Did you know, the average person spends 3 years of their life queuing for refreshments, mainly at sports and music events? Local man Greg Usher and his pal, Joe Gateshill, have developed an 'appy' solution!

Queuing 40 minutes for drinks or food at a music festival isn't unusual! But it's particularly annoying when turn-around time for an act is usually 20 mins and you miss the end or beginning of a set. It's just as bad at a sporting event when everyone tries to get to the bar at half-time and you miss that all-important goal/try. Greg and Joe realised that, at a theatre, there is usually a pre-ordering system which allows you to pick up interval refreshments without queuing - so why not have one at events?

But instead of the ordering system being paperbased and dependent on cash/card payments, make it an app instead. After all, not everyone carries a pen nowadays let alone cash, but everyone has a mobile phone! So FanGo was horn

TOLL GAVEL CHURCH TO HOST 'HOW TO GO GREENER DAY'

We are told constantly we need to do more to save the planet. From being encouraged to buy diesel cars only a few years ago, we are now told diesel is bad and electric is the way to go; the wonder-product, plastic, which has myriad uses, is not always recyclable and we now know it is a major polluter: the food we eat could be responsible for huge amounts of CO2 being released into the atmosphere and using too much water, so flexing our diets is encouraged and insects are dying off at an alarming rate due to over-use of pesticides. IT'S THE 500TH KIPLINGCOATES DERBY ON MARCH 21ST

The oldest flat race in England, with the first race run in 1519, will be run for the 500th time this month. It's a back-to-front race, in that the weigh-in and speeches are held at the finishing post near Londesborough Wold Farm, Etton, with the riders making their way to the start at Kiplingcoates before racing back, and the runner-up can win more than the winner due to the winner getting a fixed purse of £50 with the runner-up prize being made up of entry fees on the day.

The rules state that the Derby must be run on the third Thursday of March or it can never be raced again, so on the three occasions it has been cancelled, the course has been 'run' by a single horse and rider. It was cancelled in 1947 due to snow, in 2001 due to foot and mouth disease and last year because the course had been damaged and was too dangerous for the horses. The course is 4 miles of farm track, field and road verges.

Entrants riding any horse of any age just turn up and enter on the day by 11am. A bookie has attended since 2012, but some of his odds are guess-work as riders can give their mounts made-up names to keep him guessing as to their racing abilities! So an entrant could be an ex-racehorse or an expert point-to-point horse and be given low odds - unless the bookie rumbles the rider! Riders must weigh in at 10 stone, excluding saddle, and the race must be run by 2pm.

This year is trustee Guy Stephenson's last year as a trustee; it was his Uncle Fred who 'ran' the course in 1947, despite the 4-foot snow drifts! It's not an easy race for spectators to see! It's impossible to see the start AND the finish and parking is difficult. If you are going, aim to get to the finishing post at 10am, take a flask, wrap up warm and bask in the knowledge you are keeping history alive. Thanks to Sue Mackinder for her input to this article.

NEW BEVERLEY COMMUNITY LIFT BUS TO JOIN SOUTH CAVE, HOTHAM, SANCTON AND NEWBALD TO MARKET WEIGHTON

Beverley Community Lift (BCL) has worked with local residents and Parish Councils to secure funding from them and the Sober Hill Wind Farm Community Benefit Fund to start a new bus route.



With a bus service linking Brough, South Cave, Newbald and Walkington to Beverley running only 3 days a week with nothing to link other villages to Beverley or Market Weighton, many people, especially the elderly have felt isolated. Starting Tuesday March 5th and running alternate weeks, BCL is to run a volunteer-led service for registered passengers on a trial basis. Initially, the bus will return after passengers have had time to do their shopping in Market Weighton, but from mid-April, there will also be a later-returning bus so passengers wishing to travel to York on the EYMS bus can get back home.

Fiona Wale, Interim Manager at BCL said: "Prospective passengers need to register with BCL if they wish to use this service by ringing **01482 868082** so we can send them a form to complete. We would encourage people who live along this route to call us for further details and timings and to let us know if they have any particular needs."


ARTERY (ART EAST RIDING OF YORKSHIRE) LIVE SPRING EVENTS ANNOUNCED

The rural touring scheme where volunteers and bookers promote live professional entertainment and films in their local venues is off!

ArtERY Live encompasses theatre, music, dance, comedy and family/children's shows performed in Village Halls. REMEMBERING BEVERLEY'S SHIPYARD

An exhibition looking at the long history of boat building in Beverley opens at the Beverley Guildhall on 20 March. The exhibition has been called 'Trawling Through Time' to link it with the project of the same name that has been under way in the East Riding Archives over the past few months.

The Archives project was set up when the Archives team received a historic collection of ships' plans from Cook, Welton & Gemmell. Since then, with the help of a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund and an enthusiastic team of volunteers, they have been cataloguing and digitising the plans, and making them accessible online - which can be viewed at www.trawlingthroughtime.org

Wooden boats were built on the Beck from medieval times until the 1950s, and the Grovehill shipyard itself was originally started in 1763. The exhibition looks at the early history of the Grovehill yard, the Cook, Welton & Gemmell years, and the final days of the industry in the 1970s.

Did you know there was once a ferry linking the Grovehill yard to another and a lesser-known shipyard on the east side of the river?

The Guildhall is located in Register Square. It is open from 10am to 4pm every Friday, every Wednesday from 10am to 1pm until 30 April and then 10am to 4pm on both Wednesdays and Fridays. Admission to the building is free.

DON'T FORGET MOTHERING SUNDAY ON MARCH 31ST

ST. MARY'S CHURCH BEVERLEY 1520-1524

In 1520 the tower of St Mary's fell down. It was not unusual for church towers to fall - this had already happened to Beverley Minster in 1213 - and they still fall (look at YouTube to see just how terrifying this is, immense noise and waves of dust). But St Mary's was unusual in that a service was actually going on. But there was a counter-attraction that April Sunday, reported by Sir Thomas More, Henry VIII's Chancellor: 'near 1000 at two bear baitings, but only 55 at Mass, who were all slain'.

Architectural evidence identified by John Bilson suggests the tower fell into the nave, damaging the interior of the nave, part of the transepts and an area north east of the tower as well. Visitors to the church can see the extent of the repairs of 1520-1524 and try to work out which are medieval, which Tudor. The church was rebuilt very quickly, with help from the town council, from Cardinal Wolsey's steward (Wolsey was archbishop of York and thus concerned about 'his' church) and private donors. The aisles of the nave have carved heads of some of these donors: to the north John Crossley merchant and his wife Johanna, the Good Wives of Beverley and the Minstrels, and to the south two pillars with the 'Mercers' Maiden' symbol of the Merchants' Guild.

Other carvings not yet clearly identified may represent other donors. Two pillars in the nave record the date 1524, which probably marked the end of the rebuilding. A roof to the north of the choir spells out over thirteen bosses that 'W Hal carpenter made this roof'. He is the only craftsman whose name is recorded, as the restoration accounts have been lost over the centuries. St Mary's church in 2019 is once more in need of restoration, so it is good to look back and see how the 1520 catastrophe was overcome, and how fast the work was done. We need to copy the Beverlonians of the 1520s in generosity and speed. A fuller account of '1520: The Year the Church fell Down' will be given by Prof. Barbara English MBE for the Friends of St Mary's Beverley in St Mary's Parish Church Hall at 7pm-9pm on Thursday 28th March. Free admission, all are welcome, refreshments will be available after the talk.

Professor English is an Honorary Freewoman of Beverley. She was awarded the MBE in the New Year's Honours in 2015 for Services to heritage and the Community in Beverley. She gives much of her time to support Beverley and helps to maintain its status as one of the Great Towns of Great Britain.



ACTRESS, WRITER AND DIRECTOR JESSICA HYNES TO VISIT BEVERLEY FOR OSA





GOVERNMENT FEED-IN TARIFFS FOR MICROGENERATION OF ELECTRICITY FROM SOLAR PANELS END MARCH 31ST

After March 31st, new solar panel installations will not attract payments for home-generated electricity. If you are considering installing solar panels, it is well-worth contacting an accredited company to reserve your panels now!

Solar panels have come down in price over the past few years, matched by a reduction of the feed-in tariff (FIT). However, the Government has decided to scrap the feed-in tariff completely after March 31st. At the moment, a 14-panel roof-mounted south-facing system costing circa £5,500, will pay for itself within 7-8 years, taking into account domestic use and FIT payments, but, after March 31st, without the FIT, the return on investment will be longer. However, once the panels have been paid for, electricity generated is essentially free.

If you are considering installing solar panels, it is also worthwhile considering battery storage for excess electricity generated. If fitted at the same time at solar, the VAT is limited to 5%; if fitted after solar, the VAT rate is 20%. ARMED FORCES AND VETERANS BREAKFAST CLUB STARTS UP IN BEVERLEY

The first AFVBC was in Hull, set up quite by accident by founder Dereck Hardman in a pal's garage. Now there are Breakfast Clubs not only in the UK but also in several European countries and even Australia with at least one a week starting up.

In 2007, Dereck was working on a 'project' vehicle which he took to motor engineer Peter Barker's garage. Peter was in the Army Corps of Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers and, as the project progressed, Pete's former comrades would drop by for a brew and a chat. Dereck invited other local veterans he knew to join in and before long, there was quite a group meeting every Saturday at Pete's garage. By this time, the lads were also enjoying a 'butty' along with the 'brew' and banter and the Armed Forces & Veterans Breakfast Club was born. It wasn't until 2014 when the idea was progressed - an informal club just for service personnel to 'return to the tribe' - which is easy to run for the sake of the leaders.

The impact of the Breakfast Clubs has been very positive as they provide mutual support within a safe space and important connections for outside the club. Dereck said: "Many service personnel leave the forces without having known anything else, especially if they joined when they left school and feel as if they have been dropped into an alien environment without recognisable landmarks. This is further exacerbated by the fact that they are no longer a member of a team of their peers, giving mutual support, which all too often leads to feelings of isolation, depression,

and even sometimes suicide.

"The Breakfast Clubs provide familiar surroundings for service leavers. We would like to see the details of their nearest Breakfast Club being provided to service leavers in their resettlement packages, so that they know they are not alone, and can draw on the experiences of those that have already left service... it should be more like getting 'posted' back to civvie street... 'your new unit is the Beverley Armed Forces & Veterans Breakfast Club'... to lessen the impact of their transition, and thereby addressing any feelings of isolation. I believe service personnel who are near to the end of their service career should be encouraged to attend a Breakfast Club local to their final posting, to allow them to begin to tap in to the depth of experience available to them and allow them to familiarise themselves with this resource"

There are already Breakfast Clubs in the locality, in Hull, Hessle, Market Weighton and Hornsea but more are welcome and needed as the numbers of serving and ex-service personnel attending increases weekely. It also means that support agencies can gain access to men and women who may benefit from their services, but who are too-well conditioned by their training to accept or even admit they need them.

Dereck is always delighted when representatives of the Veterans Welfare Service (VWS), Defence Medical Welfare Service (DMWS), Royal British Legion (RBL) and Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen and Families Association (SSAFA) make contact and attend regularly.

As he said: "If someone does have a problem, they are first amongst friends they can trust and secondly have a recognisable, friendly face



they don't feel too proud to talk to because they are probably a vet themselves. It seems to me that Breakfast Clubs could also be a source for recruiting reps for these organisations! It seems to me that Breakfast Clubs can forge links which have the potential to benefit many future veterans and perhaps become the best support organisation for service personnel ever seen. The Breakfast Clubs are only the third support group affiliated to the Armed Forces Covenant after the RBL and SSAFA."

The new Beverley Breakfast Club starts on Saturday March 2nd and then every 1st Saturday and 3rd Sunday of every month at **The Sloop**, **46 Beckside**, **Beverley HU17 0PD** from 9.30am. Membership is free - attendees just buy their own breakfast. The first Beverley Breakfast is going to be opened by none other than Dereck and Peter Barker - we wonder whether that 'project' car might be there, too!



COULD YOU DO IT? FOSTER, THAT IS!

Fran and Richie Thomas have been fostering for 7 years. Here's their story.

"Fostering is a genuine rollercoaster ride. Peaks, troughs and everything in-between. Challenging and rewarding in equal measure, but then the more you put into it, the more you get out of it. I always get a strong sense of pride when telling people that we foster. Not because we feel we deserve special praise, but because of the consistent reactions of people we speak to. They're always so respectful of what FCs do... usually followed up with "I could never do it. fair play to you". The thing is, that we thought that once... and here we are. 7 years down the line and with a string of placements that we know we've been a positive influence on. Our impact has been little and sometimes large, but always positive and always there. Our current placements have been shunted around from pillar to post since entering the care system but all 3 are now genuinely thriving in their education and social lives. We've provided stability and the supportive environment they needed to take their own steps. Slowly, but surely, they're flourishing, and will be in a far better place to take life head on. Teenagers... they'll appreciate it one dav!"

If you are inspired by the Thomas's story, do talk to Marilyn, Norma, David or Monica at Ethical Fostering Services, who have offices in our locality and run their Fostering Panel from Grimsby. Enquiries from prospective and experienced foster carers, aged over 25, with a spare bedroom and access to a computer who exhibit the following skills are very welcome; eager to listen and learn; have patience and resilience; believe every child is unique and can achieve if given the right opportunity; belong to a caring, warm and stable family. Foster carers can be approved to look after up to three children of either sex, aged up to 18 years, generally age 5+. Children under 5 years cannot be placed with smokers. People who are able to offer placements for brothers and sisters, teenagers and children rescued from criminal exploitation are especially needed. Can you meet the challenge? Foster carers are self-employed. They earn between £350 and £460 a week depending on the age of the child. Children may stay a few days, or until they can return home to their birth family or to an adoptive family, or until they reach adulthood. Full training is given. Find out more at





UNODE50 - BOLD, UNIQUE, ICONIC

UNOde50 was created in the late 90's by a Spanish creative team who designed a style of jewellery that broke away from everything that existed until then. Tradition and modernity merged together to shape a different brand with only 50 pieces of each design made, each with a small padlock.

As UNOde50's popularity increased, most pieces were in such demand that more than 50 units were made; however, the handcrafted spirit that reflects exclusivity through design and quality was sacrosanct.

But the company fulfils its promise of exclusivity through limited editions of 50 pieces that are released with each collection.



UNOde50 designs combine silver-plated metal alloys with leather, thread, resin or stone. The alloy, which is so characteristic of the brand is difficult to work with, but it brings to life the unusual texture which gives vigour to all the

designs. Many of the pieces are created using a

A model is made using wax of one type or another using a hand saw with the finer details sculpted using files, chisels or scrapers. Then the wax is smoothed and polished using an alcohol burner to ensure the right temperature is reached so the material can be shaped more easily.



Once the jeweler is satisfied with the wax model, a mould is created where the metal alloy will be poured to get the first version of the piece.

It is manually worked to ensure it meets the shape and texture of the original sketch, smoothed with a hacksaw and then hammers, chisels and micromotors are used to give the UNOde50 original finish.

Some pieces are welded with torches, but all undergo quality control and an anti-allergic process with 15micron silver-plating. Where the design uses other materials, such as leather or



crystals, it is now that they are assembled. Guest and Philips at Flemingate, Beverley are authorized dealers of UNOde50. UNOde50 not only looks good, it feels good, too.

There are men's and women's ranges, watches, accessories and more, some with the iconic UNOde50 rounded 'padlock' which symbolizes the protection of exclusive, uniquely-designed jewellery.

Club (10-14s); has a Ladies' Group and a Stroke Club; holds Bingo sessions and hosts a Credit Union representative. It will also deliver food parcels to people who are in crisis who have no transport through its Food for Families and Neighbourly initiatives.



Cherry Tree Community Centre is run by a group of Trustees, who give their time and skills entirely voluntarily, as do the majority of the advisors and helpers. Manager Joanne Ramsey and Chair of Trustees Pat Crouch have worked together for 12 years and are often called on to work all hours, solving problems for people from all walks of life who might find themselves in difficulty. Both are totally dedicated to helping others. But they could do more with more volunteers, especially people to train as advisors for Mondays and Wednesdays and people to help with basic admin duties every day.

• EAST RIDING THEATRE

It's very true that without volunteers from every walk of life, East Riding Theatre (ERT) would not exist or continue to be in existence. From the conversion of the old Baptist Church building into a theatre, which required architects, structural engineers, builders, electricians, interior designers, painters, decorators, soft furnishers etc to the people who run the theatre on a day-to-day basis manning the box office, serving at the café bar, being responsible for theatre-goers' safety as duty managers and front-of-house and cleaning, all are volunteers.

As Tom Wilders (volunteer Finance Director and toilet cleaner) said: "It doesn't matter what the background of our volunteers, all of them just muck in and do what needs to be done. Luckily, we have over 100 active volunteers, so many hands make light work. VISIT YORKSHIRE NATURE TRIANGLE TO SPOT SPRING HARES

Spring is bounding on and the March hares are getting frisky in the fields! This is the best time to spot these beautiful animals in fields on the Wolds as they lollop across the ground or down a well-worn track. Predominantly solitary animals, hares gather in small groups during breeding time between February and August and become much more active during the day.

Mad as a March hare is coined from their particularly lively behaviour and well-known boxing characteristics. The males are tenacious in their amorous approach and the females, rightly so, eventually tire of their relentless pursuit.

At this point, they will rear up and box the males in an attempt to fend them off. Maybe some males take that as a test of their virility and it's all part of the mating ritual as the females go on to raise several broods between March and September, each time raising three or four young - known as leverets.

Unlike their rabbit cousins, hares live above ground, resting and nesting in shallow

depressions on the ground known as forms. Leaving their forms to feed mainly at night, hares browse grasses and cereal crops and may feed on low scrub if the winter weather closes in and covers the ground.

The Yorkshire Wildlife Trust is working with

farmers, providing help and advice on ways to support the hare population. Hares prefer long grass and small copses, but a range of different habitat gives them shelter, more options for finding food and somewhere to bolt back to after being on open ground. Hares are larger, more elegant than rabbits, golden in colour with a creamy belly and distinctive black tips on the end of their ears. Their long legs power them up to speeds of 45 miles an hour, which makes them Britain's fastest land mammal and gives them an edge and advange over foxes - their natural predator, Introduced by the Romans. hares have established themselves in our stories and folklore and often

symbolise magic and mystery. It's certainly a very special moment if you're lucky enough to catch a glimpse of them in the spring sunshine as part of your wild adventures in East Yorkshire.

THE STORY BEHIND FLEMINGATE'S BEAUTIFUL

AND UNIQUE MEMORIAL BENCH

Last year, the country celebrated the 100th anniversary since the end of WW1 and 100 years since the formation of the RAF. Nearly 10,000 people left East Yorkshire during the Great War and never came back. 35 men from the village of Walkington alone died. The war disrupted family life and caused unimaginable hardship and suffering. Those who came back without physical injury still experienced mental trauma.

The Beverley and District Chamber of Trade, inspired by Leanne Marshall, wanted to create a lasting memorial to those who lived and died through WW1; the Memorial Bench was created and donated by Sherburn Forge and auctioned at the Chamber's Annual Ball, which was held in aid of SSAFA - the Armed Forces Charity and included commemorations to the brave and the fallen.

Leanne Marshall of Hunter's Estate Agents in Beverley organized the Ball and was instrumental in forming the commemorative theme. The East Riding Branch of SSAFA was chosen as the charity to receive the proceeds as it has worked since 1885 to support soldiers, sailors, airmen and their families with help when they need it in order to support their independence and dignity.

SSAFA the ed For BALL 2018

It is the UK's oldest armed forces charity and yet its services are needed more than ever. Last year, there was an 11% increase in calls to its free helpline over the previous year. It also seeks to keep the history of the UK's involvement in armed conflict alive to ensure the lives of the 700,000 people who have sacrificed their lives for their country are not forgotten.

Leanne contacted Sherburn Forge who were delighted to be invited to design and make the wrought iron bench and then very generously donated it.

Other businesses and individual also donated items and experiences which were auctioned, along with the bench at the Ball. In total £6,800 was raised for SSAFA, with Beverley Building Society outbidding all others for the bench.



Michael Menzies-Baird is Chairman of the East Riding Branch of SSAFA.

He said: "We cannot thank the Beverley and District Chamber of Trade enough. £6,800 is the most this branch has ever seen donated from a single event - it is an amazing example of fantastic local businesses and individuals working together to help others in need. Every penny raised goes to help veterans, serving personnel and their families, including recently, someone whose home was badly damaged".

The bench has been sited at Flemingate adjacent to the children's play area in front of Parkway Cinema with the blessing of Colonel Andrew Kennedy, Commandant of the Defence School of Transport at





Leconfield, Squadron Leader Nick White and Major Keith Robertson. Col. Kennedy commented on the commitment of the wider Beverley community to the 100-year commemorations and the visible support for the Armed Forces in the area.

He said: "The bench is a very public demonstration of the profound support for the military in East Yorkshire. On behalf of the staff at the School, I would like to thank the people of Beverley, including the Beverley and District Chamber of Trade and our local SSAFA branch to their hospitality towards and sustained support of this country's Armed Forces."



Karl Elliott, the Chief Executive of Beverley Building Society which bid successfully for the bench at the Chamber Ball auction explained why they are so delighted to see it take pride of place at a local landmark, for everyone to enjoy.

He said: "As the only independent building society in East Yorkshire, playing our part in enhancing the life and culture of our community is hugely important to us. That's why we were delighted to purchase this



beautiful piece of craftsmanship and our team who attended the ball just felt it was a very fitting tribute for us to pay to our hometown. The fact that the money raised will have a direct, positive impact on people's lives in our region just makes it even more special."

Graham Tait, Centre Manager at Flemingate said: "When Flemingate was asked if it would host the WW1 Commemorative Bench which now sits overlooking the Minster, it was probably the easiest question we have ever had to answer. It is both an honour and a privilege to be able to support such an important project.

"On www.beverleyminster.org.uk you can find a list of those who died in WW1 from East Yorkshire by alphabetical surname. Paul Gibson's book Hull and East Yorkshire History records the fact that at least 7,000 men and women from Hull died in the First World War and many thousands were disabled by it. That's why commemorative reminders such as the Bench are so important, so necessary and why this project driven by Beverley and District Chamber of Trade and SSAFA will offer a focal point for years to

BEVERLEY CIVIC SOCIETY BOOK LAUNCH OF EXTRAORDINARY WOMEN OF BEVERLEY

The book has been described as 'The Saint, the Suffragette and the Spy': a very catchy phrase, but one that captures only nine of the twelve 'Extraordinary Women of Beverley', a new book by the Beverley Civic Society. The articles by different authors was the result of talks given in 2018 in the Heritage Open Days programme, and the book launch was at Beverley Art Gallery on 12 February, with the designer Kloskk Tyrer, and authors present to sign books. Just Beverley was there to record the occasion.

The chosen women range in time from St Hilda of Whitby (d.680) an East Riding princess, to Pat Albeck (d.2018) a designer who worked for many organisations, but especially for the National Trust.



Mary Wollstonecraft, early feminist, pioneer of suffragettes, who lived in Highgate and was educated in Beverley, is regularly included high up in lists of the world's most famous women, and of 'books that changed the world'.

Perhaps the most beloved of the Twelve is Nellie Collinson of Nellies, and the most exotic, the alleged spy for Russia Eva Reckitt. The book has accounts of two artists, Elizabeth Lambert and Mary Elwell, whose paintings hang in Beverley Art Gallery; two writers, Mary Braddon ('sensational novels') and Winifred Holtby, (South Riding); Hilda Lyon who designed airships and submarines, and Cllr Margaret Powell, saviour of historic Beverley in the 1960s by her defeat of plans to demolish North Bar, half of Hengate including Nellies, Old Waste, the Friary and a swathe of houses to create 'trunk roads'.



Without her the town centre would have been destroyed to help the almighty motor vehicles. When the twelve talks were collected together, covering more than 1000 years, it was surprising how much cross-over there was between their

careers and lives. Same problems, same solution or indeed failures



This unique book has something for everyone who is interested in Beverley, or indeed in Englishwomen's lives over the centuries.

WALKING WITH IAN RICHARDSON... MYSTERIOUS **KNIGHTS, LOST LINES AND EARLY DAFFODILS AT ETTON**



When I first came to live this area in 1983 and whilst visiting a colleague in Cherry Burton, I commented on what a lovely village it was. "If you think this is nice, you must go and see Etton, its's a knockout" said my friend - and how right he was! On this 3.5 mile stroll we take in some splendid buildings, interesting church and the remains of a major medieval site, once the domain of those enigmatic Knights Templar. We walk a lovely section of the former Beverley to York railway and, if you time it well, you should see some of the best displays of daffodils in the county. Get the timing right too, to take refreshment at the excellent Light Dragoon pub. At the last census the village had only 277 residents, too small to enjoy much in the way of services but what a delightful out-of-the-way place this is - and Beverley is only 4 miles distant.

1 Start at the village crossroads facing the pub (HU17 7PQ). Parking is usually easy here; sadly, the village now has few buses. Cycling to get here, however, is an option, as I did on a glorious mid-February day. The vista of brick and pantile domestic and farm buildings is immensely charming, always seeming akin to a French village. Go right towards the pond, a fine one in an area where they were formerly a crucial resource. Cross the road to enter the churchyard, alongside some impressive farm buildings.

2 The church is an engaging mix of medieval and nineteenth century neo-Norman perhaps only a trained eye can spot the differences? If it

is locked there are the contact details of three local key-holders displayed in the porch. Especially striking inside are the painted screen and medieval sculpture fragments. The church, sitting on lush green banks, invariably makes a fine picture, notably the impressive keep-like tower.

3 After exploring the church, go through the white gate to the path through the hedges, turning left to

reach Chantry Lane. Go right here and follow the lane downhill to the main street. It is here by the old school - an exquisitely converted home - and particularly by the former rectory, that you should be rewarded in March and early April by wonderful stands of that most beautiful of spring flowers - the daffodil. Indeed, so mild has it been this winter that I saw the first ones on the day after Valentine's.

the impressive Low Hall that has housed the Holderness Hunt since 1844, take the way-marked path that rises gently up through verdant pasture. That bon viveur,

Edward Prince of Wales came to hunt in the late nineteenth century, perhaps with the ancestors of the current hounds. There are intriguing earthworks as you rise towards the lane. Some are likely the remains of chalk and clay pits, but others seem to indicate the foundations of long vanished buildings.

5 You soon reach the lane; go right to reach a junction and the railway bridge over the old Beverley to York line which closed in 1965. Go over to access the track by the signed path on your right. Go left down the track for the lovely walk to Gardham. There is a good view of the tower of an eighteenth-century mill and two benches to sit and enjoy this lovely area. These old railway tracks always induce in rail lovers a bitter-sweet taste: pleasure that we can walk or

6 Descend and turn right along the quiet road to the village; there are verges but it is wise to keep

vigilant. After the junction with the Dalton road, walk on the pavement. In 300 yards, look for a grassy lane by Bank House Farm.



7) This right of way (pictured) leads to one of the Riding's lesser known gems - the site of a grange complex, run initially by Knights Templar and then, after their dissolution in 1314, by the less military Knights Hospitaller. They in turn were disbanded by that great cultural vandal - Henry V111. Where the lane dog-legs to the right, view the ditches and mounds of this site over a fence. It is on private land, so you can only view from the lane. It was partially excavated 50 years ago with much of interest found, including a huge oven, cobbled roadways and a brewhouse, but it is still largely unknown, awaiting detailed work by archaeologists. I am somewhat surprised that given the huge popular obsession with the Knights Templar, especially since the Da Vinci Code, that Etton is not besieged by seekers of the Holy Grail!





Now go left to pass more fine houses. The handsome property at number 68 reputedly has monastic remains but resist the temptation to disturb its residents! My final treat was the pub. It has impressive menus. My Walker's Reward platter (pictured) was suitably named and absolutely wonderful. I had a nice chat with the attentive Geordie publican, Malcolm, but do not make the mistake I did of mentioning Sunderland! And as the founder of Carling beer came from Etton, do have a glass of

The notices at the Village Hall suggest Etton is a thriving community with many activities. Particular thanks for help with my research on the village go to long term residents Carmel and Richard Yeo and Stuart Bell, the former beautifully summed up Etton as 'friendly, with a real sense of community.' It was my great pleasure to discover some of its historic secrets - and spring flowers!


"She gave them all to me to look after when she came into the home. She has found the ones she lost this morning, too, so she is happy with life again."

Method:


Microwave the black beans

CYCLING WITH WILSONS WHEELS - GETTING YOUR BIKE READY FOR BETTER WEATHER

With spring around the corner and some occasional good weather we have recently had, you might be thinking that now is the time to drag your bike out of the shed, garage or loft in preparation for the better weather to come. Yes, I do know some people who keep their 'summer' bike in the loft so it's out of the way and won't get damaged, which is a great idea if its worth a few bob! Nevertheless, wherever you choose to keep your bike over winter, what should you be looking out for when you bring it out of hibernation to make sure it is ready to get going again?

TYRES

One of the most common problems bikes suffer from after a period of inactivity is a flat tyre. Over time, the inner tubes will lose their pressure and will inevitably go flat. Most of the time they just need pumping up, but sometimes the tube can have a fault or a split in it due to lack of use or age, when a new inner tube is required. If you don't have the right pump connector, we stock a simple brass adaptor for £1 that converts the thin high pressure presta valves into the more common car valve (shraeder valve) as most people seem to have a pump for pumping up their car tyres in

their garage or shed with this type of connection. Tyres themselves can crack if they have been left in the cold as the rubber can dry out. Cracks usually initially appear on the side of the tyre first which is often a tell-tale sign that the tyre is on its way out.

· CHAIN

Putting a fresh layer of oil on your chain is also a must as sometimes links can either seize or rust even when they may look ok. Letting the oil soak in always help too.

• GENERAL MAINTENANCE

Double-check your nuts and bolts to ensure nothing is loose. It might have been that you put the bike away meaning to get something fixed in the spring - so now's the time! But if you don't have the time or resources to make sure your bike is safe and ready to use, Wilsons Wheels provide a basic check-over for £10 or a full service for £25. RECIPE BY WEIGHTWATCHERS -SALTED CHOCOLATE MOUSSE

Prep time: 15 mins Cook time: 5 mins

SmartPoints: 6 per serving

Ingredients:

- 85g of dark chocolate, finely chopped
- 3 tsp of cocoa powder, plus pinch extra to decorate
- ½ tsp of instant coffee
- 1 tsp of vanilla extract
- 2 egg white(s), raw
- 1tbsp of light brown sugar
- 100g of half fat crème frâiche
- 1/4 tsp of salt

Method:

1. Put the chocolate, cocoa powder, coffee, vanilla and 4 tbsp water in a heatproof bowl. Bring a small pan of water to a simmer over a mediumlow heat and set the bowl of chocolate over the water, taking care not to let the base touch the water. Stir occasionally until the mixture is melted and combined then remove from the heat and set aside to cool slightly.

- 2. In a bowl, whisk the egg whites to stiff peaks, then add the sugar and whisk again until the meringue mixture is thick and glossy.
- 3. Stir 50g of the crème fraîche into the chocolate mixture, then stir in one-third of the meringue mixture and all of the salt. Using a large metal spoon or spatula, very gently fold in the remaining meringue mixture, taking care not to overmix.
- 4. Divide between six bowls, cups or dessert pots and then chill for at least 3 hours, or overnight.
- 5. Serve topped with the remaining crème fraîche and dusted with the extra cocoa powder.

PRACTICAL MOTORING WITH RICH HAYES KEY HACKING - WHAT YOU NEED

You may be familiar with vehicles with keyless entry - maybe you or somebody you know drives one, and whilst this fantastic new technology makes drivers lives easier, it has also created an opportunity for thieves.

Key hacking - or car hacking as it is sometimes referred to - is gaining access to a car when the key is nearby, without having the press the button on the fob. 



SHORT STORY BY ALAN SMITH - IN 1975

It was my fault. I made a mistake about the time of my train's arrival and so I missed the connection. Missed it by a mile and I was stuck in Paris for the night. I phoned her father's house where she was staying and I thought that he had understood. It was always difficult to tell. My French and certainly my telephone French was difficult and I could hardly understand his accent at the best of times.

I could suit myself and so it was steak-frites and tarte-au-pomme with half a litre of red and the cheapest hotel I could find which, in those days, near to the Gare du Nord, was a broken-down shabby affair. I left the curtains open and the light woke me early for an early train south. There was a bowl of coffee and a piece of last night's baguette with butter and jam. I used to love the Gare du Nord. The air had its own texture: softer, more lingering than any other air: Gualoise and sweat and always someone cooking. I stood in the queue at the Guichet and smoked a cigarette, brown tobacco dried in sunshine, before it was my turn. It was an old dusty carriage, from before the war I thought, and it rolled slowly down through the Isle de France and perched above the flat fields of The Beauce, stopping at bare stations, empty platforms, stopping for no reason in the middle of fields. There was sometimes maize, sometimes sunflowers and then a field of white Charolet cattle, great big things the size of a bus, right up against the lines. There were people hanging out of the windows, calling to them, enticing them closer and closer.

It was late morning when I got off the train. I was on my own and I had to wait before the train pulled away and I could cross the tracks. The platform was empty. Then you stood up from the bench that was in the narrow shade of the station buildings. I stopped and stared at you: brown hair straight onto your shoulders a short yellow dress and espadrilles. You watched me cross the lines and watched me walk towards you. You looked serious, so that I thought; what's wrong, what have I done? You leaned against me and I put my hand on your hair. You were crying and I didn't know why. "I've been waiting here," you said. "I was here last night and you weren't on your train. I thought you weren't coming."

Alan Smith's first novel was published just before his fiftieth birthday. "I was one of those people who always intended to write a novel but went to the pub instead. It finally dawned on me that being a writer might entail actually doing some writing and so I resolved to write a page a day." IN THE GARDEN... MARCH

March for me is the month when the garden really starts to come alive with colour - finally we are entering spring and winter should be behind us. March can provide us with a mixed bag of weather, but has the saving grace that the days are becoming much longer, the sun a little warmer and of course the clocks will go forward in the early hours of 'Mother's Day' at the end of the month.



In March I am looking forward to seeing the spring bulbs which are already shooting up nicely; the vibrant pink flowers on the Chaenomeles; taking in the fragrance from my Viburnum carlesii and not forgetting the 'catkins' on hazel and willow trees.

Tasks for March...

- Apply plant foods to established borders i.e. pelleted chicken manure.
- Remove weeds from beds and borders before they become established.
- · Mulch bare soil.
- Continue to prune overgrown and late-flowering shrubs and roses.
- Cut back perennials and grasses that were left over winter.
- Divide overgrown clumps of perennials.
- Start putting supports around perennials this is so much easier to do than when they have grown and you struggle to contain them!
- Dead-head daffodils, leaving the foliage until it dies back.
- Plant summer-flowering bulbs.
- · Sow hardy annuals out of doors.
- Protect fruit blossom from late frosts.
- Treat moss on lawns.
- Re-seed bare patches on lawns (towards the end of the month) and mow the lawn if necessary - set the blades high.
- Check pond pumps and get them running.
- Make sure the birds have plenty of food and fresh water.

Over the last couple of years my focus has been on the 'flowery' part of my garden and so, this year I have resolved to make better use of my small vegetable plot (6ft x 12ft). I don't have a greenhouse to start things off in so my planting/sowing will begin in earnest at the end of March/beginning of April depending on the weather. I will however be digging over the beds in March, when the weather permits in preparation. Well, that seems to be me kept out of mischief, so until April...

When first introduced to the UK, the Duroc boar had a bit of a reputation for champing at the bit. But, as you can see by the picture, this particular one used to jump when the stockman came past so as he could have his head and ears stroked! Many a time when a sow has been lying down, I have stroked her belly and most sows if you do that, then shuffle a



bit so as to expose more belly to rub, and they grunt contentedly!

Some of you may not know that pigs can only sweat through their noses, so are always seeking ways and means of cooling themselves. This picture of a Saddleback sow was taking advantage of a dip in a water trough, which was supposed to be for drinking! Pigs are extremely intelligent and can be persuaded to do the right thing most of the time, but, a bit like humans, of course, there is always one which will buck the trend.

Pigs, indeed, are like humans. They are extremely intelligent, which people might think is their way of being nosy. Some pigs are bred in specialist holdings to produce spare parts for humans, too. No doubt there will be one or two readers who are totally against the keeping, not only of pigs, but of any farm animals. I can assure them that ninety nine percent of all farmed animals in this country are kept extremely well and have strict conditions imposed on their well-being. The Rothko's scale and simplicity strengthened his belief that maximum impact can be created through bold colour and the idea of 'less is more'.


Award-winning Doug is a very humble, grounded family-man; these qualities shine through his work and his manner when you meet him.






