#### 'IAN RICHARDSON WALKS' TO BECOME 'BYGONE BEVERLEY STROLLS'

We know readers have enjoyed lan's walks around our lovely county over the past year because so many of you have contacted him to say they have - and others have contacted him with local knowledge to enhance the talks or correct mistakes. With the onset of the winter months, lan is shifting his focus away from the countryside to Beverley and its rich history. Over the next few editions, he plans to take us on a series of short strolls through Beverley, each focusing on key days in our past.

The first concerns the two days in WW2 when the town was attacked by the German Air Force. Future walks will include the days associated with the closure of the railway line to York in 1965, the outbreak of WW1 in 1914, the corrupt parliamentary election of 1868, which saw the famous novelist Anthony Trollope stand here in Beverley and the dramatic arrest of a Civil War hero, Sir John Hotham, in 1643.

The idea for this new series occurred to lan whilst he was stood atop St. Mary's Church tower, which was commendably open for free to visitors as part of National Heritage Week in September. From this glorious vantage point, you can see the whole town. For someone with lan's interests, it's as if centuries of history unfold below.

St Mary's Church still has fascinating evidence from one of the most dramatic days in the town's past, as the first stroll will reveal. Ian told **Just Beverley**: "I am lucky to have on my doorstep the excellent research

The Defence School of Transport lead the procession of Civic Dignitaries, Royal British Legion and local organisations with the band of the Church Lads and Girls Brigade providing appropriate music from School Lane to the Minster.

After the service, the parade reassembles and marches through Beverley past the Market Cross where the Lord-Lieutenant of the East Riding of Yorkshire, Hon. Mrs. Susan Cunliffe-Lister will take the salute.

The parade marches to the Memorial Gardens where a service and Laying of Wreaths takes place. Service sheets will be available at the entrance to the gardens.



## NEW 'NORWOOD NIPPERS' PLAYGROUP AT NORWOOD CHURCH

Methodist Church Children and Families Work Karen Eyre, ably assisted by Johnathan Horsley, has opened Norwood Nippers for pre-school children aged up to 5. Children with their Mum, Dad, Grandparent or carer are warmly invited to join in the fun every Wednesday of school term time between 9am and 11am.

The day **Just Beverley** visited, the grown-ups were enjoying the opportunity to socialise as much as their little ones were enjoying the crafts, reading corner, construction bench, physical activities and small world toys. There are refreshments for the children (as well as for the grown-ups, served in a kitchen area away from the children) and a craft stall with items priced vey competitively to encourage parents to continue creative crafts with their children at home. There is a changing area for babies and child-friendly toilets.

At 10.45am, grown-ups and children are led through to the Church to do some action singing, celebrate birthdays, hear about other child-friendly events and say a short prayer before heading home. Karen said: "The people coming to the

group have given it the funky name! They are encouraged to give feedback and take ownership so I can be there in support. I am qualified in Early Years Learning, Baby Massage and Breast-feeding and keen to use those skills to benefit the children and parents who come along. If I spot someone breast-feeding, I take them a glass of water so they maintain hydration. We will be developing the outside space to encourage outdoor play and running special events some afternoons to increase access to people who can't come on Wednesday mornings." #### BEVERLEY ARMS REDEVELOPMENT UPDATE

Work is progressing well at The Beverley Arms, where Thwaites is transforming the hotel with a multi-million-pound transformation. Work has already seen the concrete eyesore at the back demolished and now builders are stripping out more features that have been added since the 1960s. In their place, Georgian features are being restored to bring back the charm of the old building. 


use of space and existing features. It's going to be quite a transformation. I'm personally looking forward to seeing the finished new look and welcoming everyone to the friendliest inn in town."





Rebecca Lumley has been Vicar at St Mary's for the past 6 years. She was born in the Midlands and lived in Kent, Bridlington, Ripon, Wakefield and Dewsbury until her Civil Engineer father landed a job which brought him and his family to Beverley when Becky was aged 15. However, her time in Dewsbury had a profound effect on her life. There she attended the Church of the Nazarene (a Protestant Church in the Wesleyan-Holiness tradition) where, at the age of 13 or 14, she felt she was being called to the Ministry.

Becky remembers the Nazarene Church as doing great work with young people and an elderly lady there telling her she believed she had been singled out for ordination.

She quoted Isaiah 61:1 to her "The Spirit of the Sovereign Lord is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me to proclaim Good News to the poor." Since that day, that verse from Isaiah has stayed with Becky and has kept coming up! For example, she went to an Ordination Service at Beverley Minster when she first moved to Beverley and the whole service was based around Isaiah 61.

It's not surprising to know that Becky studied Theology at University! She went to St Andrews and after her Masters, headed down to London and then Northamptonshire where she was a Children and Youth Worker for the Anglican Church. She then applied to the Church of England for selection to train as an ordained minister, bearing in mind Isaiah 61 and the elderly lady's comment.

Upon selection, she was on the move again, this time to Durham, where she trained for the priesthood. After ordination she was appointed Curate in Darlington. It was in Darlington where she met her husband, Tom; they now have a son, Simon. Then it was off to Gateshead to work in an inner-city parish for 3 years, during which time the Church grew massively.

"It was fabulous" said Becky, "very different to Beverley. But unfortunately, I lost my second

baby, a girl, and we decided to move closer to family here. And then the St Mary's job came up and I was appointed! The Bishop still can't believe it as the previous incumbent did not believe in the ordination of women - but the congregation clearly did!

"They had a vision for St Mary's which involved reaching out to the community, particularly to children and families and they felt I was the right person to help them do that."

As a Church which has parts which are considered to be older than the Minster (the foundations were laid in 1120, although it took 600 years to build), St Mary's maintains traditions already established, but has instigated more relaxed, contemporary worship, known as 'The 11.15 Service' to appeal to a different group.

This means Becky leads 4 services on the average Sunday at 8am, 9.45am, 11.15am and 6.30pm with at least 2 Baptisms most Sundays in the afternoon!

She has help - volunteer Curate Ali Doonan, Lay Reader Steve Parkin, Musical Directors, a choir, music group, band and bells - but all the hard work is worthwhile as St Mary's is bucking the trend for church congregations as more under 40's with families attend worship.

Becky says: "People realise that no matter what else is going on in their lives, we all have a sense of spirituality and are in need of God's love. We let people know we are there for them and God is on their side. Within St Mary's they can belong to a fabulous, vibrant, supportive, sharing community."

Becky is so passionate about the place of St Mary's and God in society that she is also a Chaplain to the local ATC and St Mary's Church Lads and Girls Brigade (CLB).

She said "Chaplains are very important. They create a connection to the Church, showing the Church is there for the organisation and can pray for them. Chaplaincy within the Military Services is highlighted at this time of the year as we think of those who have given their lives or been injured whilst defending our freedom.

"The Church has always been involved in the deepest emotional situations of people's lives and there is no time which causes more anxiety, stress or sadness than war. St Mary's is located next to Beverley's Memorial Gardens where memorials to WW1, WW2, HMS Beverley and RAF 640 Squadron are located and within the Church are Airforce Memorial books, which are available upon request.

"There is an Act of Remembrance every Remembrance Sunday in the Gardens, with the laying of wreaths as well as a service within the Church. The children of St Mary's School also come to the Church for a Remembrance Service where we focus on peace and living well together. Each of us can make a difference



to stopping the cycle of discord through awareness of the words we use and how we present ourselves physically. All of us can learn the lessons of war and seek out peace."

Children are clearly important to Becky as her Chaplaincy with the St Mary's CLB demonstrates. There are 110 members ranging in ages from 5 to 21, meeting on 3 separate nights of the week at their Headquarters on Trinity Lane, supported entirely by volunteers.

They go on trips, go camping, learn new skills, do arts and crafts, learn musicality and to play musical instruments for the band and have Bible class.

In fact, the band has just won the award for the Best CLB Band in the country of which Becky is understandably very proud!

But more help is needed - perhaps you could spare some time? St Mary's also has Brownie and Guide Packs, a Youth Group and Parent and Toddler Group so it is living out the visionary profile which was presented to Becky when she applied.

Despite its age and the £5.5m it needs to spend on its infrastructure, St Mary's is also bucking the trend for weddings! On average, 34 couples every year tie the knot in this beautiful parish church, which is one of the largest in the country.

Becky said: 'We try to make every wedding unique, as if it's the only wedding we have ever done, because every couple is special and they are the future."

It is reassuring to know that St Mary's is in such capable, caring, inspirational hands whilst Rev. Lumley is at the helm.

### **YOUNG, AMBITIOUS AND CARING - THAT'S OLIVIA MORRIS**

East Riding College student, Olivia, also works as a Sales Assistant at one of Beverley's newest charity shops, the RSPCA in Butcher Row. The shop opened in February, in a prime spot, with the aim of raising funds for the RSPCA facility in Clough Road, Hull.

It costs £1100 per day to operate Clough Road, rescuing animals in need and looking after the ones already there, hoping to find new homes.

But Clough Road, which was opened in 1938, is in need of a complete rebuild as the facilities are not fit for purpose anymore; it is in danger of being closed down. The rebuild will cost £1m.

With no government or lottery funding, the £1m must be raised locally - which is where Olivia comes in. She has made it her business to build awareness of the RSPCA's work, the charity shop and how everyone can help maintain their vital service.

The shop in Butcher Road has a boutique-y feel with good quality men's and women's clothes, shoes, bags, jewellery, bric-a-brac, books, CDs and DVDs. They are always looking for good quality donations of any of the above.

Additionally, they are also looking for children's clothes and homewares such as bed-linen and curtains. However, although only good-quality books and clothes are sold in the shop, they are most grateful for any books and textiles, not matter what the quality.

Olivia said: "Poor-quality books and textiles are ragged and sold on for recycling. However, textiles can also be used at Clough Road to make the animals more comfortable. Blankets, towels, sheets and pillows are all gratefully accepted, as are cleaning materials and tins of cat and dog food. In fact, the only things we can't accept are large household appliances and furniture. Got a heater you don't want? We will have it checked and use it to keep sick animals warm."

Olivia has a passion for animals (she has a cocker spaniel, Scooter, and a shitzu, Archie) which is matched by her love of the people with and who she meets on a day-to-day basis.

She said: "Not many people my age would even think of working in a charity shop! But it is so rewarding in that I not only help the animals but can provide a service to the people who come in. And yes, I have found some bargains here myself!"

Olivia, despite having health issues which have caused her to take time out of school, has either volunteered or had some kind of a job since the age of 13.

She has worked in hairdressing salons and at a deli as well as at the RSPCA, at the same time as studying. As she says, this has given her a real understanding of the value of money. It has also kindled her passion for increasing the awareness of the discrimination suffered by people living with disability.

Olivia has grown up with a family member who has Down's Syndrome who is actively discriminated against, something which mortifies Olivia, so much so that she is on the Equality and Diversity Committee at East Riding College. Olivia is clearly one of those people who, when she sees something is wrong, does something about it. She could be a future MP, perhaps?

## FRIARS, THE PILGRIMAGE OF GRACE AND THE DISSOLUTION OF THE DOMINICAN AND FRANCISCAN PRIORIES IN SIXTEENTH-CENTURY BEVERLEY BY CLAIRE CROSS

Historians of medieval Beverley have understandably concentrated on the Minster and St Mary's and have tended to overlook the town's Dominican and Franciscan priories, yet in the early Tudor period, the two friaries were still an integral part of the town's religious life.

Contemporary satirists enjoyed caricaturing friars, but in the first quarter of the sixteenth century the townspeople as elsewhere in England were still turning to the friars for their services, particularly when they came to die.

Some local friars dared to voice their opposition when Henry VIII broke with Rome and remained loyal to the papacy as the government's attack



on the church intensified. When, fired by news of the revolt in Lincolnshire, the Beverley commons assembled on the Westwood in October 1536 the Observant friar Bonaventure urged them on in their endeavour from the gate of the Franciscan convent.

Friars in Beverley played a crucial role as intermediaries in the Pilgrimage of Grace (which started in October 1536) and in the attempt to reignite the rebellion the following January, and some paid for their involvement with their lives on its failure.

Convinced by the rising of the necessity of eradicating all the religious orders, the government accelerated the dissolution of the monasteries between 1537 and 1540 and the two Beverley friaries were shut down at the end of February 1539; some two dozen or so friars needed to find an alternative livelihood in the secular church.

Because of the inadequacy of the sources the fate of most of these displaced friars is not known, but the last prior of the Beverley Dominicans has left a record of his subsequent career and almost



twenty years after surrendering his priory he died, still a Dominican at heart and a firm adherent of the Catholic church

#### **GIVING YOUR HOME TO YOUR CHILDREN**

What are the issues in making a gift of your home to your children, whilst continuing to live in the property?

This practice is becoming more common with elderly parents wishing to ensure their property can pass down to their children rather than being taxed on death or used as payment towards nursing home fees.

#### Avoidance of nursing home fees

A significant issue for many people is why they, having accumulated their wealth by being financially astute all their life, have to pay for his or her care - while those that have been less prudent have the cost of their care paid by the state.

Some people in this position will try to qualify for state funding by gifting their property and reducing their assets, this is considered to be "deprivation of assets". Where there is seemingly no other reason for the transfer, other than avoidance of nursing home fees, the local council will no doubt investigate the transaction and the property will still be counted in the means test.

#### Inheritance tax (IHT)

The increased Inheritance tax nil rate band for residential properties will take many estates outside of inheritance tax charge, but will only be fully in place from April 2020.

If a gift does occur during a lifetime then it can be fully effective for Inheritance tax only after it has been out of the estate for seven years. Taper relief is available after four years, so the value in the estate will be reduced gradually between four and seven years.

#### Capital gains tax (CGT)

Whether or not the gift is successful for Inheritance tax, a formal transfer of property will be a valid gift for CGT purposes.

- · The donor would be subject to capital gains tax based on the market value of the property, less the original cost price.
- The gift would qualify for principal private residence relief, subject to meeting the usual conditions of being the donor's main residence for a period of time.
- · If the property has always been the parents only home then it will be fully exempt from capital gains

The children would receive the property at its current market value so there would be no capital gains tax free uplift on the parent's death. The property will not qualify for principal private residence relief in future as occupation will not be by the property owner therefore future increases in value will be subject to CGT.

#### Gift with reservation

- If the parents continue to live in the property following the gift, the gift will be caught by the gift with reservation rules.
- As a consequence, the property would remain part of the IHT estate unless full consideration is paid to the children for their continued occupation.

#### Full consideration

- The parents would have to pay the full rental value of the property each year.
- Rental value is the "Rent that would have been payable if the property was let to him at an annual rent equal to that which might reasonably be expected under a standard lease".

- A standard lease is one where a landlord bears the cost of repairs, maintenance and insurance and the tenant pays council tax, rates and utilities.
- The rental value could be reduced if the lease is not standard, for example if the parents take on a repairing lease where they remain responsible for maintaining the property and carrying out running
- Obtaining market valuations and keeping them up to date is advised.
- If full market consideration is not paid, then the whole value of the property remains subject to IHT

#### Other issues to consider

- The receipt of rental income is taxable property income for the children.
- The parents would no longer be the legal owners of the property they live in; this is an unacceptable risk for some.
- The gift of property might be considered by local councils as deliberate deprivation of capital when considering whether any nursing home fees are pavable.
- Pre owned assets tax may be payable where for example a contribution is made towards a property purchased by children but in which the parents live rent-free but the GWR provisions do not apply.
- · Stamp Duty Land Tax (SDLT) will not be due on the aift as there is no consideration, unless there is outstanding borrowing on the property which the children take over; this will be classed as consideration meaning that SDLT is due. If the children have their own property this will be at the higher rates for second residences, typically this is an additional 3% above the normal stamp duty rates. ## **LEGAL Q'S AND A'S**

Every month, Just Beverley asks a team of legal experts to answer a question to which we don't know the answer. This month, the question is about building regulation and access to adjoining properties.

Q. My next door neighbour is building an extension along the party wall and is proposing to put up scaffolding in my garden. Is he allowed to do this?

Coles the Solicitors have provided the following response:

A. Works to party wall are now governed by complicated provisions in the Party Walls Act 1996 which included a procedure for resolving disputes. The precise rights and duties of you and your neighbour will depend upon exactly what is proposed. You should immediately take legal advice from a specialist solicitor or surveyor. I would expect your neighbour to be entitled to erect his scaffolding but only after serving you with proper notice under the Act, taking account of any objections you may raise and compensating you for any financial loss.

From April 2018 the existing childcare voucher scheme will come to an end for new parents, replaced by the government backed scheme Childcare Choices. Parents already using childcare vouchers can continue to do so after this date, as long as the employer continues to offer them. The PAYE and National Insurance exemption for workplace nurseries will also continue.

#### 1. Tax Free Childcare Savinas Account:

The government's tax-free childcare system works like an online savings account. You transfer in your cash, and the top-up should be paid that same day (although sometimes there maybe delays). The government will contribute an extra £2 for every £8 a parent pays into the online account, up to a maximum of £2,000 per child. Once your childcare costs exceed £10,000, the government top-ups will cease. To qualify for the scheme, parents must work and earn at least £120 per week (on average) and not more than £100,000 each per year. Unlike the government's last childcare assistance scheme "the vouchers" this one is open to the self-employed too. You don't have to pay in the same amount each month, but there is a quarterly limit on government top ups of £500. So, if you know your childcare cost will be higher over the summer holidays, try to spread out the payments so you don't fall foul of the limit. Parents of disabled children can receive up to £4,000 per child - up to £1,000 every three months.

#### 2. Free Childcare:

You can apply for between 15 and 30 hours of free childcare dependent on age of your children and your circumstances. At present, the schemes are limited to parents with children under four on the 31 August 2017, and disabled children under seventeen. However, it's important to be aware that every three months, you need to reconfirm your eligibility for the scheme by ticking a box online. You also need to ensure that your childcare provider is signed up to the tax-free childcare system.

## IN THE GARDEN... NOVEMBER

By the end of November all but very few leaves are clinging to deciduous trees and shrubs, gone are the brilliant hues of autumn. November is the transitional month in the garden from autumn into winter. Autumn ends when most plants stop growing because the daily temperature is too low (due to a combination of shorter days and a weaker sun) and they enter a period of dormancy.

We often dismiss November as being grey, damp and windy. Yes, the days are very much shorter, temperatures lower and if we do get sunshine it is watery. However, there are still some 'jewels' to be found in the garden. One of my favourites is Viburnum X bodnantense, producing beautiful pink flowers on bare stems and a wonderful sweet scent.

Another is the winter flowering cherry, Prunus subhirtella 'Autumnalis' or the pink variety, 'Autumnalis Rosea' and last but by no means least the berries borne on Pyracantha will add a splash of vibrant red, orange or yellow (depending on which variety you have) to any aarden.

As a consequence of the weather, November is not the best gardening month, so in order to get any tasks done take advantage of any 'good' gardening days to...

- Continue to clear up leaves and compost if applicable. Don't allow them to stay on the lawn as this will lead to bare patches and clear them from nooks and crannies, slugs and snails will overwinter in them especially if they are dry!!
- If you decide to have a bonfire please check before you light it that no four legged creatures have decided to make a home in it.
- Aerate (spike) the lawn, give it a light cut and apply an autumn feed. Autumn feed differs from the spring/summer feeds, containing a different ratio of nutrients which enhance root development. Don't apply any feed if frost is forecast.
- · Protect tender plants using horticultural fleece.
- Plant spring flowering bulbs plant bulbs at 2 to 3 times their own depth.
- November is a good month to plant a hedge; bundles of bare root hedging plants will become available in nurseries and garden centres. It is also a good time to transplant any shrubs or trees that maybe not 'quite where you want them' in the garden.
- Continue to dig over bare soil in the vegetable garden when weather permits. Don't trample on the soil if it is wet enough to stick to your boots as you will end up compacting it, which will do more harm than good.
- · Clean or throw out any old pots and trays.

Finally, you may want to think about what you would like 'Santa' to bring you - my list is started with a terracotta rhubarb forcer at the top of the list.

## BEVERLEY CHAMBER CHOIR AND ORCHESTRA CELEBRATE THE 500TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE PROTESTANT REFORMATION

On October 31st, 1517, Martin Luther, a Catholic priest and a scholar, posted 95 notes on the door of the Church at the Castle in Wittenberg, Germany. The messages on the notes were the beginning of the Reformation of the Church, although Luther never intended to break away from the Catholic Church to which he belonged.

Luther's faith was down to St Anne, who, he believed, had saved him from a thunderstorm in 1505. At that time, he was studying law, but turned to theology and threw himself into Catholicism after his experience. Unfortunately, the medieval Church and Papacy were corrupt and had convinced the people that if they bought (with hard cash) an 'indulgence' they would have their sins forgiven and would go to heaven. Luther knew this was wrong! It was just a money-making scam to help finance the refurbishment of St Paul's Basilica in Rome! It clearly states in the Bible that only God can 'justify' whether someone is fit for heaven and forgive sin, not the Pope!

The 95 messages or theses were Luther's ideas of how to reform the Church. They were translated from the Latin in which they were written into German and distributed widely. It wasn't surprising that the Pope, Leo X, formally excommunicated Luther in 1521 and the Roman Emperor, Charles V of Germany, decreed Luther a heretic by issuing the famous 'Edict of Worms', which also stated that anyone who killed Luther would not be charged with murder. Fortunately, Prince Frederick III, Elector of Saxony agreed with Luther and protected him whilst Luther worked on a German translation of the Bible.


By 1529, more state princes agreed with Frederick and 'protested' against the Emperor's decree that the Edict of Worms must be enforced - they said their allegiance to God was more important than their allegiance to the Emperor. They became known as Protestants, adopting Luther's beliefs and beginning the Reformation which revolutionised Western civilisation. Sacred music prior to the



Reformation was sung in Latin only by the Clergy; the Reformation introduced the concept of giving music back to the worshippers by producing hymns sung by the congregation in unison in their own language (i.e. German, not Latin) with slightly more complicated works for choirs made up of lay-people. Luther himself wrote music as he believed God introduces His Word through music. Heinrich Schütz was considered the most important composer before JS Bach. Schütz worked for the Elector of Saxony, hence his theology was influenced by Luther. JS Bach's work is known to have been hugely influenced by Luther as he was given a copy of Luther's Bible when he was 48 years old which he received as if it was 'a long-lost treasure'. However, the form of his music was influenced by Dieterich Buxtehude, who wrote during the 17th Century and who Bach travelled to hear play.

The concert by Beverley Chamber Choir and Orchestra at St Mary's Church on Saturday November 18th at 7.30pm promises to be a wonderful reminder of the impact Martin Luther made on all of our lives. #### STUART BELL AND THE PROCESSED PEA

The Processed Pea is not a band or a pub - it's just a silly name for non-profit making get-togethers organised by a small number of music lovers. Nowadays, the get-togethers happen on the first Monday of the month, excepting the first Monday of the year. In the past, they have been weekly or even on Tuesdays, but today, almost 50 years after Stuart first thought of the idea, it's easy to remember that, if it's the first Monday of the month then it must be the Processed Pea! The Light Dragoon in Etton has always hosted the 'Pea'.

Stuart told Just Beverley: "The first ever Processed Pea was on September 2nd, 1969. In the past 48 years, over 100,000 people have been to one of our events. We used to cram 150 people in but now we just accommodate 70 - so you need to get your tickets well in advance for many of our evenings. We are all-seated so people can listen to the artists - we found that people tend to talk when stood up: there's still plenty of time to chat to your mates either before or after the acts or at the act change-over in the middle

"We try to bring people in from out of town as well as support local artists. We gave Katie Spencer one of her first bookings - I know you've featured her in **Just Beverley!** We tend to stick to folk/acoustic/ roots artists because of the size of venue - but what is folk? We had a bluesy due last month (Keith 'Ched' Cheeseman and Bobby Joyce) supporting new-folk troubadours Gilmore and Roberts and we've had comedians such as Jasper Carrot - who cost us £12. That was before he had his hit record after which his fee went up to £400 - we didn't rebook him!

"It's interesting that the Processed Pea has the reputation for being a folk club when the reason it was started was because me and 3 mates were at a folk club in Hull when someone singing a Donovan or Dylan song was told to sit down as it 'wasn't folk'.

In those days, unless you had a big beard, stuck a finger in your ear and had a tankard hanging from your belt, you weren't 'folk'. How things have changed!"

However, the 'Pea' has had every member of the folk royalty Waterson/Carthy clan grace the stage and, at some point or another, every member of Lindisfarne past and present, including the late Alan Hull. Interestingly, Billy Mitchell's son (Billy Mitchell being the lead-singer of Lindisfarne before their retirement in 2003 and recently involved with The Lindisfarne Story) is appearing with his own band next month. Tom Mitchell and the Borrowed Band Trio will perform tunes from the last 50 years of popular music - that should be different! The Processed Pea is unique in that it is the only club with that name (!) and the oldest club in England operating from the same venue. It's also the only club which gives its artists and sponsors a tin of processed peas (with their own label) as a thank you. Stuart explained where the name came

"48 years or so ago, a company selling canned foods was going under. I was one of the salesmen who had cases and cases of processed peas to get rid of! It struck me that it was a great gimmicky name for club. We even had car stickers printed 'Follow me to the Processed Pea' which have been spotted in Australia and Canada. We really ought to be recognised by the BBC Radio 2 Folk Awards!". In the past, well-known local musicians such as Rob Nicklas and Martin Peirson have been involved with the 'Pea'. Stuart's colleagues today are Max Roberts (of Beverley FM's Folk Hour), Andy Mowforth, Tony Sturdy and Anne Watkins. However, Stuart tends to arrange the programme. He said: "The first ever Processed Pea was all arranged but we didn't have an artist booked! With 3 days to spare, I rang Middleton College to see if they had any folk singers. A lad came on a motorbike with a guitar strapped to his back. We had



a disco at half-time along with mushy peas and chips. If anyone knows who that artist was, please let me

Although the club operates strictly as a not-for-profit organisation, sponsorship is always welcome so that the programme can remain as varied as possible and entrance fees kept low. It is the audience which comes first and always will do, with local artists second and paid artists at the back of the queue. There is even a loyalty card - go to 5 'Peas' and get the 6th free. The pub is such an integral part of the 'Pea', too, that, if you ring up and order food, they will have it ready for you before the show so you don't go hungry by missing your tea!

After Tom Mitchell and the Borrowed Band Trio in November is the Light Dragoon Christmas Party Night with Henry Priestman and the Men of a Certain Age. If you can get a ticket for that evening at this late stage you will be very lucky! Anyone who has been to a Henry Priestman gig knows what a great entertainer he is along with his fellow musician Les Glover, with Martin Peirson and Peter Robinson making up the band. As for February, well, watch the Processed Pea website: http://theprocessedpea.co.uk/ and earmark the first Monday in the month to go along. We promise, it will be fun!

#### RECIPE BY THE FOOD RHINO - VEGAN SUET PUDDING

#### Ingredients:


- 100g vegan suet
- · 200g self-raising flour
- 100ml water
- · Henderson's relish
- 5 sprouts
- 1 half of a carrot
- 1 cm strip swede
- 1 small leek • 1 small red onion
- Marmite
- Black pepper (To season)
- Vegan gravy
- · Pie dish
- 1 deep baking tray half filled with boiling water

#### Method:

- 1) Mix together 100g vegan suet, 100ml water and 200g self-raising flour thoroughly in a bowl and set aside in the fridge ready to roll out later.
- 2) Sweat the vegetables in a wok or large pan then add Henderson's relish, Marmite, pepper (to season) and vegan gravy to bind the mixture together. Cook this until the vegetables are soft and you have a flavour you are happy with then take away from the heat.
- 3) Let the filling cool while you roll out the suet to make the pie crust, making sure you leave some for the lid. It needs to be just under 1/2 cm thick. Put the pie lining in the bowl and add the filling. Wet the suet edges with water and place the lid on top. Press together both the base and the lid, firmly discarding the edges so you are left with a smooth top.
- 4) Lay a piece of grease proof paper over the top then cover with foil and lay in the tray of boiling water. The water needs to be around half way up the bowl. Put in the oven for 40 minutes at 180°C.



## **BYGONE BEVERLEY STROLL** EXPLORING BEVERLEY'S WW2 PAST



The first of this series of walks exploring significant days in Beverley's past, concerns the two occasions that the town was attacked from the air during WW2. The first was Sunday October 27th 1940, the second, with tragic consequences, was Bank Holiday Monday, August 3rd 1942. Our stroll of just under 2 miles links the sites that featured in these events.



1 Start by the entry gate and toll board for the Westwood on York Road, here is a surprise survival from the Second World War. At the side of the neatherd's yard, the large rectangular brick building is the only remaining example of the 26 air raid shelters that served Beverley. I have passed many times without realising its historic significance, indeed it was only revealed when a friend kindly loaned me the 'History of Beverley' by Pamela Hopkins. It is the standard brick built communal type that could hold about 50. They were unpopular due to their tendency to implode if a bomb fell nearby, as happened frequently during the Hull Blitz. The Westwood was a place of refuge during the terrible bombing of Hull, as understandably people camped here to avoid the raids



2 Head to the North Bar, it had internal lighting installed during the war as buses damaged the ancient brickwork during the blackouts. Here, eyewitnesses reported seeing 'a big black bomber' almost touching the medieval gateway as it swooped to attack. I wonder if the artist, Fred Elwell, who lived at Bar House, was aware of the raid? Walk towards St. Mary's church, you are following in the flight path of the plane on that quiet Sunday evening. It then machine gunned the town streets, with two civilians suffering foot injuries, the bullets were particularly intense near the bus stops in the market place. Remarkably a bullet hole still remains inside St. Mary's from this attack, in a pew on the right near the back, try to



3 Go into Saturday Market where bullet damage from the plane can still apparently be seen at the National Westminster bank. I stood trying to locate it recently, feeling uncomfortable sizing up a bank! I think I spotted the damaged masonry. It was 6.20pm, people were on their way to a church service in the Playhouse Cinema, which was far easier to blackout than St. Mary's. A helpful churchwarden there told me that the highly respected, Peter Hebden, who sadly died recently, had vivid memories of that night when as a young choir boy, he witnessed the raid.



4 Now head up Toll Gavel and Butcher Row, the plane flew this way before leaving the town to the south. There were guns at Woodmansey, which may have fired on it, on one occasion they shot down one of our own aircraft in error. At M&S you are on the site of what was then the Marble Arch cinema, this comes into our story later. Continue across Wednesday Market and down Eastgate to the railway crossing, where the second fateful day unfolds.

5 Today's Flemingate complex was then the large industrial area of Hodgson's tannery. A lone German plane seems to have targeted this in the early evening of August 3rd 1942. Why the plane was flying over Beverley remains a mystery, it certainly does not seem to have been a planned attack but an opportunist, 'tip and run' raid, by an aircraft returning from another mission. It may be linked to a raid on Middlesbrough that day which killed 8 people and badly damaged the station. The plane dropped an incredible 500kg of bombs in this area. At the tannery a horse was killed, it seems some bombs bounced over the road, hitting properties in Sparkmill Terrace and in Brentwood Villas. I may be wrong, but I don't think these villas exist today? Here Mrs Sowden was killed, at Sparkmill, Charlie Cross was killed feeding his rabbits. The third fatality was an off duty soldier, Stan Lawrence, who was cycling by. The two Beverley victims were given a civic funeral the following week at Queensgate. Over 100 houses were damaged. It was reported in the local paper that a highly popular Old Mother Riley film was showing at the Marble Arch cinema, so many lives were spared.



After both raids, the Beverley Guardian had to describe the attacks as being on an anonymous 'North-East town', although everybody knew it was Beverley.



6 Here at Sparkmill, you can either retrace your steps, or take the lovely track that crosses the railway before emerging on Long Lane. From there you can complete your stroll through a fateful time in the town's history, passing the Minster, which wisely put their priceless stained glass into safe storage during the war.

What made me think about other crops is the fact that 30 years ago, I planted a fig tree in the garden to make a sort of cover over the path which everyone would walk under.

I have no idea how long a fig tree would last and for the first 15 years or more it simply grew and never produced any fruit.

Since then it has produced an abundance every year - but the fruit all drop off before being mature enough to use.

This year, it seems to have had three crops and I am continually sweeping the fallen figs up to put in the dust bin. Just think what I could have done had they been edible!

Of course, other fruit orchards producing things like strawberries, raspberries and a variety of other berries are managing extremely well in various parts of the UK.


Scotland, along with Kent and places like Herefordshire and Worcestershire seem to be suited to fruit crops whilst the Lincolnshire Fens have the right soil to supply the whole country with excellent vegetables, again some them

quite exotic! Some 30 years ago, I used to grow broccoli, cauliflowers, cabbages and self-pick

At that time there was a steady demand through local merchants for all these products, but as the supermarkets grew more powerful and put the screws on local producers, cheap imports became the order of the day.

I wonder if it would be possible to plant a fig orchard and manage them properly?


That would be something unusual.











### I'VE BEEN THINKING... BY COLIN RAYNOR

I've been thinking about St Martin's Day.
Some may recall him as the Roman soldier who became a Christian despite his father's opposition and whose Saints Day (the day he died) is celebrated all over Europe. The date is November 11th when Europe also remembers the signing of the Armistice which brought an end to the Second World War.

There are few alive who can talk about their experiences in that War. Only those who were there could truly evoke the stench of the mud filled trenches or the choking mustard gas, with its penetrative poison that became a lingering death for so many years after the conflict ended.

The truth is that those who did survive the war - the war that was supposed to end all wars - rarely spoke of their horrific experiences as though to do so would plunge them back again in to that living hell.

Life was often extinguished in the twinkling of an eye for a generation of men and women, many so young they never had chance to "dream dreams" of any kind.

On St Martin's Day in November there will be the national service of remembrance at the Cenotaph and because of the significance of the many years since the first conflict there may also be other services, at other times of the year, throughout the land to commemorate an event that is fading fast in the annals of our island's history.

There is often speculation about the purpose and value of remembering conflicts of war that have lost our country a whole generation of men and

women. There is also a movement currently to continue some form of remembrance, but omit all the participation by the Christian churches and any reference, in any way, to spiritual guidance and support.

This is, I think, another battlefield that the Church must engage in, not only to retain the element of pure remembrance but also to promote in the minds of the younger generation, who may be more vociferous in this movement than older folks, the basic truths of the Gospel message.

This is a Gospel that seeks to claim the hearts and minds of a minority in our country who chose who say, "I don't care about anyone but myself" and "I am not anymore my brother's keeper".

I recall the well-known words spoken by Sydney Carton (in Charles Dicken's book A Tale of Two Cities) as he chooses to go to the guillotine so that his friends may escape and live on - "It is a far, far, better thing that I do than I have ever done before."

Thousands of very ordinary men and women, during the two World Wars could echo those words and we must always take time to thank God for them.

Let us hope St Martin's Day on November 11th is once again a truly memorable Festival Day and one that goes in perpetuity. In very many ways there is much that is wrong and giving us cause for concern today but I suggest there so much to give thanks for as well and we can only do that because of those "we will remember".



## GOLF WITH STEWART FRASER - HOW TO SAVE SHOTS WITHOUT CHANGING YOUR GOLF SWING..

The average club golfer makes a lot of elementary errors every time he steps foot on the golf course. By avoiding these errors many shots can be saved and your handicap lowered without changing your swing.

#### 1. Know your favourite distance for layups.

Too many golfers reach for the driver automatically on short par 4's and if they cannot reach the green try to get as close as they can. They would be better served trying to lay-up to a favourite distance they have to leave a fuller shot in. I know for example that I am very good from 90 yards but not as good from 20 and will have less chance of hitting it close from there.

#### 2. You don't always have to take the aerial route.

Most golfers will be more accurate from 60 yards with a slightly less lofted club and a more controlled swing instead of a flat-out lob wedge, just because they can actually hit lob wedge 60 yards flat out does not mean this is the correct play. A lower flighted shot will be more under control in all conditions.

#### 3. Take more club.

The most common miss from golfers throughout the world is short, and golf courses are designed accordingly, most of the hazards are short of the green. Does this sound familiar? 146 yards to the front, it's a perfect 9 iron! Because I once hit a 9 iron 145 yards downhill, downwind, with rock hard ground. Take a 7 iron.

#### 4. Do not try to play the impossible shot.

You've hit it into an impossible lie in the deep rough or a bunker, you have 3 or 4 whacks at it before you manage to extricate it from its place of rest. You know you could have taken a drop with the 1st attempt right? Dropped it into a much easier place, knocked it on the green then holed the putt for par. It is worth assessing all of your options.

#### 5. Don't go flag hunting.

If you aren't Rory McIlroy you probably aren't good enough to aim at the flag if it's tucked away behind a bunker. Jack Nicklaus famously used to aim for the middle of greens and take his chances with the putter. If it was good enough for the greatest player ever then it is good enough for you.

#### **CLASSIC CARS WITH CARFAN -**THE FERRARI 250GT SWB CALIFORNIA SPYDER

of Pininfarina is a three litre, triple carburettor V12, well suited for long straight highways.

#### PRACTICAL MOTORING - COULD THIS NEW IPHONE FEATURE SAVE LIVES?

With almost a third of Brits admitting to using their mobile phones at the wheel, it's no surprise that this contributes to hundreds of deaths every year on our roads.

Apple have recently introduced a safe driving mode for the iPhone in the iOS 11 update, preventing drivers from receiving messages and calls whilst driving. The feature also lets contacts know the driver is occupied. This move by Apple has been widely applauded by police and road safety advocates, with them agreeing the feature could help prevent drivers from being distracted by their phones whilst driving, ultimately saving lives.

#### How does it work?

There's a number of ways your iPhone can recognise you're behind the wheel. The biggest indication that someone's in their car is their iPhone is connected to a car's Bluetooth network. But whilst not everyone has Bluetooth in their car, Apple have also taken into account other signals that you may be driving. For example, the device's accelerometer, the rate at which the iPhone finds and loses Wi-Fi networks, along with its GPS signal can all be indicators that you're behind the wheel. Whilst we agree that this is a superb new safety feature, there are some pitfalls. The feature is turned on by default and is automatically activated - great if you're in the car, but there have been reports of passengers and public transport users being affected by this too. But as with all Apple updates, it's likely that the feature will evolve over time to become more accurate, as they analyse more data about who is and isn't driving.

#### What happens when it's activated?

When the safe driving mode is activated, the iPhone will silence notifications to prevent drivers from being distracted by their devices. In addition, it darkens the screen -  $\mbox{\ensuremath{a}}$ useful feature when driving at night - and also makes the device itself trickier to unlock. iPhone users can set up and customise automatic message replies to let their contacts know they're driving and cannot respond, along with opting to receive notifications for messages which could, in fact, be urgent. The app prevents users from receiving calls too, but again, the user can choose who they wish to receive calls from, useful in case of an emergency at home. But don't worry - if you have a Bluetooth hands free kit set

up in your car, you will still be able to take calls using this even whilst Do Not Disturb While Driving is activated.
