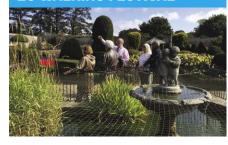

### FURLOUGH SCHEME CONTINUES UP UNTIL SEPTEMBER

The Government's Furlough Scheme is currently set to continue up to the end of September 2021, with HMRC not yet having advised if this is to continue any further beyond this date (at the time of going to print).

Under the Furlough Scheme, employers have to pay employees 80% of the agreed rate of pay, of which 60% is to be reclaimed back from HMRC. Employers are still able to claim back any SSP relating to Covid illnesses or isolation up to a maximum of 2 weeks per employee in total.

The scheme was initially extended earlier in the year during Chancellor Rishi Sunak's Budget

announcement on March 3. It was stated that the scheme, which pays employees' wages for the hours they can't work during the pandemic, would help people through these past challenging months.

From July 1, the level of grant was reduced each month and employers were asked to contribute towards the cost of their furloughed employees' wages.

It is yet to be decided when furlough ends later this month whether the government will decide to revisit the Job Support Scheme should any further lockdowns be imposed.

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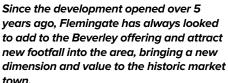
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### FLEMINGATE DELIV

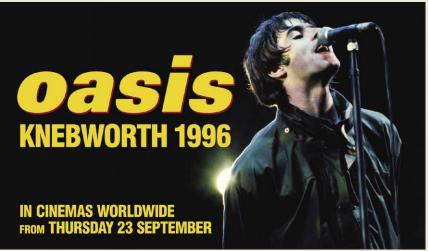

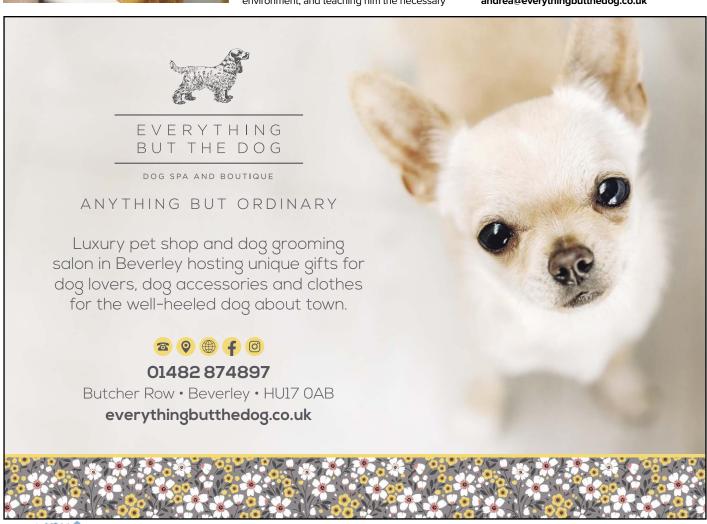


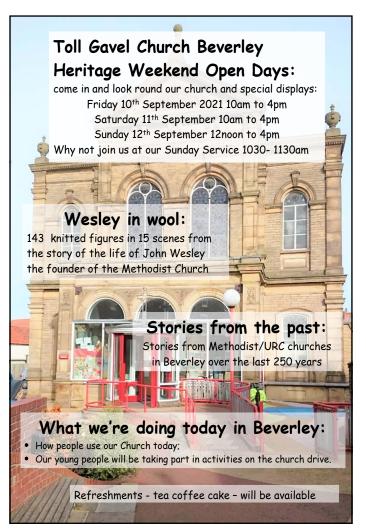

### **AMBLING AROUND ARRAM**



Although lying barely 3 miles from Beverley, I would venture to suggest that very few of us know the tiny village of Arram and its surrounding countryside.

Somewhat incredulously, its 200 or so inhabitants do have a rail station, although the service is conspicuously limited. There is, however, an excellent series of footpaths and some fabulous wildlife to enjoy in its environs.

This gentle, surprisingly varied, 4 mile amble to and from Hull Bridge is perfect for late summer.

Start your walk on the west side of Hull Bridge, across the river from the popular pub. To access, there is parking, a short bus ride from Beverley, or very pleasant walking across Swine Moor. Both sides of the bridge have interesting plaques; the eastern one is in memory of those killed in a WW2 air crash here.

It is wonderful to see the Crown and Anchor trading again, perhaps ideal for your postwalk refreshment. Cross the style, pass

under the road bridge and walk atop the river embankment - this affords good views back to town.

In 600 yards you will see a metal footbridge crossing the drain, which allows you to explore the lovely Storkhill Woods.

Cross the bridge and take a most pleasant anti-clockwise stroll on the clear path, you pass some lovely wetland.

The wood is about 20 years old and much more mature than when I first knew it. It is a tonic in an area with very little woodland, an in spring is full of birdsong.



(3) Return to the river embankment, heading north upriver. The traffic noise will now have gone, across the River Hull is the splendid Pulfin Bog Nature Reserve and large lake, but there is no access from this side.

Here, I saw a heron and many wild geese. Pass through 2 stiles and in less than a mile

you cross a footbridge where Arram Beck joins the river.

A Now follow the grassy track left to the farm, again forking left at the next gate and passing through the farmyard, proceeding into the village on the road. There are some lovely buildings in what is really only a hamlet, notably handsome Whitewater Farm.

It is striking to see a lovely old red phone box so close to the KCOM area; it is now put to splendid use as a book exchange. You soon reach the tiny village green with a handy seat. Cross over the railway past the fine former-stationmaster's house.

5 Take the clear path to your left on the western side of the track. This is a pleasant route through trees, passing ponds to the

rear of the Leconfield base. This track, part of the Minster Way, will take you all the way back to Beverley, but to return to Hull Bridge, take the path over the railway at point 6.

6 Follow the dogleg route, past Arram Grange, over and down the drain, back to the river bank and head south to Hull Bridge. On recent walks in the area I have seen foxes, buzzards,



owls; sadly no otters as yet, but they are there. In early August I was drawn back by reported sightings of the rare black stork, but I did not see one.

Arram is mentioned by Flanders and Swann in their beautiful song Slow Train, a eulogy to lines and stations due to be closed in the 1960s by the infamous

Dr. Beeching (available on YouTube.)

Somehow Arram survived, I really must carefully check the timetable and buy a return ticket very soon, for there are more paths to explore to the north towards Aike where a vineyard will be open to the public as part of the fabulous Heritage Open Day programme in mid-September.

# VOAKSEPTEMBER 2021

This September, the Yorkshire Wolds once again plays host to the 11th Walking East Yorkshire Festival brought together by tourism partners and volunteers across East Yorkshire.

Showcasing over 100 outdoor activities including specialist guided walks, boating, horse riding and cycling.

The focal point of the Festival this year is a trek along the Centenary Way footpath. Starting in Filey, the 83 mile route sweeps through the chalk hills of the Yorkshire Wolds, passing the WANDER project Enclosure Rites artwork at Wintringham and Wharram Percy medieval village, before finishing in the City of York. The walk will take place over seven days of the Festival, covering approximately twelve miles per day.

For those who enjoy a slightly less ambitions trek, the ramblers invite us to some taster sessions, including a coastal walk from **Danes Dyke** to the **Flamborough Head Peninsula** taking in spectacular views of the Heritage Coast Line.

Guided walks around our historic stately homes are always popular, so these have been extended to include the palladian mansion of Everingham Hall near Pocklington. Part of the Historic Houses network, we are invited to take a tour of the principal reception rooms and nearby Chapel of Saint Mary and Everilda. Sledmere House will once again be opening their doors with an informative tour of the house focusing on the history of the Sykes family. Tickets allow you access to the grounds for the entire day, which will allow you to explore the walled garden, parkland and indulge in a spot of shopping at The Woodyard, home, gift and garden store. Join one of Burton Constable's guides on a 'behind the scenes' tour of the Hall in rooms not usually open to the public. You can also spend the rest of the day exploring the many trails around the estate at your leisure. Wassand Hall are once again joining us to providing a tour of their regency House, finishing off with a walk exploring the woodlands and arboretum, with views across Hornsea Mere. Secrets of Sewerby Hall and Gardens offers a rich history tour of the hall and grounds.

Driffield Navigation Trust invite us aboard the 'Lady Jayne' on the Driffield Canal. The cruise takes you from Frodingham Landing southwards towards Bethells Bridge at Hempholme.

Pocklington Canal Amenity Society will once again be hosting two trips aboard the 'New Horizons' narrowboat where you can spot wildlife along the way.

Walking the Town Beverley will be hosting their usual comprehensive list of guided history walks including Larkin about Beverley which tells the story of Philip Larkin, who was a frequent visitor to Beverley for over 30 years.

A Walk of Small Things brings to life small details that you may walk past every day and not have seen or Over 500 years of history in less than 500 steps takes you on a short history walk with masses of information about the town's past. Those interested in the painters Fred and Mary Elwell can enjoy a walk and talk looking at the places linked to the Elwell family in Beverley and finishing off at the garden of Bar House - Fred's home for 44 years!

**Pocklington** will once again be walking in the footsteps of the **Pilgrimage of Grace** uprising on one of its main routes, from the Wolds Heritage Centre in Warter and taking in some breath taking scenery on a route back to Pocklington.

New events to the Festival this year include an **Outdoor YOGA** and a soundbath experience which will be held at the **Grand Lodge of Oaklands**, a magical wedding venue set amongst 20 acres of beautiful woodland along the River Hull.

If it's an evening stroll you are interested in, join the team at **RSPB Bempton** for a dusk walk along the white cliffs where you will be able to spot local seabirds, catch a glimpse of porpoises and spot the UK's smallest bats with the reserve's new bat detector!

Other Festival highlights include the popular **Boots and Beer Walk** along a section of the Yorkshire Wolds Way and finishing off with a buffet at Wold Top Brewery.





For those with an interest in fine wine, join the National Trails Ranger for a circular walk around South Cave finishing off at **Little Wold Vineyard** where you will have the opportunity to learn about the vines and indulge in a spot of wine tasting.

For ladies looking to get back in the saddle and make new friends join the **Breeze Cycling Ladies** on a number of taster events, taking in some pretty country roads across the East Riding and finishing off with a well-deserved refreshment break.

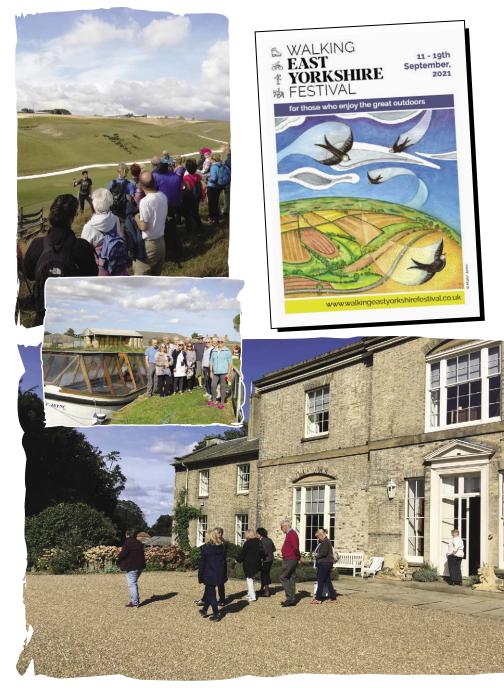
Other walking delights include a Wander of Wolds Wonders, The Chalk Land around Warter and the Geo park around Thixendale where you will receive an insight into the archaeology and geology of the Yorkshire Wolds.

Visit Driffield and take in a circular trod along a section of the new hugely successful **Wold Ranger Way** – a new 43 mile circular challenge around Driffield and the surrounding countryside, which pays homage to a nomadic tribe of farm hands living off the land on the Yorkshire Wolds.

For families, a trip to **Bridlington Kite Festival** is a must with vibrant kites soaring high over Sewerby Fields. You may also enjoy a guided walk through the **Humber Bridge Country Park** with a visit the newly opened **Hessle Whiting Mill** on the foreshore of the River Humber, or a children's quiz along **Beckside in Beverley** created by the Beverley Ramblers.

Enjoy a do-it-yourself walk with the 'What was here?' App. Accessed on your smartphones, the app can be used at various locations across the East Riding to uncover past surroundings from where you are standing. This includes photography and historic maps.

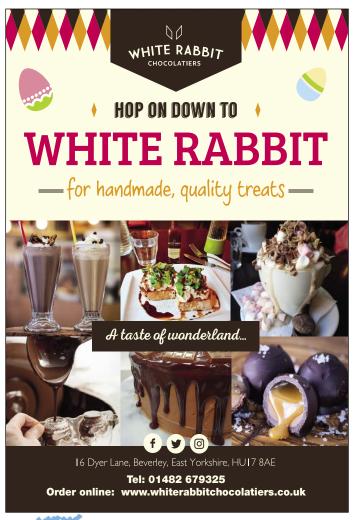

Paul too was gasping as he awoke from his catatonic state. Whether it was an accident or a suicide attempt Ivor never found out. He left the neighbour to deal with the broken door and a recovering Paul. A puzzled frown crossed his face as he walked away.

In the mist at the top of the Munro, the grey-haired lady smiled to herself. Her plan, she was sure, had worked. Ivor had been her instrument in extending her husband's life.

The plaque now simply read:

'You are now at the peak of Ladhar Bheinn Munro: 1020 metres (3346 feet) Life is what you make it'

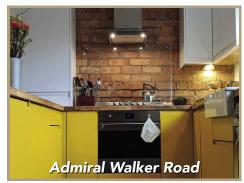
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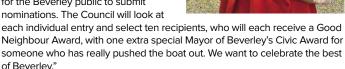

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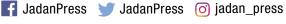
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### - THE VOLVO AMAZ

Anyone who has been fortunate enough to have been saved from injury by a seatbelt shouldn't really be thanking the seatbelt manufacturer, but Volvo, as it was them who came up with the idea and somewhat altruistically chose not to patent it so that other car companies could install seat belts at no extra cost.

The safety ethos has continued and today Volvo is synonymous with safety and durability and one such car, the Volvo Amazon, is the subject of this month's column.

Manufactured from 1956 to 1970 with an amazing 667,000 being produced in Sweden as well as Belgium, Canada and South Africa, a significant amount are still on the road. which is testimony to



their famed ruggedness. The featured car is also known as a 122S and was manufactured in 1966. It has had an awful lot of love and money spent on it, so it comes as no surprise that it won the first world Concours Championship in 1990 after being restored in the mid 1980s at 120,000 miles. Presenting with 1782 c.c. and twin carburettors on a straight 4 engine, this Amazon was sold to Brooklands museum and to a museum in the USA before returning to the UK in 2004. The current owner bought it in 2017 and has continued to look after it by rebuilding the carburettors, treating the footwells and floorpan, re-chroming the mirrors and rocker cover and under-sealing where necessary.

Should you fancy one of these on your drive, be prepared to spend upwards of £8000 and a lot more if has been successfully raced or rallied, usually the latter, and the Volvo enthusiasts club will help to keep it on the road.

And don't forget, should you see an Amazon, especially one as pristine as this example, don't forget that cheery Carfan wave!

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### CYCLING WITH WILSON WHEELS

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### COUNTRYSIDE MATTERS WITH SAM WALTON

I have had the pleasure of visiting Denmark on at least 10 or more occasions.

We all know about Danish Bacon as they have advertised and advertised for many years.



I was told by a National Farmers Union past chairman many years ago that after the last war, we gave Denmark 25% of our UK bacon market as compensation for them being overrun by the Germans. There is no doubt they have capitalised on that as their marketing skills are second to none.

I have many friends there and visited a goodly number of pig units, all were immaculate as are most other things there. That is one country where I have only seen graffiti on a special white wall in Copenhagen, where budding artists practice their skills and is whitewashed out every



day. Expensive, yes - very, but the farmsteads are all attractive with gardens and flowers around most homesteads. It is a fairly flat country, so you get a good idea of what the farms are like. They grow similar crops to what we do here but there is just something different about them, I think it is the tidiness of the whole place. They do not have many hedges on farms so I suppose that makes them look a bit tidier.



I am sorry to have to say that this scenario is not repeated everywhere in the UK unfortunately, and my belief has always been that a tidy farm is easier to run than a messy one.

Just imagine having to walk around scrappy old abandoned machinery, plus piles of straw, string and bits of broken wood lying everywhere.

What I was very impressed with was that on every farm I visited, they had superb facilities for the staff, including washing facilities for overalls, tea and coffee machines, flowers surrounding the staff facilities and of course shower in and out.

So far as pigs go, they have always had world-leading genetics and produce a lot of pigs per, sow but at the end of the day their bacon is no better than ours and they were one of the countries that did not do away with sow stalls when we did in 1999 - but that was not European law at that time, just something the UK took up. They are now something to be admired with excellent facilities, but more about that next month.

I do wonder if there is a limit to how many pigs per sow we should be looking at. When I was a lad, having 10 born alive was some achievement. Now we hear about up to 18 or even more being born which requires excellent management and particular feeding skills.

The smaller the weight of the piglet born, the longer it takes to maturity, so that means more food intake. I think it means that for every kilo less weight born takes two weeks longer to slaughter weight and that is at a cost of something like £10 per pig here.

So that means more understanding of sow nutrition to ensure heavier birth weights.



### IN THE GARDEN... SEPTEMBER

September is one of my favourite months in the garden - I look forward to those calm, still mornings with heavy dew and the start of autumnal colours appearing in the borders.

There are still plenty of bright colours to be found in the old favourites of Asters; Dahlias; Chrysanthemums Sedums and Rudbeckia. Fruit is bountiful in September; I always enjoy a few hours in the kitchen pickling pears, some with ginger and some with cinnamon and port. A delicious pudding in the middle of winter, served with pouring cream, vanilla ice cream (or both?!).

#### Tasks for September...

Tasks in September are all about starting to gear up for a change in season and getting prepared for the months to come.

- **Borders** continue to dead head flowers that have faded you are unlikely to encourage any new flowers at this stage of the season, but not having them around will allow those in full flower to be shown off at their best. Start clearing up leaves and debris to prevent disease and pests 'settling in' for the winter.
- **Hedges** trim them for the last time this season, but don't feed them as this will encourage 'soft' growth. If you're considering planting a new hedge over the coming months prepare the site before the really bad weather sets in and the ground is too wet to work.
- Lawns September is a good month to seed a new lawn, but do so earlier rather than later and reseed any bare patches. Established lawns should be aerated and an autumn weed/feed applied.
- **Containers** continue watering, feeding and dead heading seasonal plants in containers, if you do so they should last until the first frosts. However, if they are past their best clear them out and replant with spring bedding plants and under plant with bulbs.
- **Bulbs** buy and plant your spring flowering bulbs. If you are planning on forcing hyacinths for Christmas then this month is your last chance to do so.
- **Ponds** continue to feed fish and thin out any pond and marginal plants that have become congested (or started to take over the pond). Lift the plants and leave them on the side of the pond for a few days before removing them completely this will enable any pond life to safely make their way back into the pond. Cover the pond with netting BEFORE the leaves start to seriously fall.
- Plant prepared bulbs for Christmas flowering Prepared bulbs are simply bulbs that have been put in a cold store and 'duped' into thinking that have had a winter, and when they are planted in the relative warmth in our houses they think it's spring and need to get growing.
- **Dead-head roses** and if rambler and climbing roses have got a bit out of hand, spend a bit of time pruning and tying them in before the winter
- Sow/plant vegetables outdoors there is still time to sow winter lettuce and a last chance to sow spring cabbage. Plant garlic and autumn onion sets too.

I hope the weather is kind to us in September; maybe we will have an Indian Summer this year...

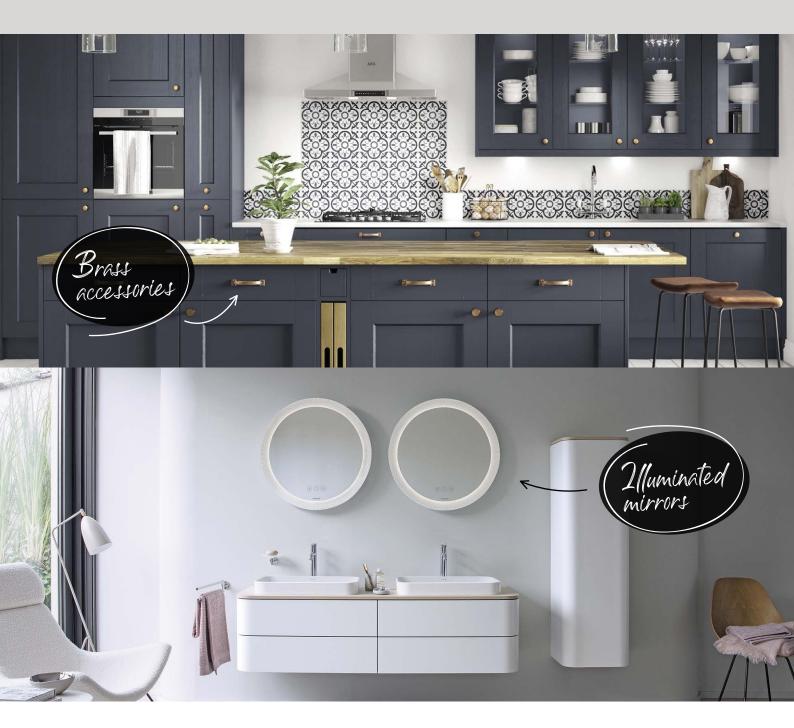
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### I'VE BEEN THINKING... SAYS COLIN RAYNOR



Last month it was the weather, this month another personal topic. The first we talk a lot about, the other we rarely mention, not even to each other in some cases. I'm going to suggest we need to change such habits or we will have problems.

On a recent train journey we purchased drinks from the refreshment trolley. I was a little surprised for

such a small amount when told, "we only accept payment by card". The next customer made his order but when asked to pay stated, "I only have cash", so the request was made by the trolley person for someone to pay for this person's drink with their card and take the man's money. An obliging passenger did help and the trolley rolled on. The fortunate customer then proceeded, in a loud voice, to tell us all that he only dealt in cash and had no bank account.

He worked for a firm who paid him in cash and he had no use for all these plastic cards etc, giving more details of his finances than anybody really wanted to know. He was obviously very pleased with his anonymity. I recalled this man when, in the next few days, I was reading an article that informed me more than a million people in the UK do not have a bank account and so cannot use plastic. Cash is the only way for them.

The rest of us are part of a society that pays by card more and more, and the pandemic has hastened that process with contactless payments replacing cash as been more hygienic. I suspect that this is a situation that will continue and a limit that was once £10 in 2011 will soon rise to £100. Last year a quarter of all payments were made by debit card. Keep that card secure whatever you do and don't forget the pin number!

I became a pensioner around the time that pension books were being fazed out and replaced by, yes you guessed it, plastic cards requiring a pin number. This enabled you to take cash from your pension and other benefits held in your Post Office Card account. Be aware that that system is going to end in November this year. One alternative is that you will be able to collect your money from a shop that displays the PayPoint symbol using your bank debit card only. Not everyone will be able or happy to do that though.

When I recently asked at the Post Office why these changes were being made I was told it is because the Government cannot afford to produce the plastic cards. I take this with a pinch of salt.

Soon after I got my first pension card they were all recalled and reissued with an indentation at the top of the card enabling visually impaired people to put the card in the right way up.

In years to come I'm sure actual cash will be a thing of the past, but for now we should do our best to make access to our money as easy as possible. Open a bank account for your pension to be paid into. The Post Office will provide you with the form to make this transaction. The scarcity of local banks and the decreasing number of cash machines is a problem for many but we must use them or lose them.

### **SEPTEMBER TO BRING BIG IMPROVEMENTS** FOR BEVERLEY AND HORNSEA BUSES

The new Beverley Locals buses will link Molescroft, Butterfly Meadows, East Riding Community Hospital, Swinemoor, Beckside, Lidl, Flemingate and Lincoln Way with Beverley Town Centre, making it much easier to get between all areas of the town.

Great for commuters, day tickets will cost a maximum of £3 on these services, and concessionary passholders travel for free.

At the same time, the Beverley Day Ticket zone will be extended out to Tickton, Leconfield and Woodmansey, bringing with it better value travel options for customers in these villages who need to pop into

The new Beverley Locals buses will also have late night journeys on Fridays and Saturdays, allowing people to get home safely after a night on the town.

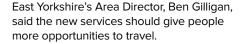
Hornsea will see two new services, with existing Services 240 and 246 replaced by new Services 24 & 25.



Service 24 will provide a service direct from Hornsea to Hull, while new Service 25 will go to Beverley, and then on to Castle Hill Hospital, Willerby, Anlaby and Hessle. Sunday buses between Beverley and Hornsea will also return.

Other services in and around Beverley will also see changes, with new routes and times, including new Service 23 between Beverley and Hull.
