# LLEGE FIRST IN NORTH TO GAIN GOLD ATUS IN FORCES-FRIENDLY SCH

East Riding College is the first college in the North to be recognised as a gold-level employer by the Defence Employer Recognition Scheme.

This award recognises employers that go the extra mile to support their employees who are ex-forces or part of the wider military family such as spouses or cadets.

It also acknowledges the College's work as a training provider to defence personnel leaving the services and the work that the College does to raise awareness amongst its community, as an advocate for armed forces families.

Principal of East Riding College, Mike Welsh said, "I'm delighted East Riding College has won the gold award and we are honoured to be involved in the Armed Forces Covenant. In recent years in particular, we have sought to forge stronger links to support the defence and armed forces community - and our efforts have been recognised through this gold award.

"We are preparing young people to enter the public services and it is only right that we support those who serve and their families as they continue in their careers, and when they return to civilian life.



"Ultimately, it's about inclusion, equality and fairness, and we signed the Armed Forces Covenant to mark our commitment to levelling the playing field for armed forces families. For us, this includes initiatives such as guaranteed interviews

for ex-armed forces applicants."

The College works with the Defence School of Transport at Leconfield and has built a partnership which is of benefit to those both training and teaching there. The commanding officer at the School acknowledged this contribution, which he said they greatly cherished, and thanked the College staff for their dedication and commitment.

The gold award acknowledges the College's forces-friendly attitude, including the offer of a guaranteed interview for service leavers who meet the essential criteria for posts advertised at the College. Reservists can also benefit from additional paid leave to attend training, and service leavers can access training at the College through the ELCAS scheme.

The College is working to improve its support year on year, and has established local links to provide careers advice direct to service leavers, as well as working with other organisations such as Hull 4 Heroes, which aims to help ex-forces personnel transition into civilian life and employment.

## **GOVERNMENT SCHEME CHANGES FROM FURLOUGH TO JOB** SUPPORT SCHEME

#### SUMMARY

Commences 1 November 2020 for 6 months.

- The employer need not have used the CJRS to use the JSS.
- Employee must be on a RTI payroll return on 23 September 2020.

· If redundancy occurred before this date and the employee is now re-employed, they would be eligible.

Claims available from 8 December 2020.

Claim cannot be submitted until wages have been paid and reported under RTI

The employer remains liable for both Employers National Insurance and Pension Contributions



#### **JSS OPEN**

· Open to all employers.

· Employee must work 20% of their contracted hours.

• The government will pay 61.66% of the employee's hours not worked (capped at £1,541.75 per month).

• The employer will pay 5% of the employee's hours not worked (capped at £125 per month).

 Employees will receive 73.33% of their pay where they earn less than £3,125 per month.

· Employer top ups are allowed.

#### JSS CLOSED

• This applies where premises are required to close premises due to coronavirus restrictions (Tier 3).

• The government will pay two thirds of each employees' salary to a maximum of £2,083.33.

#### TRANSPARENCY

· HMRC will publish a list of employers who use the JSS.

· Employees will be able to check if their employer is using the JSS via their personal tax accounts which should prevent employers claiming the JSS and asking the employees to work.

Although the scheme commences on Sunday 1st November, the detail above is subject to change.

# WHAT MAKES A SUCCESSFUL CHOCOLATE PRODUCT?

Chocolate has been around in various forms for hundreds of years, spanning from the ancient Aztecs, through the age of discovery and even now it is still a universally known and loved product. But how do modern chocolatiers keep chocolate interesting in this age of short attentionspans and what makes a successful chocolate product?

We take it as a given that chocolate is one of the most successful confections in history. Despite being centuries old, chocolate has never gone out of style, and chocolatiers have continued to innovate and push the boundaries of chocolate ever since it was brought back from the new world hundreds of years ago. Whether it is its rich cocoa flavour, the deep bitterness or the creamy milkiness, the way it melts or the way it snaps, most of us have a reason we love the stuff. Despite this, chocolatiers have always felt the need to create new products, either to stand out from the crowd in a saturated market or make a name for themselves in the local scene. White Rabbit has been around since 2004 and by now we have had some big successes, and I would like to share with you some of the secrets which we believe make our products so popular!



In the chocolate world we have been winning awards ever since 2009, the first being for our Yorkshire Honeycomb chocolate bar. It wasn't groundbreaking, just delicious creamy milk chocolate of extra fine quality, mixed with a hand-made honeycomb made with Yorkshire Honey- not just glucose or sugar like most people use to keep the price down. By 2014 (and 12 awards later) we finally hit upon our most star-studded chocolate: our Blackcurrant with Juniper Dark Truffle, which got the highest 3 stars in the Great Taste Awards, was one

of the Top 50 foods in the UK, got nominated for a Golden Fork and has an Academy of Chocolate Award to-boot! But even given its popularity, chocolate is still niche, and like every niche success in its own world is not equal to success in the commercial world. So despite all our accolades, as chocolatiers we still need to innovate and try to think outside the box, searching for that 'hero' product which will really propel us to business



success. The same year as our little blackcurrant truffle took the food-world by storm it was the unexpected twist at the end of the year that really opened our eyes to the wider world of commerce. It was our chocolate cat, a cute little mould of which we can only make 8 at a time, complete with a chocolate mouse inside, that was picked up by the Telegraph and featured in their Sunday magazine Christmas gift guide.

Whilst every other company featured pointed towards their website to purchase, we were behind the times, so all we had



was a phone-number. And boy did that phone start ringing. Every hour of the day for a solid month we were answering the phone and taking orders for our chocolate cats. Whether at 6am or 11pm, we were here, making and packing away our cute edible critters for all its fans and picking up the phone for more. So what made it so popular? It wasn't just the gorgeous and rare mould we had, but the humorous pairing of the mouse inside, and the name we gave it: Clever Cat, which really captured the public's imagination. To this day we still make this chocolate cat, and it is still much loved by many of our customers.

Recreating the successes of 2014, which lead us to expansion and the opening of our café in 2016, was a long journey. Around then we started to focus more on our bricks-and-mortar shop and café, trying to capture the local market in the face of a big rival chocolate business moving into our market town. It took a while to find our feet again, and really forge our identity as an independent chocolatier in the new world (for us) of hospitality. But this paved the way for our next really big commercial success: our Hot Chocolate Bomb.

Starting life as a Valentines product, our 'sex bomb' was a sphere of chocolate, filled with treats, with saucy hand-written messages on, designed to smash and share. Over a couple of years it went through a few iterations until we asked ourselves 'what happens if you fill it with marshmallows and drop it in hot milk'? The results were magical. We made a little video, posted it on social media, and didn't think much of it until the orders started coming through. And didn't stop. Over a weekend our video went viral, receiving over 300K views and being shared far and wide. We received enquiries from America and Canada all the way to Australia, and sold far more than we can make in a sensible time. What made this such a popular product, we believe, is the way we managed to capture the excitement of hot chocolate with an experience that can be re-lived over and over again, packaged once again with our unique humorous take on chocolate. It's the look; we go to extra effort to make it look like a bomb with a strawberry lace for the fuse and the word "boom" piped on as a little nod to what's about to happen. It's the anticipation; the way it takes time for the thick shell of chocolate to melt in the hot milk before the "explosion" happens. It's the satisfaction when the bomb finally breaks and all the marshmallows come floating to the surface. And finally, it's the happiness when you stir and enjoy and realise it wasn't just a show, but a premium and delicious hot chocolate made by a small artisan chocolatier. To go one step further we have now had a mug specially designed to sell as a combined gift-pack this Christmas, hopefully capitalising on our success earlier this year to give us the busy season we need this winter.

Next on the horizon, that we hope will continue us on our road to success is our brand new Advent Calendar. Again, we have tried to make this product for several years, at first providing small Christmas themed chocolates for you to make your own calendar, moving over to off-the-shelf advent calendars which we customise and fill with our own treats. But we have never been happy with the end result, and this drove us to innovate our own calendar from the ground up, basing it on our largest box of chocolates at 25 pieces. We have had our design brought to life by a professional Yorkshire based illustrator, had our completely recyclable sleeve & perforated card windows locally made and printed in Hull, and filled it with the best White Rabbit chocolates that are so popular in the artisan chocolate world. With this, we hope to recreate that same excitement, anticipation and satisfaction that made our bombs such a commercial success!

# **BEVERLEY CIVIC SOCIETY'S HISTORY BOARDS: THE FRIARY & EASTGATE BOARD**

On 1 October 2020 the tenth history board was put in place in Eastgate, to replace a damaged board there, close to the footage entry to the Friary and Eastgate site.

It is the last in the present phase of these boards, which have been warmly welcomed by visitors and residents. The planning of these boards began in 2017, under the leadership of John Bird.

Different members of the Society have contributed over the four years, Barbara English, Mike Hildyard, Pam Hopkins, Dick Lidwell, and of course John Bird until his untimely death.



The designs of the later boards have been executed by Kloskk Tyrer, who combines design skills with a wide knowledge of pictorial sources, based on the superb collections of East Riding of Yorkshire Council in the Guildhall, where she works, and in the Treasure House.

Without her help the boards would not have been so successful, and we are grateful to her and to the Museum Service for her time and patience, as the authors changed their minds for the umpteenth time.

For successful they have been. There are boards for North Bar Within, Saturday Market, Wednesday Market, the Minster area, Flemingate, Hall Garth, three identical boards for Westwood, and now the new Friary & Eastgate addition.

As you walk around town, you can see people reading them: this is particularly true of Westwood, where during the hot and Covid dominated summer of 2020, far more people walked there.

The funding of the boards came partly from the Society's funds, and also from Flemingate for that board, and East Riding of Yorkshire Council for the Hall Garth and the present boards. All the boards are online at the Beverley Civic Society website, and you can if you wish print them off. Google **www.beverleycivicsociety.co.uk** where you will find the pictures under **'Projects'**.

We realise that there are very interesting parts of the town we have not yet covered, and in future



there may be more boards: the Society would be very happy to have suggestions where these might be placed.

The Friary & Eastgate board concentrates chiefly on the Friary, as Eastgate was partially covered by the Minster. The Friary is one of Beverley's hidden treasures.

Now you can see the huge area it once covered running out to Flemingate: part of the plan of an excavation showing the skeletons of people who were buried there in the middle ages: something of the post Reformation owners who were secret Catholics and commissioned intriguing wall paintings: and the story of the long and ultimately successful campaign to save the amazing building from demolition.

# EAST RIDING COLLEGE FOR BUSINESS NAMED RECRUITER OF THE MONTH BY NATIONAL TALENT PORTAL

East Riding College for Business apprenticeship recruiter Jodie Koplick was named Recruiter of the Month in September by Get My First Job, the website used by young people to find apprenticeship vacancies.

The College has used the website since 2016 and has been recognised for offering an excellent candidate experience from advert to placement.

Jodie was once an apprentice herself and is now the first contact for most apprenticeship applicants to the College.

She helps those interested in an apprenticeship find the right post, prepare for interview and sit initial assessments to get them on the right track in their qualifications.

Jodie said, "We keep our adverts up to date and check that they incorporate what the qualification entails as well as what the candidate would be expected to carry out within the employer premises.

"We often go through the adverts and refresh them if they are not getting our employers the right levels of interest. I ensure that anyone that has applied is contacted promptly and has an interview with the business development team, which gives them the opportunity to apply for other vacancies at the same time if they wish."

The College has seen a huge upsurge in new apprenticeship vacancies recently, demonstrating a quick recovery from the relative lows of lockdown, when some employers stopped advertising for apprentices due to growing uncertainty and restrictions placed on some industries such as hospitality.

Jodie said, "The bounce back has been tremendous, and very encouraging for the economic recovery of our region. Our biggest challenge at the moment is the ongoing restrictions as a result of the pandemic.

"We're constantly reviewing and adapting our approach, to ensure we get the best outcomes for our candidates and employers. We have had to move interviews online, which can make it more difficult to capture the true characteristics of a candidate.

"However, we have overcome this by adding extra questions to our general interview process, which allows us to understand candidates better and determine how they may react in certain situations, for example."

# **'BY THE TIDE OF HUMBER' A CULTURAL WALK THROUGH HULL'S OLD TOWN - IAN RICHARDSON**



Perhaps for many the idea of walking for pleasure anywhere in Hull is seen as rather a contradiction in terms. Hopefully, this exploration of considerable cultural interest and much beauty, packed into less than 2 miles, following the circuit of the former town walls, will dispel such erroneous thinking.

Hull's Old Town still remains something of an undiscovered treasure, of which writer Beryl Bainbridge commented 35 years ago "long may its beauties remain undiscovered". For me, such good things should not be hoarded.

The walk's title pays homage to a line from


the wonderful poem To his Coy Mistress by Hull's own seventeenth century major poet, Andrew Marvell, whose statue stands in the Market Place.

• Fittingly, perhaps for JB readers, let us start and finish at the site of the former Beverley Gate, now in the very heart of Hull at the top of Whitefriargate. The brick foundations can still be seen today; noted local historian Ron Fairfax is championing a rebuild of the entire structure.

It had one moment of huge historical significance in 1642, when King Charles I was refused entry here to his own 'Kings Town'; this quickly lead to civil war with the

forces of parliament, which most in Hull supported.

From the battlements here for centuries, people stood to watch the grisly spectacle of public executions at the notorious gibbet. Head south along Princes Dock Side, with many of the former mercantile buildings put to effective modern use.

The dock, originally known as Junction, was constructed in 1829, making Hull at that time effectively an island as it was encircled by the waters of 4 docks.

Cross the very busy A63 at the pelican over to the Marina, formerly Humber Dock. Before the end of 2020, walkers should be able to use the exciting new Murdoch Connection footbridge to reach it.



It is named after the first female GP (and car owner) in the city, who died in 1916 after visiting an emergency patient in freezing temperatures.

The bridge should really help better the link between the city centre to the buzzing waterfront with its bars, cafes, galleries and retail outlets. This area is very attractive, especially in fine weather. I especially like the glazed brickwork and art nouveau tiling of the beautiful Humber Dock Tavern.

3 Minerva Pier has much to offer: a splendid pub, promenades with sweeping views over the estuary, the handsome former Pilot's Office and the outstanding architecture of the 1930's public toilets, I think some of the best in the country.

Here, until 1981, ferries ran across the Humber to Lincolnshire, and there was even a short-lived hovercraft service to Grimsby. The footway around the confluence of the

rivers Hull and Humber is currently closed, but a quick route to the riverside alongside the imposing tidal barrier can be taken via Queen Street.

Regeneration of this area over the past 2 decades has been extensive, and particularly impressive, of course, is the very striking architecture of the Deep across the River Hull; in my view it is one of the most thrilling structures built in this century anywhere in the country.

Head north up the riverside, go down one of the many alleys to join impressive High Street. As the name suggests, this was once the beating heart of town.

Here stand some of the former handsome homes of rich Hull merchants of yesteryear, such as Crowle and Maister House, the latter run by the National Trust. Former warehouses are now used as characterful student accommodation.

The Black Boy pub has an outstanding interior and there are other fine bars as we proceed into the Museums Quarter and its 3 fine, free access collections. Treasures inside include the remarkable prehistoric Ferriby boat, extensive Roman objects from Brough, and local trams.

Wilberforce House, where the antislavery campaigner and Hull MP, William Wilberforce, was raised, is a most impressive artisan mannerist 17th century building with a delightful garden at the rear. The huge 18th century Pease warehouses are now attractive apartments. This evocative historic street often brings to mind the lines from the poem, Here, by that other great Hullbased poet, Philip Larkin; 'Ships up streets, the slave museum.' Although written about the city 60 years ago, I recommend reading the poem to gain a real genius loci (spirit of place) for Hull.

Cross busy Alfred Gelder Street with care, go up the northern part of High Street, viewing the outstanding Georgian Blaydes House, before turning left into North Walls by the former handsome Dock Offices.

Walk through the college buildings, crossing by the zebra above Queen's Gardens. This oddly has a plaque marking the fictional departure of Robinson Crusoe, unfeasibly, as the former dock here was built in 1778 and Defoe's great novel was written in 1719.


The plaque should, in my view, be alongside the river Hull, from where all voyages from Hull must then have departed.

G Final architectural treats await! If you return to your starting point down Parliament Street, an exceptional late Georgian terrace, spot the series of carved heads and fantastic tiling in the porches.

Turn right up Whitefriargate, looking up to see some of the fine windows of Trinity House.

Walk back to Beverley Gate, having strolled through centuries of Hull's mercantile and cultural heritage.

while along the bay the funfair flares, and posters promise end of season thrills.


We pass Georgian porches lit with palms; a room is red and gold, set for dinner.

# AOTORING SIC CARS WITH CAR

The subject of this issue may well resonate with those who have an inner boy-racer deep inside them as it's the Ford Escort RS Cosworth.

Known by the cognoscenti as a "Cossie", this car held the dubious honour in its early days as being the most stolen car in the UK - whether this reflects on its poor security or general appeal is open to debate.

What is not open to debate is just how fast it is, reaching 150mph and 0 to 60 in under 6 seconds. Not bad for a 2 litre Ford in the mid nineties, and it can still show a clean pair of heels to many new cars today. Manufactured from 1992 to 1996 and with just over 7000 units rolling out of Ford's German factory, it is now a very rare sight on these shores as many met their end in a ditch or following a pursuit by the police.

Despite this, the car was successful in rallies, doubtless helped by the fact that it is so easy to tune up from its original 2 litre turbocharged form. The enormous whaletail spoiler was a delete option at manufacture,



which might indicate that Ford had a sense of humour at the time as ordering one without only made the car a tiny bit less conspicuous.

Putting one of these on your drive will be a bit tricky as there are not too many for sale and extreme caution is advised regarding getting it checked over by an expert due to its potential history of accidents and racing. The cost is substantial too, with the most pristine examples asking up to £70,000, so choose wisely and carefully.

Hope's performance led her to be invited to attend the pre-selection qualifications for Agility Team GB, which is being held in February 2021.

Khloe, Jason's third dog, is a toy poodle and at 14 months old is just beginning her journey.

As part of his agility journey so far, Jason has met Ruth Bryant from Wagtails, an excellent puppy and dog trainer who specialises in dog behaviour modification and with whom he shares her fully secure training fields with. He uses his own agility equipment with aluminium contacts, all of which is to the Kennel Club specifications.

"My passion for training agility is second to none. Having now moved on from the business I have built up my time is now dedicated to training dogs (and their handlers) to have fun together, keep fit, build that forever bond, and bring them to competition level if they so desire" Jason says.

# **BONFIRE NIGHT FESTIVITIES**

Remember remember the fifth of November, Gunpowder, Treason and Plot... Every year, Britain commemorates Bonfire Night loudly and colourfully with an array of celebrations for the foiling of the Gunpowder Plot of 1605.

Every year on 5th November, the anniversary of the Gunpowder Plot, we remember Guy Fawkes. A member of a failed conspiracists group of provincial English Catholics who wanted to assassinate the Protestant King James I of England and VI of Scotland, Guy Fawkes was arrested while guarding the explosives the plotters had placed underneath the House of Lords.

After his arrest, and the arrest of the other members of the Plot, the King's Council allowed the public to celebrate the attempt on his life, so allowed people to light bonfires all over London. Months later, the Observance of 5th November Act was enforced, making it an annual public day of thanksgiving for the plot's failure.

Bonfires have been lit every year since in celebration, and as the years have progressed, Bonfire Night rituals became even more elaborate.

Celebrations began with people placing effigies onto bonfires, and fireworks were added to the celebrations. Effigies of Guy Fawkes, and sometimes those of the Pope, graced the pyres. Still today, some communities throw dummies of both Guy Fawkes and the Pope on the bonfire. This tradition is seen less and less now.

Another British Bonfire Night tradition that has become lost over the years is Penny for the Guy. This tradition involved making a guy out of old rags, filling it with either paper or straw, and placing him in a pushchair or a wheelbarrow. Then, you would go around the town placing him in front of a shop or knock on neighbours doors, chanting "Penny For The Guy".

The idea of this was to help to fund buying fireworks for the annual family or local community bonfire show. At the end of the evening, the "Guy" himself would then be put on the bonfire for everyone to watch burn.

Traditionally, the cake most associated with and eaten on Bonfire Night is Parkin Cake, a sticky cake containing a mix of oatmeal, ginger,



treacle and syrup. It is increasingly being enjoyed throughout the winter months.

Fireworks displays are another tradition which has withstood the test of time, and in main town and cities, torch-lit processions are also popular. The torch-lit procession leads to where the bonfire and firework displays are.

While traditional Bonfire Night festivities could look different this year after the government tightened coronavirus rules, but there are still lots of ways to have fun this year. While many traditions have died off over time, keep the activities flowing at home by encouraging your children to build a "Guy" for a small home DIY event.

# THIS MONTH'S BEAVER MOON

A full Moon occurs roughly every 29.5 days and appears as a full orb because the whole side of the moon which faces the Earth is lit up by the sun's rays.

Full moons mark the midpoint in the lunar calendar. The next and penultimate full moon of 2020 is called the Beaver Moon and will occur on November 30.

According to folklore, the Full Moon in November is named after beavers because that is when they become active while preparing for the winter.

However, there is some disagreement over the origin of November's Beaver Moon name with some believing it comes from Native Americans setting beaver traps during this month before the swamps froze to ensure they had a supply of warm winter furs. Perhaps it could be both. Full Moon names have been introduced by ancient cultures such as Native American tribes, who specifically kept track of moon phases and cycles by giving them a distinctive name to identify the seasons.

For example, February's Snow Moon, named after the snowy conditions of the winter.

There is one lunar cycle every month, which means one full moon per month, however some years have 23 Full Moons.

This makes one of them a Blue Moon, and as the saying "Once in a Blue Moon" suggests, it is something that happens rarely.

October this year had two Full Moons, making the later October Moon the Blue one!



# PREPARING FOR THE WINTER - HOW WE CAN HELP NATURE AND WILD ANIMALS?

During the fast-approaching winter months, many wild animals find shelter nestling in piles of leaves, trees and compost when they hibernate.

Freezing temperatures and short food supplies make life even more difficult for the likes of birds, squirrels, frogs, even bats, and hedgehogs who need to use up fat reserves to store heat.

So how can we prepare our gardens and help wild animals survive this winter?

#### Provide cool and dry shelter

Small ways you can provide shelter are by putting bird boxes and hedgehog homes into your garden, or leaving some areas undisturbed right through until hibernation is over in April - although this period may change depending on how mild the winter is. If you do disturb their home for the winter, try to make sure they are not exposed to damp conditions. You can also prepare a compost heap to make a perfect home for frogs, toads and other animals.



*Leave food out* Don't overfeed wile animals so they become

dependent on your food source, but supplying them with small amounts can help see them through the cold months. For birds, leave out seeds, suet balls, bird feeders, berries and chopped up fruits; for hedgehogs, leave leftover minced meat, chopped boiled eggs and any tinned cat or dog food you may have; and for squirrels leave nuts, sunflower seeds and chopped carrots.

#### A fresh source of water

As well as food, provide fresh water for them. If you have a bird bath in your garden, make sure it is topped up with water, and you could also place a shallow dish of fresh water on the ground for all garden wildlife to use.

#### Donate

Don't have a garden but still want to help? You could donate food and supplies to a local wildlife refuge whose volunteers are working hard throughout the winter season to care for rescued animals. Spare canned food will help underweight animals, and donating old blankets, towels and pillow cases will help the animals keep warm.

## **COUNTRYSIDE MATTERS** WITH SAM WALTON

How time flies. Every year we see the weather variation in the farming industry, the many ups and down, and 2020 has been no different. It seems no time at all that we were looking at the crop in the Spring and wondering how it



would yield. I think I knew the answer then and of course it was confirmed during the strange summer, even though we hoped for a miracle!

The yields the farm produced this year reminded me of the days of yore when we had horses and binders, and no way do we want to go back to those days. Whilst we have had to deal with Covid this year, we have also had to deal with the land and variable weather conditions, but we look at this on a yearly basis to plan for the future. I suppose in a normal year we would

probably produce 3 times more per acre than we did back then, but with this year's outcome, it wouldn't even compete.

My wheat usually averages 3.7 tons per acre, but this year I only got 1.5 tons. In a reasonably good year, my rape will do around 1.6 tons per acre, and this year I only got 0.9 ton. With barley I usually get around the 3



ton mark, and this year I got 2.25 tons, which was the only half decent crop on the farm.

At the time of writing this I still have to harvest the Linseed. We would usually expect 1 ton per acre from that, so we will see how it does as it germinated in 2 lots about 3 weeks apart and I still don't know why that was. So I'm once again a moaning farmer, and if you see me with a begging bowl in Saturday Market place, do be generous!



While some years in the farming industry do turn out like this year has, with things not being so good with yields of wheat, rape and barley, we look to recover these losses next year by changing what we do and managing the land accordingly.

As things stand at the moment, I have made a decision not to grow oil seed rape again

because of the forthcoming withdrawal of products for the control of slugs and flea beetle which devastate the crop. Plus there is the ever increasing number of pigeons, which despite scarecrows, flying models of hawks, and the use of my solar powered pigeon bird scarer gun, seem to be able to munch away at the growing points, thus devastating the plants. So what to replace that crop with has yet to be decided.

Food and farming have to be the most essential businesses, because without food you can do nothing. So hopefully as the world population continues to grow, despite the current Covid situation, the farming industry globally will hopefully, somehow or other be able to produce enough food to feed everybody but not if last year is going to be a pointer to the future.

While this year has not been so good, we look forward to a positive 2021 on my arounds.



# IN THE GARDEN... NOVEMBER

Who would have thought that back in March when gardens offered so much promise that we would have had the year we have with all its ups and downs. The garden however has continued steadfast in its cycle and here we are in November.

During November we move from the bright hues of autumn colour that may still be lingering at the beginning of the month and then tumble into winter at its close. Colour from flowers will be scarce, but replaced by berries, variegated evergreen foliage, and decorative bark on trees, seed heads and grasses.

We often dismiss November as being grey, damp and windy. Yes, the days are very much shorter, temperatures lower and if we do get sunshine it is watery. However, there are still some 'jewels' to be found in the garden. One of my favourites is Viburnum X bodnantense, producing beautiful pink flowers on bare



stems and a wonderful sweet scent; another is Mahonia vars. bearing slender racemes of yellow, fragrant flowers.

#### Tasks and Tips for November ...

• Continue to clear up leaves and compost if applicable. Don't allow them to stay on the lawn as this will lead to bare patches and clear them from nooks and crannies, slugs and snails will overwinter in them especially if they are dry!!

• Tidy up roses and any other shrubs by clearing old stems and dead foliage - don't overdo this as grasses and seed heads can look very attractive in the depths of winter (especially with a frost on them) and they will provide food and shelter for the smaller creatures in the garden.

• Aerate (spike) the lawn, give it a light cut and apply an autumn feed. Autumn feed differs from the spring/summer feeds, containing a different ratio of nutrients which enhance root development, helping your lawn get off to a flying start next spring. Don't apply any feed if frost is forecast.

• Protect tender plants using horticultural fleece.

• November is your last chance to plant spring flowering bulbs - plant bulbs at 2 to 3 times their own depth for best results.

• November is a good month to plant a hedge; bundles of bare root hedging plants will become available in nurseries and garden centres. It is also a good time to transplant any shrubs or trees that maybe not 'quite where you want them' in the garden.

• Dig over bare soil in the vegetable garden when weather permits. If done early in the month the rain and frost over winter will help to break up the soil and digging will be easier in the spring. However, don't trample on the soil if it is wet enough to stick to your boots as you will end up compacting it, which will do more harm than good.
