MOLESCROFT POST OFFICE AND NEWS PICK UP MOLESCROFT PARISH COUNCIL CITIZEN'S AWARD

Faye Cavanagh was delighted to accept the award on behalf of Sub-Postmistress Pam Cavanagh and the staff as a recognition of the added value the shop lends to the community.

Faye has been manager of the shop since she and her Mum took over 3½ years ago. Now there are only 2 post offices in Beverley it means the Post Office services they provide are vital, but the shop is also getting busier and busier. Although there are many new houses in Molescroft, the level of trade is higher than expected, which shows the Cavanaghs and their staff are providing a necessary service to the community, with people visiting from outside of Molescroft.

A plus-point for the shop is that there is free parking outside and a large door which increases accessibility. The fact that the shop is open from 6.30am - 6pm Monday to Saturday and 7am - 12.30pm Sunday for cash withdrawals, too, means that there is a facility at the Molescroft side of Beverley which is a God-send particularly for the elderly. Because the staff have a relationship with their customers, they know if someone who usually calls in has not been seen and they can send out a warning signal. For some people, especially people who live by themselves, a trip to Molescroft PO and News makes their day!

The Post Office offers all the services you would expect from a Post Office, except for Passports. This includes banking and savings, driving licenses, car tax, travel money and insurance, Parcel Force, phone top-ups and mail. The shop offers all newspapers and magazines including a delivery service, basic commodities, stationery, cards, drinks and snacks.

Faye said: "We were really surprised to get the Award - we knew nothing about it until the Chairman of the Parish Council walked in and told us! It's wonderful for the staff to be recognised for their hard work and we are most grateful to whoever nominated us. It has got us thinking though, as to how we can do even more for the community. We have a community notice board, but perhaps we could do more with that. We have thought about doing coffee and croissants on a Sunday morning for everyone who comes to pick up their Sunday newspapers - if only we had the space!"

The refurbishment and reorganization of the shop when the Cavanaghs moved in released space which increased their offer to the public, so you never know what Molescroft PO and News might do next. It is fitting that what they have done so far, has been recognised. Congratulations!

BEVERLEY'S WW1 COMMEMORATION AND RAF CENTENARY CELEBRATIONS ON ARMED FORCES DAY ON SUNDAY JULY 1ST

Following on from the Civic Service at Toll Gavel last month and ahead of the St Mary's Flower Festival next month is the opportunity to salute our Armed Forces, past present and future, in Beverley's special annual Armed Forces event in the town. 2018 features parades, displays, charity stalls, music a raffle and a service in Beverley Minster.

From 10am to 6pm on July 1st, Beverley salutes the Armed Forces for their hard work and dedication. Central to the celebration is a parade of 100 personnel from the Defence School of Transport at Leconfield, representing the Royal Navy, Army and Royal Air Force, 100 years since the end of WW1 and 100 years since the founding of the Royal Air Force.

This year the stage is set to welcome York Military Wives Choir, performing for the first time in Beverley, The Hull Folk Collective, Humberside Police Concert Band and the Beverley and District Pipe Band, who were runners up at the All England Pipe Band Championships this year. There will be a Tiger Moth fly past (weather permitting) and a resigning of the East Riding Community Covenant which is a voluntary statement of mutual support between the civilian community and local Armed Forces community.

David Elvidge, Vice-Chairman of SSAFA East Yorkshire has been involved in organising the day. He is grateful to everyone who has helped in planning an event which would be sorely missed if not on the Beverley events calendar. He expressed particular thanks to Beverley Car and Cycles for their generous donation of a bicycle to be raffled on the day, which will help raise much-needed funds for SSAFA, the original Armed Forces charity which does so much to help past and present members of the Armed Forces and their families.

BEVERLEY LAUGHS AT THE 'TICKLED' TIGER - FOOD, DRINK AND COMEDY JULY 20TH - 22ND

31 shows in 2½ days - shows for adults and kids, with 'The STI Super Show'. Improv is a comedy shows for families, sketches, music, stand-up, improv, visual, quiz, musical - anything goes! Hour-long shows which you pay what you think the shows are worth! A whole new concept for Beverley!

Hot on the heels of the successful Beverley Fringe Festival in June comes Beverley Laughs. It's the brainchild of Mel and Martin Davis who have been putting on comedy shows in Hull since 2011.

Directors of RTCE productions and known for C69 Comedy Club in Hull and beyond, with shows at various venues including Pave, Hull Comedy Festival, Hull Sesh and the Minerva, Mel and Martin are keen to bring their events expertise (and knowledge of how to make people laugh) to Beverley. They know Allen Slinger, Manager at the Tiger in Lairgate from his time at New Clarence in Hull and Martin just knew that the Tiger would be a great venue for their first Beverley Laughs Comedy Festival.

As a lighting and sound engineer and with an 'eye' for making the best of available space for events, Martin has already worked out how to ensure the Tiger becomes 'Tickled' over the weekend of July 20th - 22nd. Mel is from an administration background, so she makes sure everything runs smoothly from an operational perspective.

So what is planned? There will be comedy on the evening of Friday 20th, from lunchtime until late on the Saturday and lunchtime until evening on Sunday 22nd with comedians from a whole range of genres from the local and national comedy scene. Rob Rouse, Steff Todd, Scott Bennett and Anything Could Happen (Kids Improv Show) are all booked to appear along with local stalwarts such as Jed Salisbury.

Alex Kealy, who featured in the Independent's Best Jokes of the Edinburgh Fringe Ever and the Evening Standard's Best Jokes of Edinburgh 2017 will be there on the Friday evening and on Saturday at 8.30pm is Super Trooper Improv (STI) format which includes comedy sketches and games based entirely on suggestions from the audience - like TVs 'Whose Line is it Anyway?'

Every show is different, but STI's shows elsewhere have seen a sheepdog arguing with its owner, a news report on the Thames being turned to custard and Michael Parkinson being outed as a Russian spy! One of STI's favourite games is Party Quirks where the audience give performers playing guests at a part unusual quirks, for example, they may be obsessed with shoes.

The party host, who has not heard the audience's suggestions, has to host the party whilst working out what the quirks are! Just Beverley is busy thinking of an unusual quirk to suggest at this show - mad photographer or extreme wordsmith

Another first Just Beverley is particularly excited about is the Interactive Pub Comedy Quiz with Alex Love which was an Edinburgh Comedy Fringe sell-out last year. It's for age 14+ so could be a little risqué, but part-quiz, part stand-up is an original concept in itself.

Then there's Lois Mills, who is looking rather scary on our front-page photo! Lois won Leicester Square Sketch-off 2018 for her unique and often dark blend of sketch and character. She's been described as a cross between Victoria Wood and The League of Gentlemen, is a font of obscure and obtuse Yorkshire references and always manages to bring forth another level to character comedy.

Beyond the Joke calls her 'the decidedly-strange Lois Mills who started off weird ad got weirder'. You will be able to judge for yourself when you see her on Friday 20th at 8.30pm along with Hull comedian Steve Rimmer.

Much of today's sizing originates from a survey of measurements carried out in the 1950s. Despite attempts to produce a standardized sizing system in the UK, no government has ever made it obligatory. However, the difficulty is that, if there was a comprehensive sizing system to match every body shape, there would have to be at least 50 sizes. The concept of sizing is relatively new. Before the mass-production of clothes, people would usually make or adjust their own clothes or take them to a tailor.

The lack of a standardized system allows the industry to create a real challenge for customers... slim fit / skinny fit / custom fit / relaxed fit / regular fit... to name but a few!

Even numerical sizing can be a challenge. For the men, a 32" waist can be interpreted by the wording 'to fit a 32" waist', so technically not measuring 32"! A 32" waist could fit someone who thinks they are a 32" even though they are



a 34", so massaging their ego. All this creates a real challenge for internet shoppers and mass high street customers where no assistance and explanation is available - how much nicer it is to be able to try on clothes in the comfort of warm, spacious changing room with advice on hand? There is nothing like personal service from your local, independent clothing retailer.

A new menswear store in London recently opened with ALL sizing removed from garments! Their comment was that if you like it, then try it and if it fits, buy it!



What do we look for when gentlemen come into VERB to try on clothing?

- Suits and jackets are all sized from the shoulders down; they should fit at the shoulder and all else can be adjusted. Ensuring a slimmer fit for broad shoulders avoids excess cloth around the waist. Arm length and jacket length are key to giving the perfect look.
- Shirt fit has to be a balance of style and comfort; sleeve lengths can be adjusted and shirts can be darted to draw in excess cloth from the waist.
- Trousers have to be the correct length and can be tapered to give a modern look. Pockets should not bulge and waistbands should need a belt to

The Chairman of the Neighbourhood Watch Coordinators Panel, Jackie Heffer and the Treasurer, Mac Fleming, are both Councillors in Molescroft Parish, who have worked hard to increase the number of coordinators locally, but they would like to see all areas in Beverley and its satellite villagers covered.



Police figures show that areas with such schemes have seen benefits, not least a reduction in the incidence of robbery, burglary and theft.

Quickly informing area members of rogue traders or suspicious characters, supporting vulnerable neighbours, watching property whilst owners are on holiday, getting involved in crime prevention and fire awareness training, being notified of grants for home security items and even enjoying discounts for belonging to such a scheme with some insurance companies are some of the advantages.

Getting additional road signage, speed bumps or No Cold calling Zone signs is also easier when there is a Neighbourhood Watch group.

Jackie said: "Coordinators look after a few neighbouring houses, street or area of the town or village. They collect basic information such as name and contact details and who else might have a key to the property.

"They share emergency contact details with each member, who displays a neighbourhood watch sticker in their window and on the closest lamppost.

"Coordinators meet with the Police every 3 months or so to report issues. Everything is recorded! Too may people fail to report issues of concern to the police yet its those statistics which will be used to demonstrate that we need more police on the ground.

"People think they only get given a police number and nothing happens - but it does. It's this data which the Chief Constable of Humberside Police



has used to increase the number of policemen we have which increases the chances of criminals being brought to justice."

Every Neighbourhood Watch area works differently. Maureen Yates, Crime and Resilience Officer at East Riding of Yorkshire Council is the administrator of the East Riding Neighbourhood Watch Association and link between the scheme, the Police, Fire and Rescue and the Council.

There is a Code of Ethics for coordinators and members to sign up to, to ensure standards are maintained, along with the application form and request for signage.

JUST BEVERLEY MEETS ONE OF BEVERLEY'S NEW HONORARY FREEMEN - TINA CERUTTI

The Honorary Freedom of Boroughs Act 1885 was an Act of Parliament which gave councils of municipal boroughs in England and Wales the power to award the title Honorary Freeman to 'persons of distinction and any persons who have rendered eminent services to the borough'.

Although Beverley is not a borough council anymore, the 1972 Local Council Act allowed for the award to continue to be conferred by local councils, although there are no privileges afforded to it

However, the two new recipients of the Award made in May this year were made to two very special Beverlonians - Tina Cerutti and Andrew Marr. We went along to meet Tina in her well-loved restaurant, Cerutti 2, at Station Square.

Tina has been a great supporter of Beverley for many years. The family business was established in 1974 in Hull with Tina opening Cerutti 2 in Beverley in 1989, followed by Cerutti's Deli in 1999. Specialising in fish, Cerutti 2 put Beverley firmly on the food map!

Tina has been a firm supporter and demo chef of the Beverley Food Festival since it started in 2006, obviously always doing the fish demonstration.

Tina has always liked to keep active, running 5 marathons, one Great North Run and two cycle rides (one from Zeebrugge to Ypres and the other along the Way of the Cross).

These have all been vehicles to raise money for local good causes, along with other fund-raising ideas, many of which come to her in the middle of the night.

Remember the Beverley Congas with 800 other people dancing around Beverley? That came from a dream-time brainwave along the lines of a well-known Shakespeare soliloquy "I came, I saw, I conga'd!"

Tina's desire to help the community is to give back to the community which has supported her. Her enthusiasm has encouraged others to join her to support charities such as Age UK, Macmillan, the Sailors' Children's Society, the Daisy Appeal, Dove House Hospice and HERIB (now Sight Savers).

The cycle rides raised £32k and £27k respectively with teams of 12 and 10 riding. The public generously continue to donate their spare 5p's, popping into the restaurant or deli with bags of coin, raising £25,000 since 2009.

Known as the '5p Trail', the 5p's are virtually lined up into a trail with a mile of 5 pences, which is about 84,000 coins, worth £4032 and Tina has also been involved in six Great Sunday Takeaways which have helped over 800 elderly people over the years.

Tina is a great chef, a leader and an inspiration to everyone in Beverley and the honorary award is well-deserved.



If you have any spare 5 pence coins, you know what to do with them - pop into Cerutti 2 and donate them to Tina's charity box and you know they will go to a local good cause.

Conservation 50

An exhibition in the Beverley Guildhall to celebrate the 50th anniversary of Beverley's Conservation Area designation

About the exhibition

The concept of Conservation Areas was originally introduced under the Civic Amenities Act 1967 and Beverley was one of the first to use the designation, starting in 1968 and completing the area in 1969. The exhibition in the Guildhall aims to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the designation by looking at the areas of special interest in Beverley, and to encourage both residents and visitors to value the landscape and history of the town.



What is covered in the exhibition?

Beverley's Conservation Area was divided into sub-regions, each of which was considered to have representative characteristics that separated one from another. The exhibition looks at each sub-region separately and illustrates the type of features that are typical of that particular area. Although many people may know Beverley well they are encouraged to look at the town with new eyes and think about what features can be seen in Beverley that may be different from elsewhere.

For example, the form of the streets that were laid out in medieval times is markedly different from the more modern streets.

Consider the sinuous nature of the town centre streets, which originally followed the watercourses that defined the medieval street layout.



Compare these with the straight lines of the modern streets in the Guildhall area which were laid out in the 19th and 20th centuries.

Another characteristic typical of Beverley is the way that many streets, such as Keldgate and Flemingate, predominantly have their buildings along the back of the pavement, and most of the eaves follow the line of





the street - gable ends onto the street, such as that of the chapel on Flemingate seen here, are highly unusual and very noticeable.

Exhibition dates

The exhibition runs from 20 July to 16 November 2018 at The Guildhall in Register Square, Beverley (adjacent to the main post office). The Guildhall is open from 10am to 4pm every Wednesday and Friday until 1 November when the Wednesday openings reduce to 10am to 1pm.

About the Beverley Guildhall

The Guildhall is one of Beverley's best-kept secrets and is well worth a visit to see the stunning Georgian courtroom. Although it represents one of Beverley's most iconic Georgian buildings the original Guildhall was remodelled in 1762 from a medieval great hall.

RECIPE BY THE FOOD RHINO - LENTIL SHEPHERD'S PIE

Ingredients:

- 1 x Red Onion (diced)
- 1 x Carrot (peeled and diced)
- 4 x Sprigs of Thyme
- · 200g Chestnut Mushrooms (chopped)
- 800g Sweet Potatoes (peeled)
- 150g Red Lentils (well-rinsed)
- 1 x Veg Stock Cube
- 2 Tbsp Yeast Extract
- 3 Tbsp Tomato Puree
- 1 Tbsp Yellow Mustard
- 4 The Period Wastard
- 1 Tbsp Dairy Free Spread
- · 300ml Water
- · Salt and Pepper (to season)




Method:

You will need a casserole dish and a wok or large pan. In the wok or large pan, slowly sweat the onion, carrot, mushrooms and thyme until the carrots soften. Add the lentils and stir in the water and stock cube. Once half of the liquid is absorbed add the yeast extract and tomato paste making sure you season to taste. Once the lentils have absorbed most of the liquid transfer them into the casserole dish and allow to cool. In a separate pan boil the sweet potatoes until they are cooked. Remove the excess water and mash together with the mustard and dairy free spread. Remove the thyme sticks from the casserole dish and lay the sweet potato mash over the top. Cook in the oven for 30 minutes at 180°C.

I'VE BEEN THINKING... BY COLIN RAYNOR

As we move into the month of July, the words from George Cohen's song 'Yankee Doodle Dandy' spring to mind - 'born on the fourth of July'. It was written in 1906 and is often sung on American Independence Day - the anniversary of the day America gained independence from the United Kingdom in 1776.



Thanksgiving Day on the fourth Thursday in November. This has a close resemblance to our Harvest Festivals. It was instigated by the Pilgrim Fathers who came from England who wished to give thanks for the riches of the harvest. The Pilgrim fathers sailed to the New World from Plymouth, but history tells us that many of them came from Lincolnshire. For a country that is only 242 years old the Americans celebrate their land and their heritage far more than we do and yet we have so much to celebrate and give thanks for in this country.

I make this point because we can celebrate the fifth of July 2018 as a turning point; seventy years ago, in 1948, it was agreed that all citizens would henceforth have free medical care as a right and the National Health Service came into being. Aneurin Bevan, the Health Minister, announced that doctors, hospitals, dentists, pharmacists and opticians would all come under one umbrella. The NHS would provide services free for all, at the point of delivery, and would be paid for out of taxation with people able to pay as they were able. 70 years on and the NHS has changed beyond all recognition and again, as on so many occasions over those 70 years, is said to be facing the biggest crisis of its existence. The basic principle of free care at the point of delivery is constantly being challenged but remains the bedrock of the NHS. This is a principle which our American cousins just cannot understand, making medical insurance paramount in the States, even though many cannot afford it.

There are other differences between the UK and the Americans; the Second Amendment and the right of every citizen to bear arms. Despite many dreadful incidents of carnage as a result of such liberal gun laws, and an increasing cry for gun law reform in America, it does not happen. In this country, we are equally adamant there will be no change in the law on gun ownership and guns are licensed only to those who need them.

When we find ourselves so poles apart on such important life style matters is it sufficient just to shrug our shoulders and accept that we are two nations separated by a common language? I leave it to you to make up your own mind on that matter and look forward to the cricket season and battles of another kind. Oh, I forgot, the Americans don't understand cricket either!



July for me is a lovely month in the garden, all the hard work has been done earlier in the year, and the garden is filled with an abundance of colour and produce. Enabling us to sit back and enjoy our surroundings and maybe some sunshine (the long range forecast is looking hopeful at least).

July is the month for roses, whether they are climbers, ramblers, shrub or miniatures there are over 150 species and thousands of cultivars. Essentially we are spoilt for choice; even so I have one favourite which is 'Gertrude Jekyll', an English Shrub Rose bred by David Austin. It has large bright pink rosette flowers and a strong old rose fragrance.

Some Rose Tips'...

Deadhead and feed to prolong flowering - deadhead by pruning back to a bud in a leaf axel (joint) lower down the stem and feed with a 'rose fertilizer' or one which is high in potash (K on the label).

Combat Diseases - in the main there are three; all fungal diseases. Blackspot and Rust occur in damp weather, spray as soon as you can with a fungicide, collect up and burn any infected and fallen leaves (don't compost them as you will spread the spores all around the garden). Rust is also an indication the plant is deficient in potash. Mildew will strike when plants are under stress due to lack of water - so keep plants well-watered and spray with a fungicide.

Tasks for July

- Prune shrubs that have flowered and feed them particularly roses.
- Continue to mow the lawn, in dry spells don't cut it so often, raise the blades on the mower and leave the clippings on the lawn, all this will help retain moisture. I know we all like a lovely green lawn but watering your lawn is not necessary. When rain does fall, the grass will spring back and look lush again almost instantly. If we do have a long dry spell spike the lawn with a garden fork, this will allow the water to enter the soil more easily when rain does fall.
- Water containers every day in hot weather this is best done early in the morning or in the cool of the evening. Hanging baskets will need a good soak - don't be fooled by the fact we have had rain, often baskets are sheltered from the rain by the wall they are attached to. You can also reduce the frequency of watering by using larger planters.
- Water borders if necessary, then mulch. Most established trees and shrubs will survive quite long spells of dry, hot weather. But water any newly planted shrubs and trees give them a good soaking, it's better to give a few a good soak in rotation than all of them a little water each day.
- Clear excess pondweed and top up the water if necessary.
- · Spray roses and feed.
- Dead-head like a demon do this religiously. 'Dead heading' is removing /cutting off any flowers that have faded or lost their petals; it encourages more flowers to form and prevents flowers from setting seed too early.
- Prune trained fruit trees I did remember to do this to my pear I am training against a fence last year and I am pleased to tell you I will have fruit this year, albeit only 6.

LIFE ON THE VERY EDGE OF YORKSHIRE

Every year, thousands of puffins flock to the nooks and crannies of Flamborough Cliffs to raise their young - that's right, this puffin colony is Yorkshire born and bred! 'Seabird City' stretches from Yorkshire Wildlife Trust's Flamborough Cliffs to RSPB Bempton Cliffs, and the Flamborough Headland is one of the best places in the UK (or even northern Europe) to see puffins from land. Yet their annual Yorkshire pilgrimage remains one of our best kept secrets...

An iconic seabird, the puffin is also one of the smallest; standing at only 18 centimetres high. At breeding time, puffins' beaks are elaborately coloured, which - when combined with their bright orange feet - gives them an endearingly clownish appearance.

From June onwards, baby puffins or 'pufflings' start to appear and they'll grow strong on a diet of sand eels and other small fish, before heading out to the North Atlantic Ocean in late July.

Where and how to see Yorkshire's puffins...

• RSPB Bempton Cliffs and Seabird Centre, Bempton YO15 1JF.

Renowned all-access and family-friendly viewing areas, visitor centre facilities and café.

• YWT Flamborough Cliffs, North Landing YO15

Experience puffins the wild way, from open clifftop vantage points at North Landing, Briel Nook and other smaller bays.

Join expert guides at these two top spots to get your eye on the prize - regular timetables available at Bempton and the Living Seas Centre.

These quirky characters are one of our most loved birds, but the species is in trouble. Overfishing and climate change are taking their toll on seabirds, so it's important that we all remember how precious our wildlife is and do whatever we can to secure its future. Speak with staff and volunteers at the Living Seas Centre and Bempton Cliffs when you visit about the practical things you can do to help our puffins.

Whether from the orchid-laden vantage point at Flamborough, the easy-access viewing area at Bempton, or with a seal's eye view aboard a boat below the cliffs, there's no doubt the puffin is one of East Yorkshire's headline wildlife attractions. Together we can make sure it stays that way.

Flamborough Headland is just one highlight in a geographical area referred to as the Yorkshire Nature Triangle.

From the cliffs of the Coast, to the heart of the Wolds and the mighty Humber Estuary, East Yorkshire is becoming recognised as a top nature tourism destination.

Framing the photograph.

When taking a picture of a person, hold the camera at their eye level to unleash the power of magnetic gazes and mesmerizing smiles. ENERGY-SAVING OPTIONS WITH RICHARD STOTT OF RD STOTT ARCHITECTS - MAKE HAY WHILE THE SUN SHINES!

They used to say, 'Make hay while the sun shines.' And they perhaps still do in some parts of the countryside, but maybe this phrase should be updated to say, 'Make electricity while the sun shines'?

Increasingly, our clients are asking, can we make their project more energy efficient and as environmentally friendly as possible, and the answer is yes, we can, but we need to be clear about what is possible and why you want to do it. Whether it is a small extension, a new house or multiple houses, you need to consider what options are available, what your budget is, and what you want it to achieve. Are you looking to reduce your fuel bills or are you looking to reduce your carbon footprint and do your bit for the environment, or a bit of both?

The first thing we always look at is how to reduce the amount of heating and electricity that is required in the first place. If you can improve the thermal efficiency of your home by increasing the amount of insulation, fitting better double-glazed windows, more energy efficient LED lighting and a new boiler, if this is a requirement, then you will automatically reduce the amount of heat and power you need and so reduce your fuel bills and do your bit for the environment.

The next step is to look at how you can generate heating and or electricity, and this is usually through the fitting of solar photovoltaic panels, solar thermal panels, ground source heat pumps, air source heat pumps, biomass boilers and or mechanical ventilation and heat recovery units to name but a few. They all have their advantages if used in the correct way and disadvantages if not, so, not all of them will be suitable for the project you are doing. Fitted correctly, they will provide you with free electricity and or hot water, plus you might also be able to claim money back from the electricity companies for the production of spare electricity which can be fed back into the National Grid, or from the Government as part of their Renewable Heat Incentive which is paid for using alternative heat sources. No two projects are the same and no two clients want the same thing, so before you commit to having any works done to your house or adding any of the options mentioned above, always seek professional advice from either registered architects, professional designers or builders who should be able to advise on what the best options are for your house and for you and what approvals you might need, if any. Make sure everything is signed off prior to starting any works.

PIGS IN STIES ARE A THING OF THE PAST!

In my spare time I do a lot of crosswords: I get very cross when the clue is "the home of a pig" and the answer is a STY. People often use the word 'pigsty' to mean untidy and dirty. Yes, we



used to have such things many years ago, when most farms would have one pig which they fed on scraps and household waste and where it was housed was called a sty, but I can categorically state that in the UK, the sty is a thing of the past!

Well, having been involved with a pig magazine for 31 years and having seen pigs in over 30 countries, the only sty I have recently come across is the example in Beamish Museum. The modern pig is kept in excellent conditions, a lot better in many cases than some human beings! They have access to exactly the right diet for their various stages of growth, they have insulated and heated flooring when born; in some systems they have straw bedding, and in all cases of growing pigs, they have access to ad lib feed and water. Pregnant sows are fed a specific amount per day depending on the stage of their pregnancy.

Pig farmers are beset by a massive raft of 'do's and don'ts', which they must adhere to which include: proper lighting (nowadays LEDs); toys to bite on and play with; constant room temperatures; constant moisture content of the



atmosphere in the buildings and additives for water which keep the pipelines free from bacteria so the water the pigs drink is pure. It's true that if you give a pig the chance to wallow in mud then it will do so and sows which are kept outdoors to breed, love to do that when it is hot. Pigs will actually dig their own wallow! Did you know that the only place a pig can sweat is through the end of its nose? So if outdoors, the wallow is essential! I assure you the modern pig farm, producing top class bacon and pork in the UK, has ultramodern buildings, so forget the word STY!



AN ORDER OF SERVICE FOR A FUNERAL - DO WE REALLY NEED ONE?


One of the biggest dilemmas most families have when arranging a funeral service is whether they should have an order of service. We are frequently asked: 'Do you think we need an Order of Service?" 

CLASSIC CARS WITH CARFAN -THE JAGUAR D-TYPE

The name Jaguar must be one of the most evocative in racing and this month's subject - the D-type, has a short, but illustrious (and fiery) history. Manufactured only from 1954 to 1957, this fantastic car managed to win the famous Le Mans race in France for the last of these, three years in a row, beating everything which started the race with them, including the all-powerful Ferrari.

Built as the successor to the C-type, only 87 were produced, including 16 of the road-based XK-SS versions. 25 of these were planned but a disastrous fire at the factory destroyed the last 9 as well as much of the original tooling, so production sadly ceased. In 2016, the factory started to build 25 D-types to the original specification, but with some safety upgrades to make it easier to drive on the road. The engine was three and a half litre, six cylinder, capable of 185 m.p.h. on the Mulsanne straight.

The car here was photographed at Silverstone, ready for a blast around the circuit, driven by its very lucky and probably very wealthy owner. The price of these cars has accelerated fast in the past decade and should one come up for sale, probably at auction, the winning bidder will need extremely deep pockets. Previous examples have made up to \$22 million - although

this was the 1956 winner, showing just how much provenance means and how it can affect the asking price. Due to the small number produced, each car will have history to a greater or lesser extent and this history will directly affect the asking price.



Should you be so lucky as to see one of these magnificent beasts, and it will almost definitely be on a racetrack, don't forget the cheery Carfan wave!



CYCLING WITH WILSONS WHEELS STIPENDIA TEAM FUNDRAISING

I am a strong believer in wearing a helmet when out cycling. It may not look cool or be comfortable for some, but it may be the one piece of equipment that saves your life.

I cycle to work or go out training almost every day and so wearing a helmet has now become second nature. I still can't believe though that a lot of people risk going out without one on and personally think that it should be a legal requirement to wear a helmet, like it is in some European countries.

So how do you get the right helmet? Well, finding the right size is the first step. Helmet sizes are of course measured by the circumference of your head and normally come in small, medium and large. These can then usually be fully adjusted on the strap and the inner cage, to exactly fit the size of your head. To ensure that you are comfortable wearing a helmet, it's always best to try and find one that fits you well and is well designed. The betterdesigned helmets tend to be more accurately anatomically shaped for your noggin and are therefore more comfortable. They are also often lighter and usually have better ventilation to keep your head cool. You can also buy garments that fit under your helmet to make it more comfortable, like skull

caps for winter, to keep your head warm and bandanas for summer, to absorb any sweat from your head.

There are more basic helmets, some of which we sell at Wilsons Wheels, starting from £20.00. You can spend upwards of £200.00 for the higher-end racing helmets. My own personal helmet is a Catlike

helmet which has a removable cover for different weather conditions, which is always handy! Even some of the more entry-level helmets though now come with little neat tricks like lights on the back, built into the adjuster, for the inner cage. Ultimately, though, regardless of which helmet you choose, it is just so important to wear one! Given the level of traffic we now have on the roads, wearing a helmet is a potential life-saver.

MEET GARRY BURNETT - OUR NEW ARTS CORRESPONDENT

Garry was born in Beverley at the old Westwood Maternity Hospital. However, he grew up in East Hull where he had a very famous neighbour. We pass the story over to Garry...

My parents and extended family lived in Fast Hull One of my neighbours was Mick Ronson who worked as a gardener in East Park; he went on to grace the world stage as a band-leader and lead guitarist with David Bowie. Ian Hunter and Bob Dylan and producer and arranger for Bowie, Lou Reed and countless others.

Mick's impact was enormous. Apart from the Bowie catalogue in the defining 'Ziggy Stardust' years which he played a huge role in producing, he was responsible for such classics as Lou Reed's 'Perfect Day', which he produced and played the sublime piano accompaniment, and massive hits such as 'Jack and Diane' by Johnny Cougar, and 'Once Bitten Twice Shy' by Ian Hunter.

Mick was loved and revered by all who knew him, not only for his musical genius but his humility,



generosity and kindness and would give time and money to musicians he barely knew just to get them the break they needed, often for a fee which was a fraction of what he was worth.

In 2017 Lco-wrote and produced a Hull. City of Culture tribute show to Mick called 'Turn and Face the Strange' which included many different local accounts of his early life and musical career. The show sold out at The Freedom Centre, near to where Mick and his parents rest and then at The Hull Truck Theatre with rave reviews in February of this year. I was surprised to see how much of his development as a musician was connected with Beverley and the East Riding.

In various bands such as The Crestas, The Mariners and eventually The Rats, Mick regularly played clubs and dance halls in places such as

North Ferriby, Malton, Hessle and Beverley itself, particularly at 'The Regal' on the corner of Norwood.

The Rats forged a reputation as being the 'best band in the

area'. Its shifting line-up was to include a quite prestigious musical alumni, including Keith 'Ched' Cheeseman, Woody Woodmansey of The Spiders from Mars (born in Driffield) and John Cambridge (still a Beverley resident) who tells glorious tales of his memories as a musician working with David Bowie and Mick before their fame. Former Little Weighton resident and bassist Trevor Bolder was later to join Mick in the line-up for the band 'Ronno'; the band that was eventually to become 'The Spiders'.

It is impossible to under-estimate the impact that these musicians had on world-wide popular culture. In allowing David Bowie to gain muchneeded credibility they formed a rock and roll powerhouse with roots and musical CVs firmly planted in the East Riding of Yorkshire.

David Bowie used to love to affect an East Riding accent to tell the tale of how he first introduced them to the startling stage costumes and make up they were going to be wearing for the Ziggy shows. 'Not bloody likely' was the initial response until they realised the effect it was to have on female fans, after which it quickly became a case of 'pass the blusher, Trevor'.

One of the most charming details for me concerned the choice of rehearsal spaces bands

In 'Turn and Face the Strange', Squeeze bassist John Bentley remembers how The Rats used to rehearse in the Scout Hut at Woodmansey, which is still standing today.

"My band was never as 'grown up' or important in



the pecking order as The Rats,' he remembers, 'and we had to use the Cub Hut next door!"

PREPARE TO BE AMAZED AT THE 8TH **BEVERLEY PUPPET FESTIVAL 13TH-15TH JULY**

Our own puppet festival is the largest festival of British puppetry in the world in one place - yet another first for Beverley!

The puppet festival was the brainchild of Anna Ingleby, who runs Indigo Moon Theatre (Puppets and More), a national and international touring company which also runs workshops and works in education.

Anna said: "As a town of festivals, Beverley was the perfect place to run a puppet festival, which brings many of the elements of other festivals together but is unique in that brings together many disciplines (performance, music, visuals, writing etc). Puppets are diverse, involving and captivating for all ages. There is no restriction on puppet sizes, what they look like, what they say and do and how they behave! They might be operated or voiced by a human, but they are their own beings - which is why they can evoke such emotional responses and why some shows are age-restricted! This year's festival starts on Friday 13th and was instigated 13 years ago, so be prepared for some scary shows over the weekend - but there's lots of shows for families along with free outdoor events."

How did Anna get involved in puppets? She said: "I never dreamed I could be a performer! Yet with puppets there is a voice which isn't your own. Anything can have a life and be symbolic. Even when I go on the radio, I take a puppet with me - not necessarily to give me confidence, but to demonstrate the power of puppetry. You can do things with puppets which you couldn't do with actors - go into a different world, change scale, make them fly - and



although puppetry is perceived as a children's art form, it extends into adult realms. Puppets are used extensively in film and television, yet how many of us really consider the puppet characters which we know and love to be anything other than real? I sat on a national committee which was considering which puppets should be included in a national encyclopedia. When someone suggested Basil Brush I was shocked! I have never considered Basil Brush to be anything other than a real fox!"

It is true that puppets are a part of British popular culture. From Muffin the Mule, Andy Pandy, The Wooden Tops and Bill & Ben to Sooty & Sweep, Hector's House, the Gerry Anderson puppets in shows such as Fireball XL5, Stingray, Thunderbirds, Captain Scarlet and the Mysterons and Joe 90 and Jim Henson puppets in Sesame Street and The Muppets through to War Horse and The Lion King, puppets are part of our British culture. Millions of children have grown up with Gordon the Gopher, Edd the Duck and now Hacker T Dog in the Broom Cupboard on CBBC and who didn't watch the biting satire of Spitting Image, which is rumoured to be returning to our screens very soon. As Anna says: "Puppets bring out the child in the adult and the adult in the child. The Beverley Puppet Festival demonstrates how puppetry is a developing art-form which engages and involves the young and the more mature in a variety of different venues and spaces. With support from Beverley Arts Trust, Beverley Town Council and East Riding of Yorkshire Council as well as the Arts Council, we are able to provide a fertile ground for networking by companies performing as well as booking agents who can watch the shows - it is a national showcase with the largest geographical reach over a single weekend."

The Festival Hub at the Friary this vear stretches over the railway line to Flemingate where there will be events and food. But other sites in Beverley will host shows (East Riding Theatre, Toll Gavel United Church Hall and The Masonic Hall) or be starting point locations for outdoor performances. 


