

Next month, Denmark.

Over the five hour period, Harry amassed a total of 85.225kg which was an incredible 63kg more than 2nd place and making it the biggest win margin and cemented peg 12 into the history books.

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COMPLETING THE MINSTER WAY



STAGE 4, KEXBY TO YORK MINSTER: 12 MILES.

This concluding section of the glorious long distance path connecting our two great minster churches would normally be an undemanding walk over pleasant farm land, but not when undertaken in searing 31 degree heat!

Luckily, there is plenty of woodland en route to shade the foolish walker and it did make my arrival under the Rose Window all the sweeter for having laboured through the boiling afternoon of Saturday July 17th.

1 The walk is ideally tailored for using the hourly EYMS X46 bus, alighting at Kexby and returning from the city centre. Surprisingly, the route first heads north alongside the care home, then takes a pleasant dog-leg route through pine woods back to the busy A1079; what a joy it is to escape the noise of the traffic.

Cross the road with great care at Scoreby Lodge, follow the signed track and then heads south towards Elvington.

At White Carr Farm you traverse the track of the former Derwent Valley Light Railway, which opened in 1912 and did not fully close until 1981. It followed a sleepy rural route between Selby and York, and was endearingly dubbed the Blackberry Line. Take care to follow the signs through nice woodland where I rested and drank my first gulps of the 2 litres of water I had thankfully packed.

Go right at Kexby Stray Farm, then soon turn right for a short 500 yard section on the verge of the fairly busy B1228, following the signed path on your left at Gipsey Wood Farm. The next two miles make for lovely walking through a tunnel of trees, then alongside a drain.

4 The route to Fulford Golf Course is well signed and pleasant,

and the vast open grasslands of Tillmire are a nice surprise. I shared the shade afforded by one of its few trees with a flock of very hot sheep. Although we are now just a few miles from York, you are most unlikely to meet many people here.

5 The Way skirts the edge of this highlyregarded and attractive course. You then

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have a choice of routes to safely cross the thundering traffic of the by-pass. The original route does so over the access road to the course, but then requires 400 nerve-jangling yards walking south alongside the road. I chose the suggested 1 mile diversion via tracks to White House Farm.

6 Just past the farm on the right by an attractive house, a rough lane leads you up and over the by-pass. Be careful though as it is not signed and easy to miss. I did, and the long plod back in the searing sun was not pleasant.

After the bridge, your route takes you into the centre of Fulford through a housing development. Turn left at the road junction onto the main road through Fulford. At the first pub, head left down to the River Ouse. There are many good period buildings here, notably the former church which has been converted into a striking house. There are also pubs and shops if refreshments are needed. On the river meadows and marshes, in 1066 a major battle was fought in the conflicts which were soon to lead to the arrival of Norman rule in England; it marked the last Viking victory on our soil.

(3) Turn right along one of the riverside paths that head to the centre of York. You soon pass the splendid Millennium foot bridge. Keep alongside the river until you reach the often flooded Kings Arms by Ouse Bridge. Turn right here and head through the maze of fascinating streets that wind over to the imposing Minster -Coppergate, Pavement, The Shambles, then

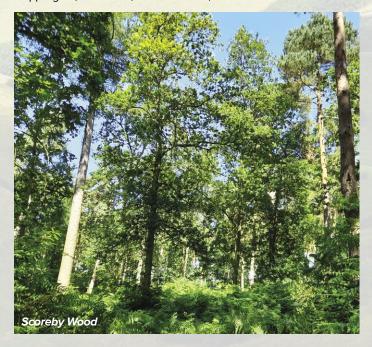


Goodramgate, is my preferred route. It is important to touch the south doors under the imposing Rose Window as this marks the definitive end of the Way. I have been visiting York regularly for over 40 years; its delights are many, but I had never arrived on foot before and that gives this special city an even greater thrill, for you got there under your own steam.

Next month, a nice short ramble over tranquil countryside to Arram. Hopefully in somewhat cooler weather!

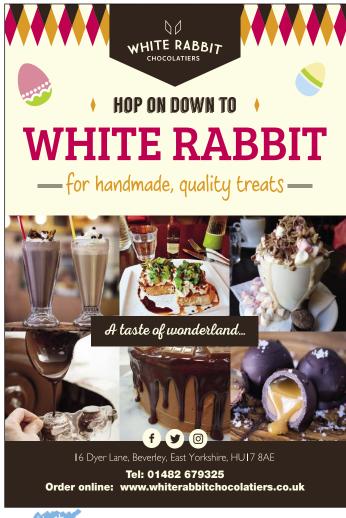

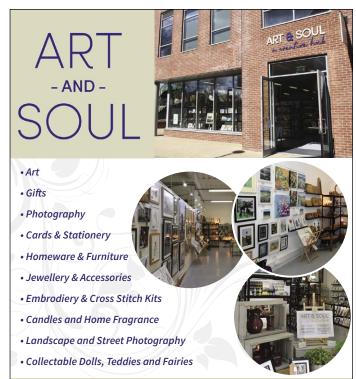

POEM BY CLINT WASTLING -SUSSURATION

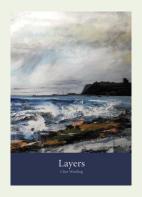


I rest my weary head and watch the sky, forget my worries, listen, breathe to the rhythm, my finger held steady charting direction in the push of clouds.

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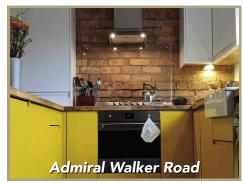
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August is at the heart of the silly season when the media is usually short of hard news, but this year has been an exception.

One thing that has not changed, however, is our ability to talk about the weather. We seem to have an insatiable appetite for information about an aspect of our daily living that we can do nothing

I am well aware that climate change is a reality and it is without a doubt having a big difference on the world's climate, but I am thinking about the more mundane aspect of how the topic of the weather will come into most people's conversations.

If you are stuck for something to say to a person you meet for the first time, talking about the weather is a safe way to start. We are inundated with information from a plethora of forecasters and we must have, of course, the local as well as the national weather forecasts. The strange thing is, in that conversation I mentioned above, many will claim not to believe what they have heard.

They would rather rely on old sayings such as 'if all cows are lying down, it's going to be fine' or 'if



rain is coming'. A strange one is, 'it's looking black over Bob's mother's' - there are slight variations depending on where you live.

If all that is written above is done with a 'slight tongue in cheek' what follows is also part of our English heritage but of a much more serious

I'm sure you have all been asked at some point in your life what would you have been doing if you were not in your current job. I usually answer that by stating clearly what I would not be doing.



I consider the fishermen and women of England have one of the most dangerous jobs imaginable coping with the cruel sea.

So the fishing forecast, which can still be heard four times a day on Radio 4 (but mainly on long wave which transmits further distances) is vital to those who go into deep waters around our shores.

For over 150 years the forecast has contained information supplied by the UK's Meteorological Office enabling fishermen to know in advance



what they can expect in the coming hours. It's so very different to the daily forecasts we hear as it contains wind speeds, cloud cover, air pressure and numerous other figures that only those out on high seas need to know. There are specific areas around the British Isles with names familiar to many, such as Fasnet, Viking, German Bight, Cromarty, Fitzroy, Faroes, and many more.

The first person to publish a weather forecast was Admiral Robert Fitzroy, a talented navigator, seaman, surveyor, and one time captain of Darwin's HMS Beagle, but nothing changes. In the same way that we today are critical of weather forecasters, scientists poured derision on Fitzroy's forecasts and he was forgotten. Now an area of the shipping forecast is named after him and the HQ's of the Met Office is on Fitzroy Road.

Captain Tom, that most famous of Yorkshire men during the pandemic, offered us the best forecast, 'tomorrow is going to be a good day' (whatever the weather!)



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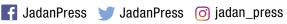
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RFAN - THE SHELBY FORD

To paraphrase a well-known retailer, this isn't just a Ford Mustang, this is a Shelby Ford Mustang.

The Mustang wasn't exactly a slow car in the first place, but after Texan automotive designer Carroll Shelby breathed his magic on it, suddenly a good car became a very good car. Its reputation was forever sealed after Steve McQueen drove a GT version in the film Bullitt and to a lesser extent when Nicholas Cage drove one in the film Gone in 60 seconds. This is one car that makes a lovely, if discordant, "burble", but even this was not good enough for the producers of Bullitt who overdubbed it with that of a Ford GT.



Built from 1965 to 1967 before Ford took over production, power came from a 4.7 litre V8 engine with manual and automatic transmissions being available so performance was

nothing if not brisk. The Mustang Owners Club of Great Britain is a small but enthusiastic group of owners who offer help and advice to keep these wonderful machines on the road, and membership is advised to help locate those difficult to obtain parts. Many, many versions have been produced and indeed it is possible to buy a new one today, but they arguably don't come close to the purity of the originals. Provenance can add a lot of value to a car and the one Steve McQueen drove sold for \$3.4 million in 2020 while one of the versions from the Nicholas Cage film sold for \$1 million in 2013.

To buy one without such esteemed provenance doesn't take such deep pockets, but expect to pay between £35,000 and £145,000 in the UK currently, with only a few from the 1960s to choose from. Should you see a "cool dude" vainly trying to impersonate Steve McQueen in this car, don't forget that cheery Carfan wave!

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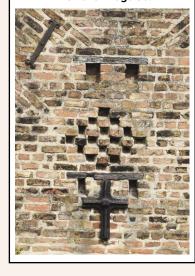

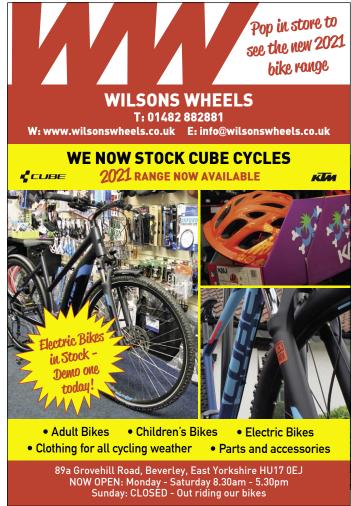

EXERCISE DURING PREGNANCY

Can you exercise during or after pregnancy?

Many women want to maintain a certain level of fitness and stay active during their pregnancy. Others are keen to regain their fitness afterwards. Contrary to what some might think, it is possible to maintain some level of exercise during much of the pregnancy. It also shouldn't take too long to regain an active healthy lifestyle afterwards. Of course, it has to be done with care and many people in this situation will seek out specialist training, so they know what to do. Whether you want to train women in this situation or want to know more about this type of exercise and what is recommended, this post is for you.



Can you exercise during pregnancy?

People used to think that you couldn't exercise during pregnancy. The belief was that exercise might adversely affect the outcome of the pregnancy and even the quality and quantity of breast milk. It's now generally accepted that exercise during pregnancy is not dangerous and can actually have some positive effects, with some evidence to suggest it may help you cope with labour and more easily adapt to a changing body shape. Of course, how much exercise someone goes for will differ depending on their circumstances and on how active they were prior to being pregnant. Determining a suitable level of exercise and training women at their own pace is one of the things we cover in our course for trainers supporting pre and postnatal clients.

How soon after pregnancy can you start exercising?

Another thing that many women want to know is how soon after pregnancy they can start exercising. Again, the answer will depend on the nature of the pregnancy and whether there were any complications during birth. Prematurely taking part in vigorous exercise could also cause problems down the line, so care should be taken in this area. That said there's nothing stopping women who've just given birth from doing partial and light exercise, as soon as they feel comfortable. If you're looking to get back to the gym and take part in more high impact exercise, the NHS recommends waiting until your 6 week postnatal check to commence with this. Of course, complications in birth or a caesarean birth would mean a longer recovery may be required. Talk to your health professional to determine what's best for you.

What kind of exercise can you do during pregnancy?

So, what can you actually do whilst you're pregnant? In the later stages of pregnancy certain things are off the table. We'd definitely recommend a break from Rugby... But a lot of things are ok early on. Typically, pre-natal exercises include low intensity strengthening of muscles, particularly in the pelvic floor and other areas linked to pregnancy. Kneeling and sitting exercises are also popular, as well as training that focuses on flexibility. Many of these help with preparation for labour. Exercising in water is often used for this kind of training as the water can take some of the weight of the bump and makes use of a wide range of muscles. It's important that the water isn't too hot though and in general all these exercises should be controlled and regulated, adjusting for each person.

What kind of exercise can you do after pregnancy?

Getting back into a normal routine may take some time but there are ways of easing back into an exercise regime. During most professional training the client's condition will be closely monitored to establish an acceptable level. Core and abdominal strengthening exercises will form the bulk of the training



as well as postural awareness and general strengthening. Gentle stretching may be included and a gradual return to higher impact and resistance exercise.

What is covered in a qualification for supporting pre and postnatal clients?

IN THE GARDEN... AUGUST

Welcome to August - whether you are going away or staying at home this August the list of things 'to do' in the garden is minimal, so, sit back and enjoy the fruits of your labour.

Tasks and Tips for August... staying at home

- Water all containers every day and feed regularly (early morning or evening is best).
- Lightly trim hedges and Lavender bushes once the flowers have finished (this isn't essential as finches love the seeds).
- Pick courgettes whilst they are still small and tender.
- Pinch out tomato side shoots and runner beans when they reach the top of the cane.
- Prune raspberries and gooseberries after fruiting.
- Mow the lawn but don't cut it too short and don't apply lawn treatments in hot dry weather or the grass will be scorched.
- Roses stop feeding them as any lush new growth will not have time to ripen before the winter. Prune the long old stems of rambling roses when they have finished flowering, leave those that have not flowered this year to bloom next summer.
- If you have Camellias, Azaleas or Rhododendrons water them well in dry weather otherwise the flower buds for next year may not develop properly. To boost growth feed them a liquid ericaceous feed.

Tasks and Tips for August... going away?

- Arrange holiday care for your garden if you are going away try and arrange for a friend or neighbour to come round and water your containers, if you have vegetables ask them to 'help themselves' to produce too! If they can't come every day, take steps to cut down on watering requirements by moving all containers and hanging baskets out of the sun as far as possible also larger containers require watering less frequently so, if you know that you go away a lot invest in some larger containers. Clay pots can be stood on trays filled with wet gravel. If you have a very elaborate summer display with window-boxes and hanging baskets, it would be worth considering installing an automatic watering system controlled by a timer or self-watering systems (or make your own from plastic bottles and hose as I've done, there's plenty of information on the web).
- Mow the lawn before going on holiday don't give it 'a short back and sides', because if there is a dry spell while your away you'll return to a 'brown lawn'.

And a timely reminder... for all the gardeners who rush out to buy 'spring flowering' daffodils and tulips etc. in the spring when they are flowering. The bulbs for these will start to be stocked in garden centres, nurseries and other retail outlets from the middle of August. If you want hyacinths flowering in the house for Christmas, now is the time to buy your prepared hyacinth bulbs. Prepared hyacinths have simply been conned into thinking they have had a 'winter' (by placing them in a cold store) so when you plant them up in bowls they think it is spring and start growing - clever heh!

That's all for now - have a lovely time this August.

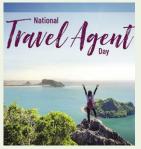
